PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE:

On Being Redemptive


"and hath given us a ministry of reconciliation..." 2 Corinthians 5:18

Many years ago (many, many years!), I was kicking myself for something stupid I had done. And, as was my habit, I went to my best friend, Judi, who is now an ordained minister in the UCC. I poured out my heart, thoroughly making a case against myself with every detail and from every angle, and at some point, I became annoyed, because from the look on her face, I could see that Judi did not think my issue was as serious and all-condemning as I did. I stopped and gave her a chance to speak, and she said, quite caringly, "Sometimes being human, with all of its emotions and desires, just happens. We shouldn't shame ourselves for acting like a human being." And then she broke out in laughter – at me.

I don't know if that sounds redemptive to you — but to me, it was. For a person who knows me so well to minimize my self-blame, even laugh at me, was so healing. By the time that conversation was over, I was laughing at myself too. I still don't think so highly of my stupid action... but now it is in proportion as a dumb mistake and it is no longer the end-all be-all of my character. There is a gift to being understanding and redemptive when someone is in pain. My friend Judi has it.

The calling of God on our lives is to be redemptive toward other people, to move through our relationship always looking for ways to lift one-another up, and help another regather their balance. It is somewhat easier for us when we see in front of us someone we love who is in pain — we know better then what to say and how to offer relief. But what about when we are angry? That is a challenge.

When we get angry at someone (okay, this is a confession, when I get angry at someone) there is the tendency to want to trap them in a corner where they have no choice but to accept our wrath and punishment.





PASTOR'S MESSAGE CONTINUED:

Sometimes we would like to emotionally/psychologically dissect them, pointing out to them ALL of their personal failings and excoriating every failing aspect of their personality. If we are mad enough, we might even have a personal opinion about what should happen to them, a punishment they should receive. And the temptation is there to trash them, to their face or behind their backs, to cut off relationship with them and expel them from our world. But we seldom feel better if we do. We might even walk away feeling as if we are now the ones who have walked over the line.

Lately, I have been reminded how important it is to act redemptively, even in anger, to come to interpersonal issues with the intent to reconcile, redeem, learn, and teach, rather than to punish and banish. Confrontations that shame and rage leave the other with no sense of dignity and accomplish nothing for Christ – they are ego-centric and self-serving. God has a purpose and a plan for every person who crosses our path, even those who step on our toes while doing it. Reacting with the will to heal, reconcile, and redeem is to be Christ-like to another person. It doesn't mean laying down and becoming a door-mat, it does not mean failing to speak in truth or confront an offender – it means that in confrontation and truth telling, we leave the door open to reconciliation, we approach the other with an opportunity to grow better together with us – because that is the nature of our faith.

-Where did you graduate high school/college?


High School – Langdon. Undergraduate – University of North Dakota Law School – University of North Dakota School of Law.

Some common sense reminders for summer safety tips:

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Administrative and Personnel—A cleaning team of Jim and Mary Kuntz has been hired to clean the church two days a week, 11 hours each.

Hospitality—The Pride event at BSC went well. The annual church potluck will be in August. Visitors to the church receive follow-up cards or phone calls.

Proclamation-Christian Education—Vacation Bible School will be July 31 - August 3.

Proclamation-Worship and Music—Revisions were made to the Facility Use form and policies; an Equipment Rental Agreement policy and form were approved by Session.

Property and Equipment—The cooling issue in staff offices has been solved. Thanks to Matt Engel, Chair, who has coordinated all the cleaning of the church since Tony's death.


