## The Birth of Paul

In 1984 local artist Dean Krotzer had a vision to create the world's largest Paul Bunyan statue in honor of Ake-



ley's status as the official birthplace of Paul Bunyan. Using over 4.5 tons of welded steel, 180 gallons of resin, and 350 yards of fiberglass cloth Paul was reborn. His hair and beard are made up of over 6000 feet of baling twine saturated in fiberglass. Our legendary Paul kneels at 30.5 feet and if standing would be 56 feet tall.

### **A Brief History of Akeley**

In the late 1800's a large amount of timber was to be harvested in north central Minnesota focusing mainly on Cass and Hubbard Counties. Most of this forest belonged to T.B. Walker. In order to set up the logging company two problems had to be solved. First, with no river in the area there was no way to move the logs to the mills. Second was cash flow, so Healy Akeley joined T.B. Walker as a financial partner, and left Akeley with no way to support its people, together they built the largest logging operation in Minnesota history. Their first project was to build a railroad about 30 miles long in what is now known as the Paul Bunyan State Forest. With 2 Shay locomotives and 63 flat cars they delivered six trains of logs to the mill site on 11<sup>th</sup> Crow Wing lake. A town was built to supply the needs of the people who worked in the lumber industry. T.B. Walker named the town "Akeley" after his partner. It grew at a rapid pace and soon had two newspapers, 4

churches, and 17 hotels. At its peak in 1915-1916 it had 54 businesses and a population estimated at 5,000. The mill was ready to operate in 1897 but had to wait till 1899 because the railroad wasn't completed. The town and mill flourished for 17 years with 600 men working in the mill and another 1300 in the logging camps. Then in June of 1916 the mill was closed due to lack of timber. This and by 1920 the population dropped to around 400 where it remains today. The Red River Lumber Company used Paul Bunyan in an advertisement in 1914. William B. Laughead created Paul and Babe the Blue Ox and the other

characters to use in the Red River advertisements. This gives Akeley the claim as Paul Bunyan's birthplace.
