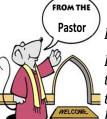

Beloved Partners in Ministry,

Ever since Easter Sunday, we have been hearing about the surprising things God was doing in people's lives and through the early church throughout the book of Acts. If the empty tomb on Easter is the biggest surprise in the book, the Day of Pentecost is a close second. The disciples are once again together in one place. This has become

their default, to gather together to worship, to pray, and to eat. As they spend time together, the Spirit breaks in disrupting their lives, empowering them to go back out into the world to share the gospel.

The pouring out of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost set in motion all the surprises that follow in the book of Acts:

- Peter becoming emboldened to preach the gospel in the face of imprisonment, persecution, and even death;
- Paul, being converted from persecutor to witness;
- God's kingdom and table being opened up to the Gentiles and others who used to be excluded;
- communities being restored to life and being given new hope in the resurrection of Jesus.

The same Spirit that was at work in the early church 2,000 year ago is still at work today, in our churches and in our communities. As we spend time together each week, we too are empowered by God's Spirit, fed with God's word, and sent back out to share God's love with the world. When we open ourselves to the Spirit at work, we too will be surprised by what God is doing in the world.

God's love itself is surprising. God continues to love us despite our disobedience, our distance, and our shortcomings. God's love is forgiving and unconditional. We have the example of Jesus' life to show us how to love like this. We must surprise others with our love. We are invited to love others, even when that love may not be returned. We are invited to love others, even if it may be inconvenient for us. We are invited to love others, no matter what.

We are in this together. God's surprising love has been poured out into our hearts. God's Spirit has been shared with us, that we might be empowered to go where God leads, loving the world, as God loves us.

From our Parish Nurse

#### **10 HEALTHY HABITS**

- 1. YOU WALK EVERY DAY—Whether it's through the grocery store, around the block, or on a treadmill, you know every single step counts. Hitting the road regularly benefits your heart, relieves stress, and burns calories.
- 2. YOU SAY THANK YOU—Studies show that expressing gratitude can help you feel better about your life, improve your relationships, and even help you avoid getting sick.
- 3. YOU SPEND TIME WITH OTHERS—Yes, being social is a sign of good health. People who have plenty of personal relationships are more likely to be healthier overall and even live longer.
- 4. YOU COOK AT HOME—Studies show that people who cook at home eat fewer calories and carbs and less fat than those who eat out more frequently.
- 5. YOU SPEND TIME OUTDOORS—Research shows that people who live in "greener" areas live longer, have improved mental health, move more, and feel more socially connected with others.
- 6. YOU'VE DITCHED SUGARY SODA—Great job—you've improved your heart health, lowered your blood pressure, and even reduced your risk of serious health issues like type 2 diabetes. Plus, you have avoided all those extra calories and sugar grams that can lead to weight gain.
- 7. YOU MAKE SLEEP A PRIORITY—If you get 7 to 9 hours of sleep per night, you meet the recommended amount for ages 18 to 60. This helps lower your odds of developing long-term conditions like diabetes, high blood pressure, heart disease, stroke and depression.
- 8. YOU SEE YOUR DOCTOR REGULARLY—See your primary care doctor regularly to get an overall view of your vital health numbers, like blood sugar, blood pressure, cholesterol, and weight. Plus it's also crucial to see your doctor for cancer screenings, immunizations, and vaccines as needed. Don't forget to see your dentist, dermatologist, and eye doctor regularly also.
- 9. YOU STAY OUT OF THE SUN—Soaking up rays (either from the sun or indoor tanning booths) has been definitively linked to an increased chance of skin cancer, not to mention wrinkles and sun spots.
- 10. YOU LOOK ON THE BRIGHT SIDE—Your positive attitude lowers your odds of depression and cardiovascular disease and even helps you live longer.

## PENTECOST OFFERING – JUNE 9

Each year on Pentecost Sunday we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit, and the birth of the Church. Our congregation, along with many others across our denomination also receives the Pentecost Special Offering. A gift to the Pentecost Offering helps the church encourage, develop, and support its young people, and also addresses the needs of at-risk children. Sixty percent (60%) is used to support ministries of the Presbyterian Mission Agency: the Young Adult Volunteer (YAV) program, ministries for youth and for children at risk. Forty percent (40%) of what we receive for the Pentecost offering is used at the discretion of the church to make an impact in the lives of young people where they see fit.

This year, we will be sharing our portion with a mission of Eastminster Presbytery and the National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon (NESSL). NESSL supports schools in Lebanon that provide education for children who have been displaced by the war in Syria, many of whom fled the country before ever receiving any formal education. Our presbytery has sent two teams of volunteers to Lebanon to learn about and experience what these schools are doing and the ministry of the church in Lebanon and Syria. Enclosed in this issue of the *Church Mouse* you will also find a flyer about the continuing partnership between our churches.
