Reflection on All Saints' Day

The First of November is home to a well-known Feast—All Saints' Day. It is a day in which we remember all the saints who have gone before us in the faith; which makes it a day, for many, of mixed emotions. The Hymn *For all the Saints* (LSB 677) sings these beautiful words, "For all the saints who from their labors rest, Who Thee by faith before the world confessed, Thy name, O Jesus, be forever blest. Alleluia!"



This phrase gives me pause as I reflect for November on the Last Day, specifically my last day. Everything we do as Christians confesses something. As Christians, it is important to confess that it is the name of the Lord who is to be treasured above all else. To this end, it behooves us to reflect on what do we do with our last confession to the world; namely, funerals and burial. It is not an easy subject, or even a fun one. The world spends the whole month of October confessing its own trepid, disgusting, and fearful ideas of death, and what happens after death. Should we as Christians not boldly confess the truth? It is encouraging to celebrate the Reformation on October 31 (where we rejoice in boldly confessing the true Word of God), and then celebrate All Saints' Day on November

1 (where we rejoice in what this Wordmade flesh has done for God's people).

Newsletter articles are supposed to be sort-of short, so let me get to the point. What we do in our funeral services is a confession. What we do with our bodies, after our death, is a confession. To hear a great presentation on this you can check out a Talk and Tastings Event hosted by Rev. Does God care? Do others care? What is your confession? A few thoughts to consider: Romans 15:4 declares, "Whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, that through endurance and through the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope." What does the Old Testament have to say?

Abraham makes a big point to buy a burial plot, and in fact this is the first mention of land purchase in the Bible. The first land purchase is a tomb! That is rather significant. Abraham paid a high price for the land, and paid great attention to detail at this last confession. It is on this land, his family will also be buried with their wives (Abraham & Sarah, Isaac & Rebekah, Jacob & Leah). Jacob also makes a point to bury his wife Rachel after she dies during childbirth. These can found in Genesis 23; 35:29; 49:29-33; 50:25; Exodus 13:19; 1 Samuel 10:2; and Hebrews 11:22. Moses is buried by God for important reasons, see Deuteronomy 34:6 and Jude 1:9. The Kings are mentioned of honor in burial Ahaz-2 Chronicles 28:27; Hezekiah 2 Chronicles 32:33; Josiah-2 Chronicles 35:24; and Abijah 1 Kings 14:12-12. The New Testament confesses both Jesus and John the Baptist were buried.

On the other side of the coin, the Old Testament speaks of the horror that is associated with no burial. In Deuteronomy 28:25-26, God uses no burial as Divine Punishment. This happens to King Jeroboam (1 Kings 14:10-11), and Jezebel (1 Kings 21:23 and 2 Kings 9:30-37).

Not only is burial the honorable practice in the Old Testament, but God issues Divine Punishment by burning. Leviticus 20:14 and 21:9 give examples, as well as Joshua 7:25, 1 Kings 13:2, 2 Kings 23, and Amos 2:1-2.

Historically speaking, cremation is a relatively recent practice, and there is no cremation in Christian cultures through the 18th Century. The first cremation in America was 1876 in Pennsylvania. The person who was cremated was Joseph Henry Louis Charles, Baron de Palm. He was heavily influenced by Eastern philosophy and fancied himself as a freethinker. He was part of the Theosophist society, a group that believes there is a great connectivity throughout the world by wisdom and/or God. It confesses both karma and reincarnation. To that end, as part of his last confession, he had texts read from Charles Darwin at his funeral. He also requested that his body be disposed of "in a fashion that would illustrate the Eastern notions of death and immortality." In other words, he wanted reincarnation, so his body had to be destroyed quickly for him not to be bound to his current life and he could "move-on."

The practice of cremation has thus since evolved, and many Christians are today considering this practice. They are not freethinkers like the Baron of Palm, nor are they doing in an effort to test God's ability to see if He really can raise even the ashes.

The more common questions that get raised are cost, and space. These are other lengthy discussions that can and must be had, but for this article, it is getting rather lengthy.

I urge you to study and seriously think about your last confession. You give your day-to-day confession much time, it makes sense our final confession gets some prayer-filled time. Death is the unnatural separation of body and soul. The return of the body to dust is God's judgment. It seems unwise by worldly, man-made, means to speed up His judgment (by cremation), or slow-down His judgment (by embalming). Iowa state law does not require embalming if the funeral is done within a certain period of time.

You has body and soul, have been set aside by God as His temple to do special work in His Kingdom by being His child. You are important to Him. Christ has defeated death and, we confess with St. Paul, "Our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ, who will transform our lowly body to be like his glorious body, by the power that enables him even to subject all things to himself. Therefore, my brothers, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm thus in the Lord, my beloved." (Philippians 3:20-4:1)

What is the best way to confess this saving truth to the world? Not to be conformed to the earthly way of thinking, but to gloriously and boldly proclaim, to confess before the world the Name of Jesus be forever blest. How can we rightly practice our confession in the resurrection of the body and the life everlasting? May God grant us His wisdom!

From earth's wise bounds, from ocean's farthest coast, Through gates of pear streams in the countless host, Singing to Father, Son, and Holy Ghost: Alleluia! (For All the Saints LSB 677:8)

St. Paul wrote to the Church of Christ in Corinth: “Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver” (2 Cor 9:7). God loves a cheerful giver. But who is a cheerful giver?

Abel was. By faith, Abel gave the firstborn of his flock, and it was acceptable in God’s sight. Abraham was. By faith, Abraham prepared cakes and a tender choice calf for God and entertained angels unaware. So also were David and Solomon. By faith, David would not make a sacrifice to God that cost him nothing, so he paid Araunah his due. By faith, Solomon built a house for God, where his name would dwell and thereby where He would dwell to be Israel’s God and they His people.

What more shall I say? For time would fail me to tell of all those who gave not simply for the joy of giving but for the joy of knowing the One to whom they gave.

So also our Lord, who for the joy set before Him, gave everything, yes, even His life, enduring the cross and scorning its shame. He gave to the shedding of His blood, willingly and resolutely setting His face toward Jerusalem to die for the life of the world. Though He was rich in every way, He became poor, so that by His poverty we might be rich beyond measure.

So then, let us – like Abel and Abraham, like David and Solomon, and even like our Lord Jesus Christ – give cheerfully to God for the work of His kingdom in our midst. Like them, let us decide in our heart – for the joy set before us – the joy of knowing the One to whom we give is the One who gives us all good things.

We will be collecting at this time until the end of November. You may place your donations in the entryway by the clock.


