2017 is moving through the first quarter, it seems, in record time. We've had outstanding attendance at our first two monthly luncheon meetings and expect that to continue and hopefully grow each month.

Part of that is due to the work of our calling captains who are

making calls (some use email) a little earlier than we had been doing last year. We also give them advance notice of who will be our program speaker so they can inform their member list. We continue to offer thanks to our calling captains for the work they do each month.

The MCRMC Veterans/Military Affairs Committee

The MCRMC Veterans Committee has studied several possibilities for action and settled on three initiatives to start with. They are prioritized below:



Priority 1. Moore County List of Agencies Helping Those in Need & NC4Vets:

In our meetings with persons who work with Veterans in MC, we learned that there are two publications that can be extremely useful to MC Veterans. We also learned there is limited awareness of these publications among Veterans, and also limited distribution. The Committee is currently working to address both of these shortcomings.

The first tool, the "Moore County List of Agencies Helping Those in Need (The List)" includes 60 +/-

agencies to provide food, assistance with utility bills, shelter (for homeless and abused,) health care, job seeking, etc.

The plan is to find an entity to assume responsibility for regular updates to the "The List." We will seek a more condensed format, and a source for periodic printing of copies to be distributed by the Veterans Office, in Carthage, and MC Veteran Organizations.

The Committee will also seek support from local media to broaden awareness of "The List. "among Veterans. The possibility of having the list included in local telephone books is being investigated.

NC4VETS is a 132 page publication, in magazine format, of The NC Department of Military and Veteran Affairs. It is filled with information useful to the total spectrum of Veterans. Their credo is "If there is a Service out there for Veterans, we want to connect them to it."

The extensive contents covers Employment, VA Benefits, Healthcare, Education, Homeless (to housing), Personal Services, Women's Services and Active Military.

NC4VETS will be promoted in a similar fashion to "The List," and distributed in the Veterans Office in Carthage, as well as other locations easily accessible to Moore County Veterans.

<u>Priority 2.</u> Increased Demand For Veteran Services in Moore County:

The Committee has learned the Moore County Veterans Office has, since 2008, experienced substantial increases in claims filed, while its budget has shrunk over the same period; and staff has remained virtually static.

The Committee will continue data gathering and present its findings and recommendations to the Executive Committee.

Priority 3. Moore County Veterans Court:

Several NC counties have organized successful Veterans Courts. The Committee shall continue to gather information on the purpose and results of the more highly-regarded NC Veterans Courts.

We will study their structure, and explore the possibilities of replicating a Veterans Court in Moore County, based on "best practices" of currently operating Veterans Courts in North Carolina.

February Luncheon Meeting Report

President Jim Lexo called the meeting to order at noon and asked Chaplain Bruce Carlson to open with a prayer. Chaplain Carlson offered the following:


Joining us at our February meeting was Bruce McKay of Dominion energy, a gas and power producing and transport company. He was there for a matter that is in the spirit of our Community in Action series of speakers.

He made a few short remarks and answered attendee's questions. McKay updated the membership on the status of the Atlantic Coast Pipeline (ACP), a proposed \$5 billion pipeline that would deliver natural gas from West Virginia to Eastern North Carolina. He said, "North Carolina relies largely on a single major interstate pipeline, TRANSCO, for most of its natural gas. ACP will deliver an abundant new supply of affordable natural gas to a region that is currently constrained."

The project is now in the permitting process. With pipeline protests increasingly in the news nationwide it is important that community leaders are aware of the importance of getting such projects approved and constructed for the betterment of our communities' economic futures. He asked that we provide support by contacting Federal regulators to encourage them to issue permits on a timely basis. To file a supportive comment that will go to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission as well as to your elected officials you can simply go to www.energysure.com and click on the "take action" button in the upper right hand corner. You can select from a variety of pre-written messages. It is very easy to do.

Our featured after lunch speaker was our own member and VP Programs, Patrick (Pat) Haggerty. Haggerty warmed up the attendees by opening his talk with several humorous political jokes. He then held up a bottle and showed how to make a Molotov cocktail, comparing Donald



He recalled that Bush was elected in 2000 with a Republican Congress, but not much changed. Then Obama was elected in 2008 on an agenda of stopping two wars and fixing the economy, but Obama proceeded on his private agenda of renewable energy and ObamaCare. In his talk, he later said that Congress will not repeal ObamaCare until a replacement is ready. That replacement will most probably include children being able to stay on their parents insurance until age 26 and pre-existing conditions will be allowed. I also suggested that interstate sales of heart insurance will be allowed.

Along comes Hillary after 8 years of Obama as a deeply flawed candidate who does not "connect" well with the average voter.

Haggerty reviewed what Trump has accomplished in his first 30 day, including visiting 4 foreign heads of state, 25.1 million Twitter followers (Haggerty explained that Trump tweets for the same reason FDR has the fireside chats and Reagan had his addresses to the nation from the oval office. It eliminates reporters, editors, producers, etc. It connects the Prez directly to the people, no middle man), 24 executive orders, a supreme court nominee, cancelling TPP and wanting to re-negotiate NAFTA. Haggerty also added that Trump should not pick fights he cannot win such as calling a sitting judge, a "so called judge" as well as picking a fight with Civil Rights Icon, Congressman John Lewis.

To get things done in DC, "Trump, Paul Ryan and Mitch McConnell have sat down all area agreed, DC is a like a three legged stool, the House the Senate and the Prez must work together or NOTHING will happen", explained Haggerty.

Next, Haggerty looked ahead to the 2018 elections where all 435 Members of the House are up for election and 33 Senators are up for re-election. Ten of those 33 are Democrats that are from states the Trump won.

Haggerty warned that Trump needs a filter or editor for his un-scripted public statements and tweets. "He is going to say something wrong or stupid and there will be consequences," he said.

He commented that the Mexican border wall was not possible, as much of the land in Texas is privately held, there are mountains in AZ that simply can't accommodate a wall. etc. However, border security will be increased with drones, cameras, etc.

Haggerty predicted that Supreme Court Nominee Neal Gorsuch will probably be confirmed with 60 or so votes. However, the Dems in the Senate will be VERY careful about the process because they know the next vacant seat will be a conservative replacing a Liberal. In four years Trump might have 3 seats to fill and shape the court for the next 25 years. Many voters cited this as one of the reasons they voted for Trump.

In closing, after taking questions, Haggerty said, "I said earlier that Donald Trump is Molotov Cocktail thrown at downtown Washington, DC. Think of it

another way, on November 8, 2016, America got its Bastille Day, and nobody got hurt."

Adviser Hails Trump as Party's New Reagan

Stephen Moore told Congressional Republican leaders

shortly after last November's election that they no longer belong to the conservative party of Ronald



Reagan they now are now part of Donald Trump's "populist working class party."

An economic adviser to Trump during his presidential campaign, Moore was the keynote speaker for the Moore County Republican Party's

fourth annual Ronald Reagan Day Dinner

(Attendees move from the registration to a reception area for refreshments and



social time before dinner)

Monday — the late president's birthday – at the Pinehurst Country Club. Moore's appearance attracted a full house.

Despite his post-election assessment, Moore told his Moore County audience that Trump and Reagan have much in common.

"Donald Trump is a visionary," he said. "That is what you need in a president. Ronald Reagan was a visionary."

Moore, who said he has been involved in politics for more than 35 years, said he has not seen any other politicians "who understood the mood of the voters and could read it" like Reagan and Trump.

"Trump got it," Moore said. "He saw something out there that no one else saw."

Moore is the Distinguished Visiting Fellow, Project for Economic Growth at the Heritage Foundation. He is founder of the Club for Growth and served as president of that group from 1999-2004. He is a former member of The Wall Street Journal editorial board.

He said during his address that he believes Trump "is going to deliver" on his campaign promises to turn the country around following eight years under President Obama in which the country is "more polarized than it has ever been" and race relations are at "an all-time low."

"The tragedy of this presidency is that everything went in the wrong direction," he said. "Donald Trump is a reaction to eight years of Barack Obama. Who created Donald Trump? Barrack Obama."

Moore acknowledged that Obama began his presidency eight years ago with a much higher approval rating, 74 percent compared with 46 percent for Trump. He said even some of Obama's detractors wanted to see him succeed after the election was over.

He said that for Trump to be able to govern affectively, he needs to have "half the country behind

him," which would give him more credibility in dealing with the Republican-controlled Congress.

"I want to see Donald Trump pull this country together," he said. "I am sick of this polarization. ... If he succeeds, Donald Trump will be one of the most popular presidents in history."

Moore, who has spent much of his career advocating for tax and spending cuts and free trade, said Trump has to start with cutting taxes and that it should be immediate — not next year. He said that if were writing Trump's first State of the Union address, he would "demand Congress send me a business tax cut bill in the first 100 days."

He agreed that repealing and replacing the Affordable Care Act, also known as Obamacare, should also be done. That is among the priorities for Republican congressional leaders, though Trump and some Republican leaders are saying it still could be a year before Obamacare is replaced.

"We can do both at the same time," he said. We can walk and chew gum."

He also added that confirming federal judge Neil Gorsuch's nomination to the U.S. Supreme Court is also crucial to maintain its 5-4 conservative majority.

"We all need to work together to make Donald Trump a success," Moore said. "When he is wrong, we need to call him out."

As an example, he said Trump's call for tariff's on Mexican exports was probably not a good idea. But he said Trump "is right about China."

"China does not play by the rules," he said. "China is stealing from the United States."

Moore said one thing Trump knows how to do well is negotiate, which will be an asset in dealing with these countries.

"Guess what China, there is a new sheriff in town," he said.

Moore was invited to speak at the dinner by local tea party activist Dee Park, who asked him to share his experiences about campaigning with Trump. Moore joked that he had an ulterior motive: playing the famed Pinehurst No. 2 course.

"Who knew there were so many 'deplorables' in the great state of North Carolina," he said in opening his remarks to the packed room, referring to nickname Democratic presidential nominee Hillary Clinton gave to Trump supporters. "I had the time of my life on the campaign, traveling all over the country. I met some amazing people."

He recalled telling Trump once that "I do not know if I love you, but I love your voters."

Moore said one of the words he heard most often from voters was "betrayal."

"They felt betrayed by both Democrats and Republicans," he said. "They believed nobody in Washington was listening to them."

Moore said one of the "strongest statements" Trump made was during the GOP National Convention in Cleveland last summer when he said, "To those who don't believe you have a voice in Washington, I will be your voice."

Moore said that as he campaigned in Rust Belt states, he saw and heard about the devastating effects of federal regulations imposed under eight years of the Obama administration.

"The Democratic Party is no longer the party of the working class," he said. "We're now the party of the working class."

To bolster his argument, Moore cited election results in Green Bay, Wisconsin, which Trump won by 19 points. He said Republican nominee Mitt Romney and Obama tied in 2012.

"They (voters) did not feel like there was any recovery at all," Moore said.

Moore recalled serving as a surrogate for Trump at a campaign event in rural Ohio and that as he traveled to the small town, all he saw outside of the cities were Trump signs — which made him question poll results. He said he did finally see one sign for Hillary, but upon closer inspection it said "Hillary for Prison."

Moore said he was in New York with the Trump campaign on election night as returns started coming in and everyone was awaiting the television network predictions. But he paused, and then asked members of his audience at the dinner, "What if I was here a year ago and said Donald Trump would be president?"

Few would have. Moore said, citing polling showing 3.5 percent supported Trump's candidacy at the time.

Moore recalled seeing Hillary Clinton's lead pollster on television about 6:30 on election night stating that

they believed that had a "95 percent chance of winning," based on exit poll data.

Later that night after all the polls had closed, networks began declaring Trump the winner in "state after state, after state." He showed a video montage of CNN's coverage. The room erupted in boisterous applause when North Carolina was shown going for Trump — one of the key battleground states in the campaign.

"Sometimes the experts get it wrong," Moore said.
"People laughed when some predicted Trump would win ... looking at all the polling showing Hillary leading everywhere."

Moore said one of the biggest questions after the dust had settled from the brutal campaign was why the pollsters "have it so wrong." He said he later saw a bumpersticker that pretty well answered the question: "Vote for Trump but don't tell anybody."

"It was politically incorrect to vote for Trump," Moore said, noting that a lot of women "went into the booth and voted for Donald Trump."

Moore pointed out that many other countries have been practicing "Reaganomics" by cutting corporate taxes because it leads to job creation. He said corporate taxes need to be cut to less than 20 percent, which would provide a huge boost to the economy.

"I am so bullish, it is unbelievable," Moore said.
"We're at the start of the biggest bull market you have ever seen."

He showed some graphics to illustrate another point that states with the lowest taxes are seeing their populations increase, using Texas and Florida as examples of growing "red" states and New York and California as examples of "blue" states.

"Blue states are being bled dry by red states," he said. "There is kind of a war going on in America. It is a competition."

He said Florida and Texas have added about one million residents in the last 10 years, while New York and California have lost 1.5 million. He said it is no coincidence that Florida and Texas have no income tax.

He said North Carolina is "not far behind," seeing its population grow by 400,000 in the last 10 years.

Moore noted that nine states have no personal income taxes. He said North Carolina should make a pledge to become the 10th one, looking to state GOP

Executive Director Dallas Woodhouse, who attended the dinner.

"People are voting with their feet against liberalism," he said.

A New Element for the Periodic Table



Then Trump won the primary, and my choices boiled down to him or Hillary Clinton. Easy decision. I know there are many people who looked at the same two candidates and came to a different conclusion. That's OK. But I would remind them that Trump won Moore County by nearly two votes to one (63 percent to 34). His support was strong and widespread in our county.

drew his Cabinet and staff primarily from Washington insiders and academia. That's not the real world.

Working with Congress: He will change the hostile business climate created by the Obama administration. If you don't agree, talk to a business person. This is sorely needed to create jobs and get our economy moving.

Regulatory reform: Excessive regulations have our businesses tied up in knots. This includes Dodd-Frank, which has hamstrung the financial industry.


This & That
