### What's Love Got To Do With It? Music Sabbath June 10th: "Jewish Songs of Love"

🖓 Very often Judaism is described as a "religion of law" while other faiths are seen as C "religions of love". And, although it is guite true that Judaism's underpinning is the observance of the *Mitzvot*, or commandments, there is, as the saying goes, "love all around" If one looks carefully. The place of love in Jewish text, liturgy, theology and mysticism is 🔁 vast and ever present.

First and foremost, there is the Shema, or what many consider to be the essence of Jewish faith, acknowledging that our God is One. However, the Shema, which comes directly from the *Torah*, is not just about the description of our deity, but about our RELATIONSHIP to God. The very next verse that follows in the Torah and in the praver book is: "And you shall LOVE the Lord your God, with all your heart, with all your soul and with all your 7 *might.*" Much has been written about this injunction to "love God" and we will discuss it further at our Music Sabbath 7:30pm June 10th. Our prayers are full of examples of the love relationship the Jewish people have with our God. The Hebrew word for 'love', Ahava 🤣 is scattered throughout our liturgy. This love relationship is demonstrated through the covenantal relationship we have with God. We show our love to God by observing the Mitzvot and being God's partners in creation. God shows love for us by giving us the privilege and opportunity to observe the *Mitzvot*.

We will also be highlighting the evocative and sensual love poetry in the Biblical Song of Songs. Again, while the Song of Songs appears on the surface to be various exchanges between pairs of lovers with well known quotes such as, "I am my beloved's and my beloved is mine", the Rabbis tell us that it is a metaphor for the powerful love relationship between God and the people Israel. Seen through this specific lens, the Song of Songs takes on a special theological tone. Many of these beautiful texts have been set to music and often are played and/or sung at Jewish weddings.

And, finally, that brings us to the Jewish wedding itself, a masterpiece of liturgy that Integrates the holy and romantic as one. In Judaism we are commanded to rejoice with the 🛃 bride and groom. The bride and groom are opportunities for us to see the world anew and 🗸 revisit its promise. The wedding is an opportunity to witness God's creation once again and to remind ourselves that we are, indeed, God's partners. Although the ceremony focuses on the commitments the couple make to one another, God's presence is under the chuppah 2 giving blessing and sustenance not only to the couple, but to all who rejoice with them. Please join us on Friday, June 10th as our choir and I share a very special Sabbath of love with all of you.

Paraphrasing the Dali Lama who says," our prime purpose is to help others, and if we cannot help them, at least try not to hurt them... communicate, and deal with them." I have found this to be true and wise advice. So, I apologize to anyone I hurt or offended during my tenure. It was not on purpose and all the decisions were made with a great deal of thought and input from others.

I would also like to take the time to thank my wife Sue for her patience and typing skills - they have both come in handy. And I want to especially thank the members of Shir Chadash. 

# RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NOTES AND REMINDERS FOR JUNE

June is the month that we remember the Shir Chadash teachers who have given so much of their time, wisdom, and creativity to our children.

Our Aleph class was taught by Rochelle Bellach assisted by Andrew Scheck. Whenever you walked into the Aleph classroom, you would see those youngsters busy at work creating projects, reading Torah stories, or talking about the Jewish holidays. During the course of this year, these students made many mementos of their studies including Challah covers, seder plates, and Israeli Flags. In the background you could hear Jewish music reinforcing the topic being discussed.

Our Bet class learned about the symbols of Judaism and the meanings of the Jewish holidays under the tutelage of Steve Moskowitz, sometimes assisted by his son, Mason. Steve came up with a variety of activities that enhanced his students' understanding of Jewish history, values, and how they
 connected to the Jewish holidays and symbols. It was Steve who brought in a special outdoor stove that used a stone to cook the Passover matzah that our students baked.

Ed Ginsberg led our Gimmel class with intriguing discussions about Jewish heroes and values. The Gimmel students worked on a year-long project looking at their heroes and what qualities make a **hero. Ed's students enjoyed the discussions in his class and felt free to express themselves.** 

Andrew Scheck not only assisted in the Aleph class, but served as substitute teacher when we needed someone last minute. It was amazing to watch him come up with a topic and an effective lesson plan, and then successfully implement this plan.

Now there was also another class that was held weekly but not during our Sharing Shabbat. That class is our B'not Mitzvah class led by Cantor Hirschenfang. Cantor Hirschenfang has the ability and patience to teach and motivate nine adult students not only to learn Hebrew and the Hebrew prayers, but also the meanings behind the words. And this was done in only four months. Imagine what the students will be able to do one year from now! In addition, Cantor Hirschenfang is always teaching our congregation new songs and enriching our services with her music.

And finally, last but not least, we need to thank our lead teacher, Rabbi Polish. Rabbi Polish is always teaching us history and Torah, motivating us to think about what we can glean from his lessons and how we can apply these lessons to our lives.


## "The Spinoza Problem: A Novel"

by Irvin D. Yalom

In *The Spinoza Problem*, Irvin Yalom spins fact and fiction into an unforgettable psycho-philosophical novel. A psychiatrist with a deep interest in philosophical issues, Yalom jointly tells the story of the seventeenth-century thinker Baruch Spinoza, his philosophy and subsequent excommunication from the Jewish community, and his apparent influence on the Nazi ideologue Alfred Rosenberg, whose *einsatzgruppe* was dispatched during the Second World War to investigate a mysterious "Spinoza Problem." Seamlessly alternating between Golden Age Amsterdam and Nazi Germany, Yalom investigates the inner lives of these two enigmatic men in a tale of influence and anxiety, the origins of good and evil, and the philosophy of freedom and the tyranny of terror. *Amazon*

### "The first Modern Jew: Spinoza and the History of an

Image" by Daniel B. Schwartz

"Pioneering biblical critic, theorist of democracy, and legendary conflater of God and nature, Jewish philosopher Baruch Spinoza (1632-1677) was excommunicated by the Sephardic Jews of Amsterdam in 1656 for his "horrible heresies" and "monstrous deeds." Yet, over the past three centuries, Spinoza's rupture with traditional Jewish beliefs and practices has elevated him to a prominent place in genealogies of Jewish modernity. *The First Modern Jew* provides a riveting look at how Spinoza went from being one of Judaism's most notorious outcasts to one of its most celebrated, if still highly controversial, cultural icons, and a powerful and protean symbol of the first modern secular Jew.

Ranging from Amsterdam to Palestine and back again to Europe, the book chronicles Spinoza's posthumous odyssey from marginalized heretic to hero, the exemplar of a whole host of Jewish identities, including cosmopolitan, nationalist, reformist, and rejectionist. Daniel Schwartz shows that in fashioning Spinoza into "the first modern Jew," generations of Jewish intellectuals--German liberals, East European maskilim, secular Zionists, and Yiddishists--have projected their own dilemmas of identity onto him, reshaping the Amsterdam thinker in their own image. The many afterlives of Spinoza are a kind of looking glass into the struggles of Jewish writers over where to draw the boundaries of Jewishness and whether a secular Jewish identity is indeed possible. Cumulatively, these afterlives offer a kaleidoscopic view of modern Jewish culture and a vivid history of an obsession with Spinoza that continues to this day." Amazon


