Thankful for the True Riches with Pastor Eric

A legend tells the story of a fisherman called Aaron. Aaron lived on the banks of a river. Walking home with his eyes half-closed one evening after a hard day's work, he was dreaming of what he could do if he were rich. As he walked his foot struck against a leather pouch filled with what seemed to him to be small stones. Absentmindedly he picked up the pouch and began throwing the pebbles into the water. "When I am a rich man," he said to himself, "I'll have a large house". And he threw another pebble into the river. He threw another one and thought, "My wife and I will have servants and rich food, and many fine things". And this went on until just one stone was left. As Aaron held it in his hand, a ray of light caught it and made it sparkle. He was not throwing ordinary stones but valuable gems, throwing away the real riches in his hand, while he dreamed of unreal riches in the future." This legend summarizes our situation. The value of the Kingdom of God is before us if we will but

For me this legend reflects what Jesus teaches at the heart of his ministry when he says, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near, repent, and believe in the good news." (Mark 1:15) We have a tough time weighing what is of true value in our life. We become confronted when we suffer or struggle with what is important, urgent, worthy of our choices at any given moment. You might ask, "What/Who will I die for?" or "what would I do if I had 6 months to live?" or "what do I want people to remember about me at my funeral?" I guess any time of dramatic, traumatic, and unexpected events will do – earthquake in Mexico, shot at an outdoor concert, burned out by wildfires, sudden cardiac arrest, biopsy is cancer, etc. The Kingdom of God, the reign of God in life, becomes of tremendous value when we have the rug pulled out from under us, and everything else gets stripped away.

In November we come upon a change in season with colors and colder temperatures as we move into a dark and cold winter. Fall is a promise which ties into the thanksgiving celebration as well. We see in this time of year a glimpse into the value and beauty of life in a moment. The moment, today, is

where I am "at hand" as is God's reign, and tomorrow is a promise that God is already there waiting, preparing life for us. I believe that we can realize the value of God's Kingdom in part by giving thanks to God in everything, at ever time, and everyone. Our faith rests in the God who sent Jesus to remind us over and over of the true value of being a child of a gracious and loving God. Don't dream of unreal riches in the future...dream about and give thanks for the true riches of being a beloved child of God today! Amen.



Plans are underway for Celebration of the Advent Season at Palestine

Watch and listen for details. Advent begins on December 3rd. A booklet will be available

as a guide for the seasons of Advent and Christmas – copies will be available on our website with hard copies available in Fellowship Hall.

The theme for Sunday worship will be: **The Gifts of Advent.** A gift is given freely and offered in love. In the weeks before Christmas, we often race around finding just the right gifts for friends and family. The season of Advent is itself a gift—a time set apart to prepare our hearts for the coming of Christ. We give thanks for God's gift to us in the baby of Bethlehem.

We are also planning an opportunity for you to pause midweek for an abbreviated prayer service (about a half hour) on Dec 6th & 20th. The theme will be **Lost in the**Night: An Advent Service of Hope and Expectation. In the midst of darkness, we long for the coming of the light of Christ. Within this service, the text of the hymn "Lost in the night" (ELW 243, LBW 394) gives us words to express our deepest pleas for God's mercy and salvation. Together we cry out: "Christ is coming soon! Come and save us soon!"

The Advent Wreath, Nativity Scenes (which give a visual reminder of preparation during the season), Trees, Poinsettias, A Christmas Tea to honor Palestine's Precious Seniors, Christmas Program, Christmas Caroling, Blue Christmas Worship, Christmas Eve Candlelight Worship, and the celebration of the Nativity of Our Lord on Christmas Day are all a part of the Celebration.

The name *Advent* simply means, "coming", but there is nothing simple about this time of preparation. Not only are we getting ready for the coming of the Christ Child as anticipated by the prophets, but also the coming of Jesus into our lives today, tomorrow and always, remembering that he will come again to judge and rule the world.

Opening Your Heart and Home

Phillip and Ruth remember the day they decided they wanted to adopt.

It was the late 1950s, and the couple was shocked to learn abandoned babies in a local hospital were being neglected, didn't receive the attention or care they needed, and were not developing properly because of it. Phil and Ruth knew they wanted to do something.

"We decided we would adopt as soon as we could," Ruth says.

Phil and Ruth became adoptive parents through what was then called Lutheran Social Services of Iowa (LSS). The couple already had three biological children, Carol, Eric, and Peter, but they had more room in their home and in their hearts. They were ready for a fourth child. That's when baby Rachel entered their lives.

A few years later, the couple adopted 4-year old girl, Paula, and their family was complete. The seven traveled the country for work and vacations, went camping everywhere, & remained a close-knit family even as each child left home for college.

Now, all of Phil and Ruth's children have lives of their own, and Phil and Ruth have added grandchildren and great-grandchildren to their legacy.

Paula graduated from the Naval Academy, received her Ph.D. in Computer Science, and now works for the IRS. Rachel, a graduate of Luther College and the University of Wisconsin Medical School, became a doctor and practices in New Orleans, Louisiana. She has a weekly syndicated health tips show on her local ABC television station, and has been awarded two regional Emmys.

Through it all, Phil and Ruth have been advocates and supporters of adoption in Iowa. For them, it was a way to make a difference in the world, one child at a time. Today, Phil and Ruth continue to support vulnerable children in Iowa as faithful donors to LSI.

"Not everyone can adopt," Phil says, "but everyone can afford to support LSI. Even a small amount, given monthly and automatically, is remarkably helpful."
