The mission of Bread and Water for Africa® is to promote positive change in Africa by supporting and strengthening grassroots initiatives for community self-sufficiency in health and education.

MESSAGE FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

To the supporters of Bread and Water for Africa®,

At Bread and Water for Africa® our primary mission is to enable impoverished Africans to reach their full potential and have a good quality of life. To further this mission, in the past year, we have provided loving homes for orphaned and abandoned children and ensured they receive an education and the healthcare they need to lead happy, healthy lives.

In FY 2021, we provided clean water for thousands in rural, remote villages, shipped hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of medicines, medical supplies and equipment to hospitals and clinics, supported agricultural training for hundreds of women farmers and fed hundreds of schoolchildren in the slums of Nairobi, and much more.

To put it simply, none of this would be possible without our generous supporters and nonprofit partners here in the U.S. Without them, we would not be able to fund the good works of our partners who rely on us on their way to self-sufficiency.

This has been a challenging year for us and our African partners who are determined to carry on with their programs despite the global COVID-19 pandemic, particularly when it comes to keeping children fed in countries where rampant inflation is causing the prices of basic food supplies to increase on practically a daily basis.

To that end, this past year we increased funding for our COVID-19 impact support to include training youth and young adults in Sierra Leone in best agricultural practices, providing them tools and supplies and teaching them how to start their own small businesses selling their crops. Also, with funding from COVID-19 impact support grants, we completed several clean water development projects in Malawi, Tanzania, Ethiopia and Sierra Leone, as well as provided support for a children's home in Sierra Leone to produce more rice on its 220-acre farm as part of our food sustainability project.

We hope and pray that soon this will all just be a distant memory and remain confident that we will all come out stronger at the end of this long dark tunnel.

Unfortunately, this fall, it is with my utmost heartfelt and personal sadness that I share that our cherished founder, who was known by our partners as "Papa" Gene, passed away just a month following the death of his wife of more than 60 years, Adeline (known as "Addy"), and who herself was a strong supporter of Bread and Water for Africa®.

On behalf of those tens of thousands whose lives have been improved and who cannot speak for themselves, as well as our Board of Directors and our inspirational international spokesperson Phyllis Keino, the founder of the Lewa Children's Home, I say THANK YOU for making a difference in the lives of so many.

Eugene "Gene" Lad Krizek, founder of Bread and Water for Africa®, passed away on October 5, 2021, a month to the day after his wife, Adeline "Addy" Rose Krizek, who was by his side for more than 60 years, died on September 5, 2021.

Together, working hand in hand, Gene and Addy are responsible for making the bettering the lives of hundreds of thousands of children, as well as young mothers struggling to keep their infants and toddlers fed and healthy. They made certain that the most impoverished living in sub-Saharan African countries

have access to free health care services at clinics and hospitals operated by our partners.

Bread and Water for Africa® Executive Director
Bethelhem Tessema noted that as she shared the
sad news that Gene, 93, and Addy, 88, had passed
"comments poured in from our partners expressing
their grief and sympathy" for the man they called "Papa"
and Addy as "a friend and a mother to many of Africa's
children."

From Zimbabwe, Margaret Makambira, founder and director of the Shinga Development Trust and the Lerato Children's Village, expressed her heartfelt condolences saying, "It is with deep regret that we learnt about the passing away of these two great icons. We will always cherish the memory of his works which will go a long way to benefit many future generations."



From Zambia, Angela Miyanda, founder and director of the Kabwata Children's Home, recalled the day in May, 1998, she first met Gene at the offices of Christian Relief Services during a visit to the U.S. saying, "That was the beginning of our long friendship which materialized into the long-term help of the children of Zambia. We will always remember, and your love in embedded in our lives forever. Your good works have gone ahead of you. Sleep well and we forever remain indebted to you. Go well and meet again your loving wife, Addy. Farewell..."



From Sierra Leone, Rev. Francis Mambu, founder and director of Faith Healing Development Organization, said that today, "Even though we are mourning the passing of Gene Krizek, we are also celebrating him for his steadfastness and love towards humanity. The way that Pa Krizek diligently carried out his service to humanity up to the day of his demise demonstrated that he was a man on a mission. He has completed his work assigned to him by God while it was day for him and has gone to inherit his crown from the Lord. He has left us to continue the work of compassion and concern. We should continue to maintain his legacy and further build on his footprints in the sands of time."



From Cameroon, Esther Ndichafah, founder and director of Hope Services, told us, "He was indeed my father, Father of the Orphans, the Poor, the Prisoners, the Displaced, the Hopeless. That is Papa Eugene Krizek. He put on the shoes of God, he walked with and worked for God. Papa Krizek has left a legacy. He is not gone. He still lives because his work and memories will speak and act for generations to come."























Challenge

In sub-Saharan African countries including Kenya, Sierra Leone, Zambia and Zimbabwe where Bread and Water for Africa® supports children's homes and orphanages providing loving homes for hundreds of orphaned, abandoned and destitute children, there are countless others who are fending for themselves, and oftentimes their younger siblings, not knowing when they get their next meal or where they will be laying their head to sleep at night.

Our Solution

Since 1997, Bread and Water for Africa® grassroots partners have been devoted to providing Africa's children and youth from infants to adulthood with loving and nurturing homes where all their basic needs are met, and education, health care and counseling and life skills development so they are prepared to thrive from the day they set out on their own.

Lerato Children's Village: Empowering Melissa and Others to Reach Their Full Potential

Bread and Water for Africa® longtime partner Shinga Development Trust in Zimbabwe, which operates the Lerato Children's Village, was founded with the lofty goal of meeting the basic needs of orphaned and vulnerable children by providing them with a home where they are fed and sheltered, given healthcare and the opportunity for an education – and most importantly, loved.

Founder and director Margaret Makambira treats all those she takes in as "her" children, and to many, she becomes the only "mother" they have known in their short lives.

Among them is 13-year-old Melissa – who is NOT a witch – although that false accusation by her extended family relatives after both her parents died is how she ended up at the Lerato Children's Village.



Young Melissa has had much tragedy in her short life following the death first of her father, and then her mother. At just 10 years old, she was an orphan who was left in the care of her grandmother, then an aunt and a grandfather.

"Her grandfather and aunt started to accuse her of witchcraft and refused to give her food," reported Margaret. "She survived by begging."

"When Melissa first arrived at Lerato, she was withdrawn and did not like to socialize with any of the other children," Margaret told us, but she received counseling to help her adjust to her new living environment. "The counseling sessions were quite helpful as she now relates well with the other children."

As Shinga founder and director Margaret Makambira states so eloquently, "Education is a basic need for each child, and orphans and vulnerable children should not be excluded."

Among those orphaned and vulnerable children who are attending Dora Secondary School in Mutare right now is Lorcadia Goto who describes the supporters of Bread and Water for Africa® as her "guardian angels" and expressed her sincere gratitude.

"I have been suffering a lot in the past years when both my parents died," she told us. "I was staying with my grandparents, and they could not afford to send me to school or provide me with a school uniform and stationery. I want to express my gratitude to you – because of you I am now going to school every day and my school performance is improving in that regard. It is really a wonderful thing that you are doing, because of what you are doing I am now able to have a second chance in life."

Challenge

For millions living in rural, remote villages in sub-Saharan African countries having access to safe water for drinking, cooking, bathing and washing is the exception not the rule as most must risk their lives collecting water from unsafe, unprotected sources, frequently contaminated by parasites and waterborne diseases such as cholera and Typhoid fever.

Our Solution

Nothing is more important for African children and their families than having a reliable source of clean water to meet their immediate needs daily. In the past year, working with our partners in Ethiopia, Malawi, Tanzania and Uganda serving more than 150,000 individuals.

Borewell Constructed in Malawi Described as Answer to Century-Old Prayers

Grace Nkhoma lives in the small village of Chiputu in the Mchinji District in Malawi which until very recently did not have access to safe, clean water. But that was before Bread and Water for Africa® and our partner in the country, Our AIM Foundation, teamed up to construct a borewell, a vertical drilled well bored into an underground aquifer, in the village.

It has literally transformed her life, as well as the lives of some 3,250 others living in the surrounding community, reported local manager Ishmael Kadango.

Grace told us that before the borewell was constructed she had to travel a long distance, about 5 kilometers (3.1 miles) one way to fetch water for herself and her family and wait in long lines.



"It was difficult to travel to during rainy season as there is bush along the road and it is scary," she said. "So, this borewell has answered our-century old prayers. May God bless Our AIM Foundation and Bread and Water for Africa® people for the marvelous job they are doing." Chitowe Mbewe, chief of Chiputu Village, stated: "On behalf of Chiputu village inhabitants, I would like to thank Our AIM Foundation and Bread and Water for Africa® for coming to our aid with the water project.

"My people are very happy for this development. This borewell will help reduce number of people who became ill due to taking unclean water and instill health in my people.

"We are overjoyed for this borewell and please help others too. May God bless and enrich you!"

Challenge

Tragically, many lives are lost each year throughout sub-Saharan Africa due to easily preventable and treatable illnesses due to a lack of basic medicines and access to affordable healthcare services.

Our Solution

We understand that medical care is vital to the health of children, their mothers and others living in rural regions who rely on small clinics for their healthcare. That's why each year we ship hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of medicines, medical supplies and equipment to clinics and hospitals operated by our partners in countries including Cameroon, Ethiopia, Malawi and Sierra Leone.

Rokel Clinic: Treats and Heals Severely Burned Young Boy

We at Bread and Water for Africa® fear what would have happened to 7-year-old Usif when he was severely burned over 70 percent of his small body without the nearby Rokel Clinic where he received free treatment for his injuries.

Rev. Francis Mambu, executive director of our longtime partner Faith Healing Development Organization (FHDO) in Sierra Leone, told us the boy was brought to the clinic by his mother, an impoverished widow raising her children on her own.

"The burn extended to the chest, lower abdomen and his right and left thighs," reported Rev. Mambu. Initially, due to the severity of Usif's burns, it was recommended that he be taken to a local hospital for care.

"However, the mother pleaded with the health care staff at the clinic that she had no money to pay for the treatment if she took him to the hospital," said Rev. Mambu.



So, the staff at the Rokel Clinic was sympathetic to her and her son's plight and agreed to provide treatment for Usif, and we are pleased to report from Rev. Mambu that within about three weeks of being cared for at the clinic "the boy was completely healed."

And we shudder to think about what would have happened to little Usif if the Rokel Clinic was not there to treat him, and potentially saving his life.

"His mother was full of joy as she left the clinic with her son," said Rev. Mambu. "She thanked the Almighty God for saving her son's life, and also the supporters of Bread and Water for Africa® for sponsoring the Rokel Clinic."

Challenge

Although much of the land in sub-Saharan African countries is lush and fertile, many often go hungry because they do not have the basic knowledge and resources they need to get the most out of their small tracts of land during the growing season. The problem has become increasingly worse in recent years as climate change is causing more droughts resulting in decreasing harvests while heavy torrential rainfall causes severe flooding washing away crops before they can be harvested.

Our Solution

Our partners who operate sustainable agricultural programs know firsthand that ensuring food security for those living the in rural villages and communities they serve is an ongoing battle that can only be won when small holder farmers, primarily women, are able to develop their own reliable food supplies. With the help of our supporters, and the work of our local partners, we have been able to educate farmers in the most rural areas of sub-Saharan Africa about the most appropriate up-to-date farming practices and how to run a successful agribusiness.

Food Self-Sustainability Program Helps **Young Farmer to Become Self-Sufficient**

At Bread and Water for Africa®, we don't just want to give a man (or woman) a bag of rice to eat for a week or two and then go hungry again, we want them to learn the best way to grow it, and how to market and sell it, in order to build a life of self-sufficiency for themselves and their families.



Such is the case through our food self-sustainability program with our partner the Rural Youth Development Organization-Sierra Leone. During the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, program director Joseph Kobba reached out to us requesting grant funding for vegetable and crops production training for 75 impoverished women and youth to help them establish incomegenerating projects by training them in entrepreneurial and business management skills, as well as providing them with modest grants to help them achieve their dream.

"Food security in rural communities is a means of saving lives, improving nutrition, investing in women and youth, and laying a foundation for development and prosperity," reported Joseph.

Alusine, who was orphaned following the death of his parents due to the country's Ebola outbreak in 2014, was contacted by RYDO-SL staff in their efforts to register vulnerable youths for the Bread and Water for Africa® COVID-19 support program.

"I am now a proud farmer because I can now grow rice on a large scale that can feed my brothers and sisters," says Alusine. "Farming is very expensive work, but the support I received from Bread and Water for Africa® has helped me to take a big step forward."




Highlight

200 children attending the Seed School in the Nairobi slum of Kibera were served two meals each weekday, and 100 students from Dora East and Dora West were provided with food supplies for six months in Zimbabwe.

Feeding Program in Kibera is a Gateway to the Aspiring Scientist

Setric was born in the Nairobi slum of Kibera in 2008, and dire poverty is all she has ever known in her 12 years of life.

But, despite all the challenges and roadblocks placed in her path due to the circumstances far beyond her control, the young girl on the verge of adulthood has hope for a brighter future because of the Seed School located in the slum which is enabling her to get an education, and Bread and Water for Africa® which is ensuring



that she receives a healthy, filling meal twice a day every school day.

"A lover or science and creative arts," is how Patrick Odongo, director of the Seed Foundation which operates the school, describes the bright young lady. "Setric has shown a lot of passion in her studies, and she hopes to be a nurse to take care of the sick who will rely greatly on her help."

Setric had hoped to graduate from the Seed School this year but had to hit the pause button on her education due to the COVID-19 pandemic. She has not given up her dream of becoming a nurse safe and secure in the knowledge that one day this will pass.

"We were optimistic that the pandemic ends soon and things normalize for children like Setric to be able to continue their education," says Patrick.

"The members of the community who are located within the villages where the Seed Foundation operates our programs, such as the Seed School in Kibera, have been very much appreciative of the kind work we are undertaking," says Patrick. "We thank the supporters of Bread and Water for Africa® for your support of our feeding program for the entire year."







HONORING C.B. RICHARDSON



It is with great sadness we report the passing of Clyde "C.B." Richardson on November 6, 2021, a member of the Christian Relief Services Board of Directors (the parent organization of Bread and Water for Africa®) for more than 32 years who served as Treasurer for most of those years. Remarkably board records indicate he was not in attendance for just three of the annual quarterly meetings during all that time!

Bryan Krizek, President and CEO of Christian Relief Services, the son of Christian Relief Services founder Gene Krizek and his wife Addy commented on C.B.'s passing saying, "C.B., as he is known by all who knew him, was my father's and mother's longest and dearest friend for my entire life, and before. My dad, Gene Krizek, founder of Christian Relief

Services, and mother, Addy, who served beside them on the Christian Relief Services Board of Directors for many years, all worked together with a single purpose – to make the world a better place for the less fortunate whether it was on the reservations in Indian Country, rural, remote villages in countries in sub-Saharan Africa, or in distressed communities throughout Appalachia.

"At 88 years old, he did not see his 'work' ending any time soon.

"Our prayers are with his belove wife, Loretta, and everyone who was fortunate enough to meet and know C.B. as well as those untold thousands around the world who benefited from his kind and loving heart for all."
