What is Normal?

My first ministry position out of seminary was serving as a Campus Minister at Illinois State and Illinois Wesleyan Universities. My office was across the street from a large dorm on the ISU campus in Normal. But I lived in Bloomington (Bloomington-Normal are twin cities). I liked to say that I lived "just south of Normal."

Geographic humor aside, I have been thinking a bit about the concept of "normal." We talk about "getting back to normal," or "the new normal." As far as churches go, there was at one time a fairly standard way of doing things, but that has not really been the case for a long time. Each congregation is different – the context is different, traditions and customs may be unique and beliefs and practices and emphases can vary. This is true even for churches of the same denomination or religious tradition.

What is interesting to me is that out of the churches I am familiar with and clergy I have interacted with online, every church seems to be proceeding through this pandemic a little differently. Our church met entirely via Zoom for 6 months. During that time, our attendance actually increased and about 25% of our virtual congregation lives outside of Ames – most of those out of state. Most of the out of town folks have a history and connections to our church, but we have also had first time visitors who live out of town.

We never would have imagined this scenario. And I am not sure what normal will be like going forward, or if "normal" is even that helpful of a designation. (As I have said before, "normal" is overrated.) I do know that even in the midst of a lot of pain and uncertainty, there have nevertheless been many joyful moments, and God has been at work. That is one thing we can count on.

On September 20, we met for worship outside. It was so good to be together and see one another in person! Air hugs are not the same as actual hugs, but it was still good. That morning, we had about 30% of worshipers on the front lawn and 70% on Zoom. The "hybrid" approach seemed to work, and we will continue with Hybrid Worship through October as the weather allows. This Sunday, October 4, will be too cold (so we will be Zoom only), but we anticipate more outdoors services this month.

Even in such unusual circumstances, God's work goes forward. Church School classes are meeting by phone or video. Our Stewardship campaign will go forward virtually. The CROP Walk will be DIY rather than a large group experience. Our regional gathering and AMOS gatherings continue, online. The Christian Education Committee is planning an online "Fun Freaky Friday Fall Festival." And we continue to look for ways to care for one another, share the gospel, and work for justice in our community.

We do not endorse candidates but rather ask candidates to endorse our efforts as an organization. This is a chance to build relationships so that regardless of who wins in the election, we can continue to work for the good of our community.

Voting Information

Did you know that when our nation was founded, the vast majority of people were not eligible to vote? Voting is a hard-earned right and we encourage everyone to exercise your right to vote as an act of Christian citizenship and as a participant in our democracy. In this time of pandemic, voting is more difficult. Here is some helpful information:

Voter Registration: You may register to vote

- 1. by calling your county auditor's office and requesting the registration application or
- 2. requesting online to have the registration application to be mailed to you, or
- 3. if you have an Iowa driver's license or DOT issued ID, you can register electronically.
- 4. You can register to vote on Election Day. More info
- 5. The Ames Public Library has copies of Story County Voter Registration Forms available.

The deadline to register by mail or online is October 24th; in person until and including November 3rd.

Absentee Ballots: All registered voters were sent a ballot request form. You may also request a form from your county auditor or download a form from the Story County auditor here. The request must be filled out correctly and completely to be valid. You must use your full and complete name as shown on your Driver's License / State ID or on your voter card.

The completed ballot requests may be returned in person to your County Auditor or by mail. The actual ballots will be sent out by mail on October 5. If you return your voted ballot by mail, your ballot must be postmarked by November 2, 2020. Completed absentee ballots returned to the Auditor's office in person must be received on Election Day (November 3, 2020) no later than the close of polls (9:00 p.m.).

Early Voting: Begins October 5, every Monday-Friday 8 am - 4:30 pm at the County Auditor's Office in the Administration Building, 900 6th St in Nevada.

Satellite Voting: Ames Public Library, October 10, 17, 24 and 31, 9 am - 4 pm Scheman Building Room 004, October 12, 13, 19, and 21, 9 am - 4 pm
