November 4, 2018 Thirty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time Mark 12:28b-34

Dear St. Pius X and St. Anthony Church Family,

Were Ten Commandments too many to remember? Well, God did have to write them down for Moses to remember them according to Exodus 24:12 "I, the Lord, will give you the stone tablets on which I have written the commandments." However, according to Jewish Tradition, over time in order to follow the Great Ten Commandments properly, a more detailed subsection of 'by-laws' were needed that added an extra 603 laws. Some rabbis suggested that Moses wrote all of the laws down with interpretive notes, which is described in Exodus 24:4 when "Moses then, wrote down all the words of the LORD." So, God wrote ten (in stone), then Moses wrote an additional 603 laws to guide the faithful following of the first ten. Is it getting complicated? Exactly! So Jesus came and summarized the Law of God to be simply, 'Love God with everything you've got" and 'Treat your neighbor just the same as yourself' (Mark 12:29-30). Ten are not too many to remember, but by distilling the law down to two commands, Jesus is giving the measure for whether God's law is being followed or not. The prime measure of our conduct results from simply answering this question, "Is what I am about to do, or say, a good reflection of the God I serve, and a good reflection of who I am?" Is God revered by my actions? Is my neighbor who is created in God's Image, honored by my words and conduct?

We hear so much about law written in stone. How we visualize something in our mind, already sets up our understanding of it in a certain way. So here is an experiment: Draw a picture for me in your mind of the actual Ten Commandments engraved on stone. For example, are there two stone tablets, or just one large tablet? Is writing on the front and back? Are the stones squared or rounded on the top? Smooth or rough around the edges? Are there any Headings? How about numbering? Is there any capitalization or underlining? Again, how we visualize the stone tablets matters. This is worth thinking about when we consider all the energy spent on designing monuments and pictures of the Ten Commandments put up and posted everywhere on billboards and walls. (Somebody once challenged me to consider why we Christians don't fight just as much for the Actual WORDS of JESUS to be posted, too?)

A lot of ink of has been spilled or a lot of stone has been scratched over whether there were two stone tablets, or whether it was two sides of one tablet. God's own word says in Exodus 32:15 "Moses came down the mountain with the two tablets of the covenant in his hands, tablets that were written on both sides, front and back." (So is it, two surfaces, or two stones-2 pages or 4 pages?) We know Moses needed both hands to carry the commandments. Stone is durable, but it is heavy, too. Another quote, Exodus 17:12,says Moses one time needed help holding his hands up, with Aaron and Hur helping, by holding his hands up in battle. SO, did Moses hold two heavy stones requiring both hands, one in each hand? Or did he use two hands to be able to readily flip one stone with two sides over, to reveal the additional writing on the other side? I bet you are asking, "What does any of this have to do with Jesus?" Well, Jesus' answer to the scribe in the gospel today is basically that the Great Commandment of God's Law is two-fold and both elements hang together as one. They are hinged if two tablets! Or they are *flip sides* of same stone if one tablet. The great commandment is Love of God AND Neighbor. A person cannot love God without also loving what God has created in His image, and when a person truly loves another human being, God is being honored as that person's maker. So, Jesus is revealing the one intention of God behind all good law: that 1) God be honored, and that 2) all God has made must be respected. While it may seem there are two sets of laws, they both really amount to only one in practice. Paul says, "The whole law is fulfilled in one statement, namely, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself' (Galatians 5:14). Keep in mind this whole set-up was a test! Mark 12:28 says Jesus is answering within a 'dispute'. Matthew 22:35 goes so far as to say "one of the scholars of the law tested Jesus by asking...,". So Jesus is taking a test, and I learned as a kid that you have to look at the back of the test page, flipping the sheet over and answering questions on the back, too. Or else you fail! So Jesus is saying, that while on one hand we are commanded 'To Love God', this also means on the other hand we are to 'To Love Our Neighbor'. Both laws are flip sides of the same command. A person doesn't fulfill one of them without simultaneously fulfilling the other. Jesus is holding together the whole Law of Moses-"Love God and Neighbor"!
