LOVING THE "UNLOVABLES"

(Act. 10: 25-26, 34-35, 44-48; Ps. 98:1-4; 1 John 4:7-10; John 15: 9-17)

"Love comes through me; Which will set you free I will give you all my love; That was sent as a gift from above

Love comes through you; That is always new You come up with the sweetest things; And I know we can handle whatever love brings

Love comes through each one of us; That makes us a must I don't think I'd make it without you; And your love so very true."

If you were to be questioned about what you really need in life, I suppose your answers would vary. But when you come to think of it, what you ultimately need in life is nothing, but "happiness." It is happiness that brings you true joy. True happiness can only be derived, not from material things, but from the sacrifices you and I make. Thus, Jesus reveals to us, "I have told you this so that My joy may be in you and your joy might be complete." What does Jesus tell us to do? He tells us to keep His commandments - to love God with all our hearts, with all our soul and with all our strength, and to love our neighbor as ourselves. It is only when we genuinely love God and neighbor that your joy and mine can be assured. It is in that vein that St. John, in today's second reading, exhorts you and me, "Beloved, let us love one another, because love is of God; everyone who loves is begotten by God and knows God." As Christians, our love of God and one another must go far beyond words and "feeling of affection."

Sadly, this doesn't always happen in a Christian community. As the early Church was growing in number, so also the challenges it was facing grew. The context of the account in today's first reading is the controversy that arose in the early Church over whether or not the Gentiles who were not circumcised could be brought into the community of faith. Peter had earlier supported circumcision as criteria for joining the faith community, and had argued that the Gentiles who did not practice circumcision could not be accepted into the community of believers. Paul, on the other hand, had argued all along that Christianity should not depend on the circumcision of the flesh, but rather on circumcision (purification) of the heart. He was so convincing that he made Peter realized that everyone has a chance to come to Christ and that anyone who accepts Jesus' commandment is welcomed to be baptized into His Church. Paul is absolutely right because Jesus Himself said, "You are My friends if you do what I command you. I no longer call you slaves...I have called you friends..."

It took a while, but Peter finally realized that "love is of God" and it goes beyond race, color of the skin, ideology, status and language. "In truth, I see that God shows no partiality. Rather, in every nation whoever fears Him and acts uprightly is acceptable to Him." You and I must know that Christian love is a sacrificial love for "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends." The only way we can show that we love God is by loving our fellow brothers and sisters. Love is like a plant, which must be cared for daily; otherwise it withers. Jesus has chosen you and me, and has commanded us to love even those we think are "uncircumcised" – the "unlovable."



ASCENSION THURSDAY (May 17th)



The fortieth day after Easter Sunday, commemorates the Ascension of Christ into heaven, according to Mark 16:19, Luke 24:51, and Acts 1:2.


In the Eastern Church this feast was known as *analepsis*, the taking up, and also as the *episozomene*, the salvation, denoting that by ascending into His glory Christ completed the work of our redemption. The terms used in the West,

ascensio and, occasionally, ascensa, signify that Christ was raised up by His own powers. Tradition designates Mount Olivet near Bethany as the place where Christ left the earth. The feast falls on Thursday. It is one of the Ecumenical feasts ranking with the feasts of the Passion, of Easter, and of Pentecost among the most solemn in the calendar, has a vigil and, since the fifteenth century, an octave which is set apart for a novena of preparation for Pentecost, in accordance with the directions of Leo XIII.

Although the place of the Ascension is not distinctly stated, it would appear from the Acts that it was Mount Olivet. Since after the Ascension, the disciples are described as returning to Jerusalem from the mount that is called *Olivet*, which is near Jerusalem, within a Sabbath day's journey. Tradition has consecrated this site as the Mount of Ascension and Christian piety has memorialized the event by erecting over the site a basilica. St. Helena built the first memorial, which was destroyed by the Persians in 614, rebuilt in the eighth century, to be destroyed again, but rebuilt a second time by the crusaders. This the Moslems also destroyed, leaving only the octagonal structure which encloses the stone said to bear the imprint of the feet of Christ, that is now used as an oratory.

Not only is the fact of the Ascension related in the passages of Scripture cited above, but it is also elsewhere predicted and spoken of as an established fact. Thus, in John 6:63, Christ asks the Jews: "If then you shall see the son of Man ascend up where He was before?" and 20:17, He says to Mary Magdalene: "Do not touch Me, for I am not yet ascended to My Father, but go to My brethren, and say to them: I ascend to My Father and to your Father, to My God and to your God." Again, in Ephesians 4:8-10, and in Timothy 3:16, the Ascension of Christ is spoken of as an accepted fact.

The language used by the Evangelists to describe the Ascension must be interpreted according to usage. To say that He was taken up or that He ascended does not necessarily imply that they locate heaven directly above the earth; no more than the words "sitteth on the right hand of God" mean that this is His actual posture. In disappearing from their view "He was raised up and a cloud received Him out of their sight" (Acts 1:9), and entering into glory He dwells with the Father in the honor and power denoted by the scripture phrase.



ASCENSION THURSDAY MASS TIMES: This Thursday, May 17th, we celebrate the Feast of the Ascension of the Lord, a Holy Day of Obligation. The Mass schedule will be as follows: Wednesday, May 16th, at 7:30 p.m.; and *Ascension Thursday*, May 17th, at 7 a.m., 9 a.m., 12 Noon & 7:30 p.m.
