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The Advent Wreath

What is the history and significance of the Advent Wreath?

The Advent wreath originated several hundred years ago among the Lutherans of central Germany, and was probably suggested by the many light symbols which were used in folklore during November and December. At that time of year, pre-Christian cultures, fearing the winter solstice (the shortest day of the year), celebrated the month of Yule (December) by placing lighted candles in a wheel, praying the god of light to turn the wheel of the earth toward the sun and lengthen the days.

The Christians in medieval times kept and Christianized many of the light and fire symbols. The evergreens (originally placed near the hearth) symbolized the everlasting life found in Christ. Bending the branches to form a circle further symbolized life without end. The candles sig-

nified God's Son as the Light of the world, and there are four (4) candles for the four (4) weeks of Advent.

Gradually, the Advent wreath became a traditional symbol reminding the faithful of the Old Testament, when humanity was "[sitting] in darkness, and in the shadow of death" (Luke 1:79); when the prophets, illumined by God, announced the coming of the Redeemer; and when the hearts of humans glowed with the desire for the Messiah (Christ). The wreath itself came to symbolize the fulfillment of time — the coming of Christ and the glory of his birth.

Why God's Word Cautions us about Debt

God cautions us from using debt because debt creates bondage to the world and prevents us from allowing God to act freely in our lives! Reverend Bill Hybels in his "Achieving Financial Freedom" audiotapes discusses reasons that God says "no" to debt:

- Debt obligates a person to earn more money and to earn it constantly. Working two or three jobs just to pay off debt is not the way to live.
- Debt enslaves a person to a creditor (Proverbs 22:7). When the creditor says, "Jump," we say, "How high?"



- Debt undermines joy. It is difficult to enjoy a weekend away or a dinner out when we are deep in debt, because money spent for those activities is money not spent on paying off credit card debt, which prolongs the problem.
- Debt erodes giving opportunities. God gives us the ability and the desire to help others. The lack of money makes it difficult to respond to God's gracious prompting.
- Debt imperils a Christian witness in two ways. First of all, we can be less effective in our evangelism when we face daily tension and anxiety over debt. Second, our witness to others suffers when they see or hear about our financial difficulty.
- Debt exaggerates character problems. Experiencing a problem with debt may reveal character weaknesses such as impatience, discontentment, a lack of self-discipline and even failure to trust in the Lord's provisions.

Before you use your credit cards, you should be slow, deliberate, and cautious. Prior to taking on debt, it is advisable to ask yourself some basic questions, such as the following:

- If I borrow, will I get something of enough value that it's worth the added obligation? Will the asset purchased appreciate in value?
- Will the taking on of debt allow me to give, save, and maintain my lifestyle?
- Have I considered giving up expensive activities and/or liquidating valuable possessions?
- † Does the borrowing fit my budget?
- Will the borrowing cause any tension or anxiety in my family?

I hope your children will be able to rehearse with us during the Sunday school hour on December 4th, 11th and 18th and to participate in the pageant during the 10:30 a.m. service on December 18th. Middle schoolers will also get a chance to tell the story at the 5:00 p.m. Christmas service and will rehearse their Living Nativity on Sunday, December 18th at 1:00 p.m. Please make plans now to make sure our young folks know the true meaning of Christmas.

Waiting in the Dark

Have you ever been awake at night when the electricity went off and everything got dark? That can be scary! It can also be a time of hope, because you know that the electricity will come back on eventually, and daylight will come again. That's what Advent is all about. The word Advent means "coming." We see things differently because Jesus came to us and will come to us again, and that fills us with hope. That's why Advent's color is blue—for hope. It could also be purple—reminding us that Jesus is a royal king.

On the "New Year's Day" of the church—the first Sunday of Advent—we start using a different series of Bible readings in worship. Some years we read from the book of Matthew, the next year we use Mark, and then we use Luke. The Gospel of John is used every year.

Advent is a time of waiting. Sometimes the four weeks of Advent seem like a long time, but that time can help us remember that there is more to Christmas than shopping for Christmas presents! Some people light a candle on each of the four Sundays of Advent, both at church and at home. Some people use Advent calendars to count the days until Christmas. Some people drill holes in a log, one for each day before Christmas, and put a candle in each hole. One candle is lit each day. Sometimes Advent carols are sung, and prayers for those who are homeless or hungry are shared. Why not try some of these ideas in your home this year? Jesus came to save us all!

A LONG JOURNEY

Then the sky filled with angels who sang songs praising God and announced peace to God's people on earth. What a sight that first Christmas was!



Artist, businessman and friend of Luther

IN 1520 LUCAS CRANACH THE ELDER WAS, BY ALL ACCOUNTS, A

SUCCESS. He had been serving the court of Frederick the Wise for 14 years. His works of art had become so famous that he moved his personal studio, with several apprentices, into the town of Wittenberg. He had expanded into pursuits of real estate and small business. Cranach was active in local politics, having just been elected to Wittenberg's city council the previous year. Things were, however, about to change for the artist-entrepreneur. In the wake of the death of Emperor Maximillian, which made the political climate for reformers more dangerous, Frederick and Court Secretary George Spalatin decided that Martin Luther's face needed to be presented before the people so that he might become a household name. Cranach was the man who brought Luther's face to the people. Most of the images we have of the reformer came from his brush.

While some reformers, like Zwingli, mistakenly believed that religious art and paintings were against the Ten Commandments, Luther embraced the responsible use of the arts in the church. While Luther, Melanchthon and others led the charge of the Reformation with their writings, Cranach aided the cause through the use of images, specifically paintings and woodcuts. Cranach and Luther grew close when they became colleagues in the publication of Luther's writings and pamphlets, most notably his Small Catechism and German translation of the Bible. Be it children's textbooks or scathing propaganda against the papacy, Cranach provided visual representations of Luther's thought.

More than just a colleague, Cranach became an important part of Luther's personal life. When Luther required homes for refugee nuns, Cranach provided housing. Later, when Luther married one of the escaping nuns, Katherina von Bora, Cranach was a witness at the wedding. As time went on, Luther and Cranach served as godparents for each other's children.

Cranach's lasting appeal is multifaceted. Not only is he remembered for his pictorial contribution to the Lutheran Reformation, but he is also lauded by the art community for his late-Renaissance "Wittenberg" style of painting. He painted, for many patrons, a variety of subjects including Catholic saints and Greek myths. Today his paintings and altar pieces grace museums all over the world. He accomplished all of this while engaged in politics and enterprise. In addition to working under Frederick the Wise he also served the Saxon Court under John the Steadfast and John Frederick the Magnanimous. His loyalty was unquestionable; he followed John Frederick into exile in 1547. Painter, businessman and friend, Cranach was a man who exemplified Luther's doctrine of vocation: that all stations in life are necessary for society and are God-pleasing.







New Year Resolutions

n chapter 4, beginning with verse 13, James talks about our planning. He reminds us that our lives and plans and futures are in God's hands, and that we should pray, "If it is the Lord's will, we will live and do this or that" (verse 15). With that preface, then, we can begin to do some self-evaluation of how we can best spend our time, abilities, and resources. A new year can provide a new resolve and commitment to do many things in a new and better way. We may find that our priorities are a little skewed.



Our lifestyles could possibly use some redirection, and a New Year's resolution based on God's plan for us could be what we need.
