GATEWAY TO HEAVEN



I loved The Passion of the Christ, and still do. For one, it helped me (and many Christians) to re-evaluate our perception, understanding, and appreciation of the actual passion of Christ. We had gotten used to the handsome, bloodless (if not for a few dots of blood here and there), and almost peaceful Christ hanging on the cross. The only thing remaining was a trace of smile. But his passion was real and to many who

witnessed it, an unbearable sight. That's why the women of Jerusalem wept for him.

If I were to be Jesus and had come to save everyone, and someone asked me how many would be saved (Lk 13;22-30), I probably would have sounded more like most (I hope not all) present day sales persons rather than the Jesus in the gospel today. Our loving, caring, and forgiving, Jesus is also definitely a no-nonsense teacher who tells it as it is. So, he



tells his listeners that the gate into eternal life is actually narrow and many will not be strong enough to enter. What bluntness! Yet, what a wonderful reminder to us, God's children, and especially to us Christians, about the essence of God's offer of salvation!

The gate into heaven is narrow and so we must exert ourselves. No free lunch or free ride to heaven. No hitchhiking to heaven. Each of us must travel the long, often tedious miles, one step after another.

But we don't travel alone. We have One who has traveled our path before - Jesus. He assures us that if we come to him, all of us whose burdens seem to be, or are actually heavy, he'd give us some rest and help us carry them (Mt 11:28-30). We have a Mother who had also traveled this familiar path – Mary. We have brothers and sisters who have traveled this less traveled road – the saints. Let us then "strengthen (our) drooping hands and (our) weak knees" and "make straight paths for (our) feet, that what is lame may not be disjointed but healed" (Hebrews 12:11-13).


Parish Tidbit:


Next Sunday, September 1st, is the first Sunday of the month. We will take up a second collection at all the Masses in support of our buildings and grounds.

SAINT MONICA (322? – 387) AUGUST 27TH



The circumstances of Saint Monica's life could have made her a nagging wife, a bitter daughter-in-law and a despairing parent, yet she did not give way to any of these temptations. Although she was a Christian, her parents gave her in marriage to a pagan, Patricius, who lived in her hometown of Tagaste in North Africa. Patricius had some

redeeming features, but he had a violent temper and was licentious. Monica also had to bear with a cantankerous mother-in-law who lived in her home. Patricius criticized his wife because of her charity and piety, but always respected her. Monica's prayers and example finally won her husband and mother-in-law to Christianity. Her husband died in 371, one year after his Baptism.

Monica had at least three children who survived infancy. The oldest, Augustine, is the most famous. At the time of his father's death, Augustine was seventeen and a rhetoric student at Carthage. Monica was distressed to learn that her son had accepted the Manichean heresy and was living an immoral life. For a while, she refused to let him eat or sleep in her house. Then one night she had a vision that assured her Augustine would return to the faith. From that time on she stayed close to her son, praying and fasting for him. In fact, she often stayed much closer than Augustine wanted.

When he was twenty-nine, Augustine decided to go to Rome to teach rhetoric. Monica was determined to go along. One night he told his mother that he was going to the dock to say goodbye to a friend. Instead, he set sail for Rome. Monica was heartbroken when she learned of Augustine's trick, but she still followed him. She arrived in Rome only to find that he had left for Milan. Although travel was difficult, Monica pursued him to Milan.

In Milan Augustine came under the influence of the bishop, Saint Ambrose, who also became Monica's spiritual director. She accepted his advice in everything and had the humility to give up some practices that had become second nature to her. Monica became a leader of the devout women in Milan as she had been in Tagaste.

She continued her prayers for Augustine during his years of instruction. At Easter, 387, Saint Ambrose baptized Augustine and several of his friends. Soon after, his party left for Africa. Although no one else was aware of it, Monica knew her life was near the end. She told Augustine, "Son, nothing in this world now affords me delight. I do not know what there is now left for me to do or why I am still here, all my hopes in this world being now fulfilled." She became ill shortly after and suffered severely for nine days before her death.

Almost all we know about Saint Monica is in the writings of Saint Augustine, especially his *Confessions*.

COMMENT: Today, with Internet searches, e-mail shopping and instant credit, we have little patience for things that take time. Likewise, we want instant answers to our prayers. Monica is a model of patience. Her long years of prayers, coupled with a strong, well-disciplined character, finally led to the conversion of her hot-tempered husband, her cantankerous mother-in-law and her brilliant but wayward son, Augustine.
