## Sarasota Film Festival starts March 31



While there's a limited amount of info we can share about the Festival, we do have these news items. Ringling College of Art and Design student Tyler Mathis had his artwork selected for the Sarasota Film Festival. There will be three images representing the festival this year with a multi dimensional play on words; "See and Be Seen", "Sea and Be Seen" and "See and be Scene."

The annual **Through Women's Eyes Film Festival** (TWE) is back at Regal Hollywood 20 in Sarasota. TWE set record attendance levels last year. And for good reason — they present the best in new, groundbreaking films by established and emerging filmmakers from around the world. In 2016,

TWE received a record 500 film submissions from 37 countries. Last year they also had record attendance at TWE, screening 25

films — eight feature length and 17 shorts. The films were written, directed or produced by women and feature brave and heroic stories of extraordinary women.

The Gulf Coast Chapter of UNIFEM and Through Women's Eyes continues its partnership with the Sarasota Film Festival. TWE's films will be shown on April 1 and 2. Check WCW in April to see the complete film guide for TWE.

Together, TWE and SFF have 35 years of experience presenting domestic and international films that entertain, inform, challenge and inspire. Through this partnership, the two non-profit groups hope to again broaden and enrich the film festival experience for both filmgoers and filmmakers.

TWE is a volunteer organization and all proceeds from ticket purchases turn into donations to the US National Committee and UN Women. Ticket prices and film listings will soon be available at www. throughwomenseyes.com.
