

Free rides to COVID-19 vaccination appointments

Laketran continues to provide free transportation to any resident in need of a ride to a COVID-19 vaccination appointment in Lake County or to the mass vaccination site at the Cleveland State University Wolstein Center that operates through early May.

Residents can use Laketran's Local Routes or door-to-door Diala-Ride service. For Dial-a-Ride service, customers must schedule a reservation by calling 440-354-6100. Reservations for Dial-a-Ride can be made a minimum of one day in advance and up to 12 days prior to an appointment. Laketran will remain onsite with the customer for the entire trip. For drive-thru sites, Laketran will transport residents through the entire vaccine process and return them home safely.

Residents who prefer to take Laketran's Local Routes 1-9 can call Laketran Customer Service at 440-354-6100 and request four bus passes to get to their appointments.

Laketran is also providing free transportation to Cleveland State University's Wolstein Center vaccination distribution Monday-Friday between 8:15 a.m. and 6:30 p.m. from Laketran's Transit Center at Lakeland Community College. The last daily departure from Lake County to Cleveland is 4:15 p.m. In order to maintain social distancing onboard, reservations to travel downtown are required by calling Laketran at least one day in advance at 440-354-6100.

Lake County Mobile Food Pantry continues through May

May registration for the Lake County Mobile Food Pantry is now open. Lake County seniors 60 and over may register for one pick-up per month by calling Lifeline, Inc. at 2-1-1 or Lake County Council on Aging at 440-205-8111. Preregistration is required and is limited to 60 spots per location.

Laketran provides transportation to a Lake County Mobile Food Pantry site free of charge. Call Laketran Customer Service at 440-354-6100 to arrange transportation to your grocery pick-up.

At some point, the utility companies will be able to disconnect service, the cost of food will skyrocket, collection activity/harassment will increase dramatically and so will stress caused illness. If you are one of the many people, whose bottom is about to fall out there is still hope. Do not allow yourself to lose your health (or, maybe, even your life over financial stress) because if that happens you will not be able to fix your life. If you are healthy and maintain right thinking you will come out of this OK. I have seen it work thousands of time. Audubon Satifies Curiosity About Coyotes - Virtual Program May 18th


Blackbrook Audubon will foster a greater understanding for coyotes in a virtual program at 7:00 p.m. Tuesday, May 18. Cleveland Metroparks Wildlife Ecologist Jon Cepek will present "Eastern Coyotes: Facts and Fiction." Everyone is invited to register on the event page at blackbrookaudubon.org to receive a link to the program in an email.

Cepek will describe the ecology and behavior of the Eastern Coyote, Canis latrans, as well as their interactions with humans and pets using information based on Cleveland Metroparks research and national studies. He will answer

questions about coyotes to help viewers understand the facts and correct the fiction about the highly adaptable coyote.

While the program starts at 7:00 p.m., Trevor Wearstler, the host and president of Blackbrook, will allow people into the meeting about 6:30 p.m. to familiarize themselves with the software features or to chat with other attendees.



Lake County Title Bureaus in Mentor and Open for Walk-in Customers Wickliffe Now

Effective Monday, April 5, 2021, the Lake County Title Bureaus located in Mentor and Wickliffe will be opening to walk-in customers between the hours of 8:00AM to 4:30PM Monday through Friday and 8:00AM to 12:00PM on Saturdays. Passport service will continue to be by appointment only Monday through Friday between the hours of 8:00AM and 4:30PM.

Following consultation with the Lake County General Health District and the continuing decline in Covid-19 cases in the county, the Lake County Title District from best practices Bureaus will be reopening to the public. To maintain compliance with local, state, and federal guidelines regarding Coivd-19, there will be a limit to the number of people allowed into the building at any one time, and other safety precautions shall remain in place.

A list of the guidelines will be posted on the doors of the buildings as well as on the website of the Lake County Clerk of Courts. This list was created in collaboration with the Lake County General Health established across Lake County and the region.

"When I took office, the Title Bureaus were essentially closed to the people. We have worked diligently with Ron Graham, Lake County General Health District, to slowly and safely reopen to the public. Since opening by appointment only two months ago, we have experienced a steady increase in demand for title and passport services. It is time to open back up to the people as we prepare to enter the summer months.
