## Valentine's Day Fun Facts

#### St. Valentine wasn't just one person.

There's one Valentine who was a priest in third century Rome who defied a ban on marriage, illegally marrying couples until he was caught and sentenced to death. Another legend suggests another Valentine was killed for attempting to help Christians escape prison in Rome.

#### Cupid has its roots in Greek

**mythology.** The charming cherub that appears on Valentine's Day cards can be traced back to 700 BC and the Greek god Eros. This handsome, immortal man had the power to make people fall in love. It wasn't until 4<sup>th</sup> century BCE the Romans adopted Eros into an image of a cute little boy with a bow and arrow.

Mass-produced valentines didn't go out until the 1840s. People started exchanging cards and handwritten letters to both lovers and friends during the 17<sup>th</sup> century, but it was in the 1840s the first Valentine's Day cards were mass-produced in the U.S. Esther A. Howland is credited with commercializing Valentine's Day cards.

Americans send out 145 million Valentine's Day cards each year. And that's not even counting all the cards kids exchange at school! This makes Valentine's Day the second biggest holiday for exchanging cards after Christmas. Needless to say, we've come a long way since Hallmark produced the first Valentine's Day card in 1913.
