The Holy Gospel according to Matthew 21:23-32 Glory to you O Lord

After driving the moneychangers out of the temple (21:12), Jesus begins teaching there. His authority is questioned by the religious leaders, who are supposed to be in charge of the temple.

²³When [Jesus] entered the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people came to him as he was teaching, and said, "By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?" ²⁴Jesus said to them, "I will also ask you one question; if you tell me the answer, then I will also tell you by what authority I do these things. ²⁵Did the baptism of John come from heaven, or was it of human origin?" And they argued with one another, "If we say, 'From heaven,' he will say to us, 'Why then did you not believe him?' ²⁶But if we say, 'Of human origin,' we are afraid of the crowd; for all regard John as a prophet." ²⁷So they answered Jesus, "We do not know." And he said to them, "Neither will I tell you by what authority I am doing these things. ²⁸"What do you think? A man had two sons; he went to the first and said, 'Son, go and work in the vineyard today.' ²⁹He answered, 'I will not'; but later he changed his mind and went. ³⁰The father went to the second and said the same; and he answered, 'I go, sir'; but he did not go. ³¹Which of the two did the will of his father?" They said, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Truly I tell you, the tax collectors and the prostitutes are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you. ³²For John came to you in the way of righteousness and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him; and even after you saw it, you did not change your minds and believe him." Sermon

The story of Jesus' encounter with the most powerful leaders in Jerusalem follows his triumphal entry on the donkey and his cleansing and occupation of the temple. As the second day of Jesus' occupation begins, the various groups oppose Jesus five more times, all meant to damage his authority. These stories are all contests where the winner gains honor and power at the loser's expense. If Jesus were to lose any of these challenges, he would be removed from the temple as a teacher, his issues with the authorities in Jerusalem would end, and the leaders would regain control of the temple. If the religious leaders win any of these challenges, there is no need to crucify him.

In this first, long challenge, Jesus' adversaries are chief priests and elders of the people. There was already suspicion about the legitimacy and authority of the priestly leaders in Jerusalem, who ruled in favor of Roman politicians. The elders, were wealthy elites and the chief priests, controlled large parcels of land in Judea and beyond, making them nearly equal with the rich, powerful landowners who are often targets of Jesus' parables.

"Who gave you this authority?" the leaders ask. Jesus currently occupies the temple, he has the upper hand, and can set the conditions for his reply. Before he will answer them, he asks them about John's baptism: "Was it from heaven or merely human?" This question puts them in a bind. They know that if they deny John's baptism the crowds will be upset and they need their support. If they say that John's baptism came from heaven, he will ask them why they did not

believe it. They answer, probably mumbling, "we don't know". They have lost. This kind of debate sounds quite familiar in our political climate. Tell the people what they want to hear whether it is true or not. Try and guess what to say in order to retain power and control.

Jesus is not done yet with the chief priests and elders of the people. He continues to teach with the Parable of the Two Sons. A father asks his sons to go and work in the vineyard. One son says he will work in the vineyard, but he doesn't. The other son says he won't, but he does. Jesus asks which one does the will of the father. They authorities believe the first son did the will of his father by saying he would and but he didn't work. They are wrong. The son who refused to work but later did work is the one who did the will of the father. Once again we witness a plot twist—whatever we expect is reversed by Jesus.

The conclusion is that "Actions speak louder than words." The point of the story is that the religious leaders of the day give God lip service, but in the end their actions don't match their words. The "sinners" don't bother with lip service, but in the end they are found to learn and be changed. They are ones who listen to John the Baptist's call to repent.

As a Christian I am often surprised by some of the people I know who say they love God will not do the work of God. Never help, volunteer....nothing. Lip service. And some of the most sinful people you could every meet are right there to lend a hand and help the neighbor out. Actions speak louder than words.

It is our nature to look for outward signs of authority—job title, education, connections to powerful people, and so on. Jesus' authority came from who he was, not from what he accomplished. Authority is not the same as power—authority is given; power is taken. Authority comes from the "author." The author being God from whom the son came

This is the hope of the gospel. The sun may set on the vineyard, but it never sets on God's grace. If we can see our need for a savior, we may ask God to guide us, and our actions may show God that we are faithful. God is our greatest authority of repentance and grace. Amen.
