

Directions to Montgomery Community College

From Winston-Salem:

Take Hwy. 52 South to Lexington; then take Hwy.64 East to Ashboro; from Ashboro take 220 South to Bisco Exit; turn right & go approximately 9 miles until you see Montgomery Community College sign on the right; turn right at the sign, and go approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ mile to the college entrance. Look for marked parking.

From Fayetteville:

Take Hwy. 24 & 27 West through Bisco, go approximately 9 miles until you see Montgomery Community College sign on the right; turn right at the sign, and go approximately ¹/₂ mile to the college entrance. Look for marked parking.

From Charlotte:

Take Hwy 24 & 27 East through Troy, go approximately 2 miles until you see the Montgomery Community College sign. Turn left and go approximately ½ mile to the college entrance. Look for marked parking.

On The Cover

The King Tut, shown on the front is the creation of NCCKG member Travis Daniel and jeweler, Nancy Fleming. This 8 1/2" beauty has a 4" drop point blade and is made from ATS34. The handle is tusk ivory with a silver overlay. The guard is 416 stainless. To complete the aura, the knife is encased in a chest made entirely of copper and rests on a repousse of copper. The feet of the chest are bronze and American white tail button. The front clasp is fossil wrapped in silver. A white tail tip and brass form the top ornament. The photo is by Terrill Hoffman.

Profile in Steel

This North Carolina Custom Knifemakers' Guild member has been involved in crafting custom knives since 1975. He came about his interest and talent in the craft quite by accident.

While browsing through a craft show in southwest Georgia he saw a knife made by Doctor James A. Woodall. He was totally enthralled by the absolute beauty of such a functional item and the seed was planted that bore fruit of an excellent craftsman. This craftsman is Travis Daniel.

Travis caught the vision of creating a "work of art" himself. Armed with his vision, he approached Dr. Woodall about teaching him to make a knife. Dr. Woodall agreed but with a test to see if Travis was serious. When Travis walked into the shop, he was handed a hack saw and file. His first blade was cut out and shaped using only that hacksaw and file. Travis remembers it took him about 2 weeks to fashion that first blade. After the first blade, Dr. Woodall did allow Travis to begin using the machines

Travis continued with Dr. Woodall 7 days a week for the next many months. After a period of time, Dr. Woodall saw Travis had progressed to the point of being able to strike out on his own without further instruction.

Travis' next influence came from his friendship with Rade Hawkins. Rade helped him take is craft to the next level in design and finish.

Today, along with making knives under his own logo, he continues to be a partner in Carolina Custom Knives with Tommy McNabb.

Travis and his wife Doris, live in Chocowinity, North Carolina. They have 3 children, Lisa, Jay and James. He also is the assistant to the manager of the Thomaston-Upson County Airport in Thomaston, Georgia.

Travis specializes in fixed blade knives and sheaths. His favorite style of knife is the drop point hunter.

The passion that drives the creativity in Travis is finding the beauty that can be achieved in fashioning steel and natural materials into something functional.

Tony, Bob, and Phillip discuss the finer point of en-


hancing the handle of a knife by using pewter that can obtained be commercially purchased or from flea markets in the form of plates and drinking cups.
