

PRODUCER'S WELCOME

In the kooky, upside-down world of the Addams Family, to be sad is to be happy, to feel pain is to feel joy, and death and suffering are the stuff of their dreams. They may be creepy, kooky and all together ooky, but The Addams Family are one of the world's most loved comic strip creations.

Musicals have routinely been created from the slightest of source materials, and comic strips are certainly no exception. There was Lil' Abner (Lil'Abner). Peanuts (You're a Good Man Charlie Brown & Snoopy), Superman (It's a Bird... It's a Plane... It's Superman!) and of course Little Orphan Annie (Annie) – all of these musicals that have taken two-dimensional strips and put them under stage lights to sing and dance. The Addams Family is no exception with its catchy songs, well-crafted narrative and an undeniable atmosphere, campiness and the cozy company of Gomez, Morticia, Wednesday, Pugsley, Lurch and the rest of the appealing, if somewhat odd Addams clan.

Granted, there is something odd about the macabre Addamses cavorting and bursting into song, but musical theatre is over-the-top, and what could be more over-the-top than a death-obsessed family singing and dancing their way around the stage? What is for certain, RSC's talented cast does it with commitment and joy in this production. It must be noted that part of this production's fun is the presence of dozens of dead ancestors meandering through the show singing backup and commenting on what is happening among their living descendants.

The plot is simple. Wednesday has grown into a lovely young woman and has fallen in love with a normal guy, Lucas Beineke of Ohio. They want to marry, but his straight-laced folks and Wednesday's unique parents have yet to meet. He's a gruff businessman. She's chirpy and partial to rhymes and hues other than black. Wednesday tells her father about Lucas, then swears him to secrecy. Since Gomez and Morticia have vowed never to keep anything from one another, this is bound to create problems for the still love-sloshed married couple. And it does.

It's 'Guess Who's Coming to Dinner', but with some enjoyable twists. Caught between his two implacable women, Gomez sings amusingly of his dilemma in "Trapped." As in this very fun song, Andrew Lippa's Tony-nominated music and lyrics prove to be smartly bound to the action throughout the show. The songs are full of witty turns of phrase and are likely to send you out humming the tunes. I really hope you enjoy the show as much as we have enjoyed preparing it for you!

When I first started this journey as director for The Addams Family, I looked to this quote as a bit of guidance in the way I wanted to take this show. This show is a campy, fun-loving musical that draws us into a family of "unique" characters that we all know from their cartoon forms, television or movies. My goal was to find a side of the characters that we have not seen before, and their struggles that would make them seem like just any normal family. Wednesday is not a little girl anymore, and she is starting to find her own place, but still wants her parents' approval.

Pugsley is learning that he may lose someone he thought would always be by his side. Gomez and Morticia struggle with their relationship, as any couple does. However, through those darkest moments, they find themselves, and discover that love will always triumph—love for family, love for each other, and love for the unknown. Something we should all look towards as humans in a world of chaos: some semblance of peace in the darkness.

2018 has been a wonderfully positive year with an amazing amount of support from RSC staff and parents. The show you are about to see would not have made it on stage without the dedication of so many. I would like to give a genuine and hearty THANK YOU to all who helped out with sets, painting, wigs, costumes make up, props, rigging, lighting, sound, shoes, hats, gaffa tape, ushering, OHS,

encouraging, engineering, puppeteering, finger snapping and hundreds of other elements that make up this massive event that has been embraced by such a supportive community.

This show about a quirky family really strikes a chord and reminds us that the 'production family' has a lot of love to go around.



HISTORY OF THE ADDAMS FAMILY MUSICAL

A musical based on Charles Addams's original cartoons started to be worked on in 2007, written by Broadway veterans Marshall Brickman and Rick Elice, with Andrew Lippa providing the songs. Nathan Lane was originally cast as Gomez, with Bebe Neuwirth as Morticia.

The show opened for Broadway previews in 2010. Drawing mostly bad reviews, it closed after 722 performances before going on a nationwide tour. Despite all the critical negativity circling it, the show was a fan favourite with Broadway performances consistently sold out. The show was voted 'Favourite New Broadway Musical' by fans on Broadway.com. Since the production closed on Broadway the show was re-worked with major changes made to Act 2. Subsequently the show has been staged professionally all around the world and in 2013 the musical was revived in Sydney and also the Philippines.








Since the professional run of the show ended The Addams Family musical has had a wonderful new life on the amateur stage and year after year is listed as the number one show performed at high schools:

SYNOPSIS



ACT I

During an annual visit to their family graveyard, the Addams Family summon their late ancestor's spirits and celebrate being a part of the Addams clan.

After the Family leave, Fester locks the ancestor's portal to the afterlife (through a crypt door) shut.

He explains to them that Wednesday has fallen in love with Lucas Beineke, a relatively normal teenage boy, and refuses to let them leave the world of the living unless they assist Fester in helping love triumph. The apprehensive Addams ancestors begrudgingly agree.

As Gomez spends an afternoon practising fencing with Lurch, Morticia arrives with a bouquet of flowers from Lucas, with a poem. She announces that his family is coming to dinner that night. When Gomez and his daughter are alone, Wednesday confesses to Gomez that Lucas has proposed to her, and she wishes to say yes – but cannot until the families get along. She begs Gomez to keep the engagement a secret from Morticia to which Gomez reluctantly agrees as he has never kept a secret from his wife before.

Later that day Wednesday tortures Pugsley in the 'playroom' whilst Wednesday reveals her blossoming enjoyment of non-Addams customs. Overhearing, Morticia is horrified and suggests cancelling the dinner, but Gomez begs her to keep going with the plan. Their argument is interrupted by Wednesday who sets down ground rules for the evening. Morticia, still intent on shutting down the whole affair, prods Gomez into telling her the dinner is off. But he refuses, angering Morticia. As a compromise,

Morticia insists on playing 'The Game', much to Wednesday's dislike.

Meanwhile, the Beinekes arrive at the Addams Household. Fester commands the spirits do as they're told and rallies them to make the night go smoothly so they can have just 'one normal night'.

The families awkwardly meet, as the Addams do their best to give off the impression of the all-American household. As the couples split off to different parts of the house, Fester encourages the spirits to keep up the act.

After dinner, Morticia proposes 'The Game' in which each member of the family has to disclose a secret after taking a sip from the chalice. Gomez discourages this game, 'Full Disclosure' however Morticia wins and the game ensues during which Gomez tries to tell Morticia he's sorry through a thinly veiled metaphor. Fester reveals he has feelings for the moon, and Grandma admits a little too much personal information. Morticia encourages Wednesday to have a go, during which Pugsley drips in the Acremonium into the chalice. The chalice gets accidentally passed to Alice, who drinks and reveals how unhappy she is in her relationship. The family are shocked

and encourage a new round, but Mal yearns to leave. Wednesday stops him by revealing she and Lucas are getting married. Everyone is left shocked especially Morticia. Just as the panic rises, Fester stops the show and asks the ancestors to whip up a storm to keep the families from parting. They do so, leaving the Beinekes stranded in the Addams' residence with no power.



ACT II

Wednesday drags Lucas to the Addams' residence, intent on running away. Lucas stops her and asks her to think before she does things. She refuses and tells him to act impulsively for once. A fight ensues. Meanwhile, in Morticia's Boudoir, she yells at Gomez about keeping such a big secret from her. She tells him to leave before pondering the wonders of death along with the Ancestors. Alice and Mal fight in their bedroom, and Alice (now changed from drinking the potion), tells her husband to leave her alone.



Fester emerges on the lawn and begins to sing to the Moon about his desire to be with her. Whilst hiding out in the graveyard, Gomez runs into Wednesday who is storming off. He tells her to sit and talk with him. She reveals how confused loving Lucas has made her feel and he comforts her telling

her about his confusing paternal love for her. Lucas appears from the shadows announcing he's open to embracing the unexpected for her. Gomez leaves them, whilst they test their love with an apple, a bow and an arrow. Fester and Mal reveal to have been watching and Mal begins to remember how young and impulsive love made him, thinking back to when he and Alice were young. The ancestors reveal Alice to him and he leads her to remember the good old days.

Morticia arrives in Pugsley's room with a suitcase. She says goodbye for a final time before making the monster under his bed take care of him. In is den, Gomez and Lurch plan a make-up gift for Morticia when Gomez comes upon a travel guide to Paris. Knowing Morticia wishes to see the city, he calls up the worst hotel and books a reservation for them both. Fester bursts in and announces he's seen Morticia heading for the gate to leave. Gomez rushes out to speak to her one last time.

Gomez attempts to convince Morticia that he loves her with an impressive tango. Will the dance of love win her over? Will the families learn to get along?

ADDAMS FAMILY FACT #1

In the original series, Grandma was Gomez's mother, and her name was Eudora Addams. In the movies, she is Morticia's mother, and her name was changed to Esmerelda Frump (Morticia's mother in the series was Hestor Frump). This provided a joke for The Addams Family musical.





THE ADDAMS FAMILY (1938)

Most people assume The Addams Family started life a television series in the 1960s, but they actually appeared in a series of comic panels for The New Yorker from 1938

The Addams Family were created by Charles Addams, a freelance cartoonist born in 1912. It's said that he based Morticia Addams's slinky appearance on his first wife, Barbara Jean Day, whom he married in 1942 until their divorce in 1950. Charles' second wife, Estelle Barb (who was reputedly even more of a Morticia clone), was a practicing lawyer and infamously swindled her famous husband out of the TV and movie rights to his Addams Family characters. They divorced acrimoniously in 1956. He later married Marily Matthews Miller (known as 'Tee') in a suitably spooky pet cemetery, before they both moved to Sagaponack, New York, in 1985, to an estate nicknamed 'The Swamp'.





THE ADDAMS FAMILY (1964-66)

The incarnation that brought Charles Addams macabre family to worldwide attention was ABC's original television series, developed by David Levy, which ran for 64 episodes over two seasons from 8 September 1964. The project was delayed a while, as the rights belonged to Addams's ex-wife Estelle, who held out for more money before an agreement was reached.

The show starred John Astin as scheming patriarch Gomez (a more suave version than his inked namesake). Carolyn Jones as his aloof wife Morticia, Jackie Coogan as his wife's oddball brother Uncle Fester, Ted Cassidy as their towering manservant Lurch.

Blossom Rock as Grandmama the witch, Lisa Loring as morose daughter Wednesday, and Ken Weatherwax as naughty son Pugsley.

Filmed in black-and-white, this classic version of The Addams Family is perhaps best remembered for Vic Mizzy's catchy theme tune and associated finger clicks (which Charles loved, although he lamented that the sitcom wasn't as macabre as his two-dimensional cartoons). Incredibly, it wasn't until this TV series was being developed that Addams even gave his creations names and more rounded personalities. The success of the TV show proved to be a double-edged sword, however, as The New Yorker stopped printing the Addams Family cartoons because of a perceived conflict of interest.

ADDAMS FAMILY HISTORY



THE ADDAMS FAMILY MOVIE (1991)

In 1988 Charles Addams passed away from a heart attack at the age of 78. Tragically, this meant he missed the biggest revival of mainstream interest in his long-running characters, with a \$30 million movie. The film featured well known actors Raul Julia (Gomez), Anjelica Huston (Morticia), Christina Ricci (Wednesday) and Christopher Lloyd (Fester). The movie was a big success both critically and commercially, grossing \$191m at the worldwide box office and spawning a new cartoon and video games. For many, this film is the most popular incarnation of the franchise because of its modern sensibilities, high production values, and funnier tone.

THE ADDAMS FAMILY: THE ANIMATED SERIES (1992-93)

Inspired by the success of The Addams Family movie in 1991, a new animated version was broadcast on ABC, again produced by Hanna-Barbera, which brought back John Astin to voice Gomez.

The cartoon ran for two seasons.



ADDAMS FAMILY VALUES (1993)

Having recouped three times its investment at 1991's box office, it was no surprised that a sequel to The Addams Family movie was quickly greenlit by Paramount Pictures. Despite being a much more entertaining movie in the opinion of most viewers, 'Values' wasn't quite as successful as its predecessor. The studio, therefore, weren't as keen to make a third movie and risk a further tightening of profit. And the untimely death of Raul Julia, from complications following a stroke in 1994, perhaps ensured one never materialised.




