SRCA Annual Meeting Recap

The annual public membership meeting of the SRCA was held on March 5 at the chapel which was kindly made available by Smoke Rise Baptist Church. A dedicated audience of 82 were treated to an extensive report of the positive trajectory of DeKalb County by our CEO and neighbor Michael Thurmond. CEO Thurmond stayed until every question was answered and then turned the dais over to Senator Steve Henson and then Mayor Auman and city council representatives Pat Soltys and Bill Rosenfeld.

SRCA President Mike Huerkamp and selected board members finished up business by reporting on the resurgence of the community garden, landscaping enhancements at the Glacier, Greencastle and Rosser Rd. stacks on Hugh Howell, the replacement of the Stratmor medallion, reinvigoration of the Friends of Lord Park, association finances, sponsorship of the school, Walk to Remember, Tucker High School Foundation, Smoke Rise Prep, Smoke Rise Sharks, the Stone Mountain Women's Club, and outreach and productive connections with eight additional city, school, police and business organizations.

The night ended with attendees mixing with representatives from the Mountain Creek Swim Club, Mountain Shadow Garden Club, Smoke Rise Bath & Racquet, Smoke Rise Community Garden, Smoke Rise Country Club, Smoke Rise Sharks Swim Team, The Summit at Smoke Rise Swim & Tennis Club, Smoke Signal, and Yellow Dot initiative. We'll see you at free shredding on April 20 and then Tucker Day on May 11. It is an exciting time to be in DeKalb, Tucker and Smoke Rise.

The annual SRCA document shredding event will be held at Smoke Rise Elementary School on Saturday April 20, 2019, beginning at 10:00 a.m. and extending until 1:00 p.m. or when the truck fills. We are pleased to partner with Shred-It this year and look forward to providing this service to our neighborhood and seeing our neighbors there.



Dues appeal

The 2019 SRCA annual membership renewal campaign is winding down and we thank all of our generous members for their dues payments. Income from dues has been declining for the last several years, but is the sole source for greenspace and aesthetics initiatives, services such as free document shredding and candidate forums, investments that better our elementary school, enhancements to our website, exploration of branding possibilities, and sponsorship of events and other organizations that define our community. City Council Wrap Up

Tucker's Mayor and City
Council held their first March
meeting on Monday, March
11, voting on three very highprofile projects. The first project
involves lighting for the tennis
courts at Henderson Park. Council
voted unanimously to enter into a contract with
West Georgia Lighting for \$97,000. The vote
means the lights should be in place by summertime.

Next, Council voted to hire Lowe Engineers for construction design services on a previously-funded sidewalk along Idlewood Road. The sidewalk would be constructed on the east side of Idlewood between Tucker Middle School and Lawrenceville Highway. The contract with Lowe Engineers is for \$51,205 and the design work should be complete within 90 days.

The third project Council voted on deals with oversight of the City's spring road resurfacing projects. They voted unanimously to give Construction Engineering Inspection (CEI) services to BM&K for the price of \$55,846.60. CEI oversight ensures that road work is done to GDOT specifications and can actually save money on the project.

Earlier in the meeting, the Mayor and Council issued a pair of proclamations. One proclamation was in honor of Chief James Conroy, who is retiring from the DeKalb County Police Department after 28 years of service. The Mayor also recognized Assistant Chief Greg Padrick, who was recently promoted after serving as commander of the Tucker Precinct. He then introduced Tucker Precinct's new commander, Major Craig Medlin. The Mayor also issued a proclamation to members of the Tucker Civic Association for their work in promoting the Yellow Dot Program. The resolution is aimed at spreading the word about the program, which assists police and first responders to be better equipped with information to handle medical emergencies.

Finally, the Mayor offered up, and City Council ratified, a list of names for service on Tucker's Community Council. The new Community Council for 2019 will be Will Arroyo, Suzanne Borchert, Seth Burrow, Linda Clark, Thomas Lupo, Frank Luton, Jan Mixon, Cara Schroeder and Jonathan Vaughters.

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New Exhibit at DeKalb County Courthouse Deep Roots in DeKalb: The Flat Rock Story of Resilience

Believed to be one of the oldest African American communities in Georgia, Flat Rock was founded and strengthened by individuals who wanted to ensure the safety and success of African Americans following the aftermath of the Civil War. The community of Flat Rock thrived in part because of the immense communal bond of its citizens as well as the selflessness of its leaders. Theodore A. Bryant, Sr., ensured the development of Flat Rock by purchasing nearby land and distributing it to families in the area. This gesture allowed for the citizens of Flat Rock to build a strong foundation of support as well as ensure the safety and well-being of the community. Despite consistent animosity and prejudice, the people of Flat Rock remained strong, resilient, and united.

This exhibit explores the story of Flat Rock as well as the people who called it home. By examining objects collected over time from the residents of Flat Rock, we have been able to better narrate the lives and experiences of the families within the community. This exhibit would not have been possible if not for the generosity of Flat Rock Archives, who graciously lent part of their collection and all of their expertise to allow us to tell the inspiring story of the community who stood strong for over one hundred years.

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
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PINK THE RUNWAY FASHION SHOW

All of the models that grace the runway are either breast cancer survivors or loved ones of those lost to breast cancer.

The participants will be modeling spring attire with a special focus on hats and headpieces. Attendees are encouraged to wear a hat. Among the models will be Smoke Rise resident Roxanne Spicer Curry, the founder of Prevent Today Breast Cancer Foundation a 501(c) (3), the charity hosting the event. Her battle with breast cancer was found through self-detection under the age of 40. She will be celebrating her five year cancer-free anniversary. "I wanted to start this organization and have this event because I want to educate, inspire and empower women and men to be advocates for their health. Early detection and prevention strategies help individuals go from awareness to action in combating the disease. Providing the community with ways to prevent the disease through a healthy lifestyle and early detection strategies is our focus."

The foundation also plans to gift Hope boxes to women currently in treatment. The boxes will be filled with items known to be a comfort to victims, such as warm pajamas, head scarves, and cozy socks. The Sunday afternoon event begins at the Smoke Rise Country Club at 2:00 p.m. with a Vendor Boutique and Pink Carpet Mingle. The fashion show follows at 3:00 p.m. It is a first for the Prevent Today Foundation which hopes to turn it into an annual event. Organizer, Roxanne Curry, believes it will be an enriching and unforgettable experience for all involved. "The courage displayed by the models, combined with the supportive atmosphere created by the audience, will create a special energy in the room. This will be a lively and meaningful experience for attendees while providing everyone with a unique opportunity to support people who have been affected with this devastating disease."

Individual tickets cost \$20 in advance and are \$25 the day of the show. A limited number of VIP Front Row tickets are available for \$30. Proceeds will support Prevent Today Breast Cancer Foundation's efforts. The show promises to be exciting with fashion as well as several performances. The Cook Off, featured in tents all along Main Street, was festive and fun. Two bands, Electric Avenue - The 80's MTV experience and Dial Up (a 90's rock group), provided entertainment throughout the day. It was a wonderful activity for people of all ages, and a great way to raise money for Day League (formerly DeKalb Rape Crisis) which provides direct services, prevention education, and advocacy for youth and adult survivors of sexual assault, their families and the community as a whole.

Over 40 individuals and local restaurants, entered the competition with hopes of winning one of several prizes. There were a variety of chili recipes offered for sampling including beef chili, white chili, spicy chili, sweet chili, and even an Australian style chili (an ingredient was vegemite)! And, there was plenty of chili to go around as each competitor made anywhere between 5 – 11 gallons distributing 1 ounce samples to the masses.

Best Chili winner was People's Baptist Church. Nick Squared won the People's Choice award, Tucker City Limits won the Best Booth award, and Shorty's won the Best Restaurant award. However, the true winners were all of the competitors (for their efforts) and also, all of the attendants, estimated at 5,000, for making this day such a success. Tucker Butterfly Garden Gets Big Boost from Silent Auction Benefit by René Boven

Ever wonder what a Kamado Grill/Smoker has in common with Elvis? Probably not but it's something just as hot as both of them! Turns out they were items featured in the latest silent auction held by The Garden Enthusiast/Backyard Nature Station on Main Street in Tucker. From February 4 - 16, bids were taken on a variety of items that were donated by area businesses and community members, including tickets to Main Street Theatre's "Four Weddings and an Elvis," all to help fund a special project for the Tucker Butterfly Garden.

Located on Lavista Road at the Tucker Recreation Center and Browning Courthouse, the garden is a DeKalb County Master Gardener site established in 2008. "Ms. Fritillary," the seven foot scarecrow presiding over the garden, is a familiar landmark in Tucker. The educational garden provides food and habitat for pollinators, including butterflies and bees. Signage teaches visitors the life cycle of the butterfly as well as the benefits of pesticide-free gardening.

The auction was a huge success; it not only met the fundraising goal of \$5,000 but it exceeded it, much to the delight of the garden's Master Gardeners. Some of the other 'hot' items, i.e., items that generated bidding wars included a Christine Sibley garden plaque, an acrylic painting of Henderson Park by Louise Georges, a landscape consultation, and a coral bark Japanese maple. The total raised, \$7,455.51, will be used for the construction of a 100' extension of the accessible pathway including soil amendments, plants and hardscapes.

Linda Karr, a founder of both the garden and the popular birding and gardening store reported that "the auction is a win-win – a fun event that also raises funds to enhance a park that we all enjoy." Over the last five years, The Garden Enthusiast's auctions have raised \$24,500 to benefit local parks, including Kelly Cofer Park, John's Homestead, and Henderson Park Native Plant and Wildlife Walk.

As you pull onto the individual streets you will notice sign toppers designating Smoke Rise, as well as "welcome" markers along the community borders. You may also have seen signs for community meetings about crime, the new Smoke Rise Elementary School, or annual meetings. There are also document shredding events, blood drives, and support for the annual neighborhood Walk to Remember, remembering young lives lost too soon in our community.

These things happen because we have an active group of volunteers spending countless hours to improve the aesthetics, branding, safety and awareness in our community. Landscaping, maintenance, and signage aren't free, but have you ever thought about what our community would be like with weeds growing at the Rosser triangle or if we had crumbling chimneys? \$35 is all that is asked of the homeowners to help maintain our neighborhoods. Currently only one third of neighbors pay their dues! \$35 a year isn't much to invest in the value of your home. So now you know. Please pay your dues because Dues are Due! \$35. 

FODAC Announces 19th Annual Run Walk 'n' Roll

Charity event will include people with disabilities among runners, walkers and rollers

Run Walk 'n' Roll now an AJC Peachtree Road Race qualifier

Friends of Disabled Adults and Children (FODAC), a non-profit organization providing over \$10 million annually in home medical equipment (HME) and supplies to those living with disability, will hold its 19th Annual Run Walk 'n' Roll (RWnR) at Stone Mountain Park on Saturday, May 4, 2019. The family-friendly event is one of FODAC's main fundraisers. Participants can run the 5K route, or walk or roll through the two-mile course; wheelchairs, strollers and walkers are all welcome. For the first time, the 5K portion is a USA Track and Field (USATF) sanctioned event, and is a qualifying race for the 2020 AJC Peachtree Road Race.

The RWnR begins with registration and a continental breakfast at Stone Mountain's Event Meadow at 7.30 a.m.; the 5K race starts from there at 8.30 a.m., and the walk and roll starts at 9:00 a.m. There will be door prizes, face-painting, clowns and music during the event. Special guest WSB traffic reporter Doug Turnbull will emcee.

Registration costs are \$25 for participants 6 and up (children 5 and under are free). Teams of four can be registered for \$160. Paid registration includes t-shirt. Registrations before Sunday, April 28, are also eligible for free Stone Mountain Park entry. A Stone Mountain Adventure Pass is available for an additional \$25.00 (\$29.95 regular price).

Medals and prizes will be awarded to the top three male and top three female finishers in the 5K run. There are also prizes for the top individual fundraisers and the top fundraising teams. 
ART Station Opening Two Exhibits on March 30

quilting. Together, their work creates a vibrant visual statement.



Electronic Door Locks

Have you ever found yourself locked out of your own house because you forgot your keys or the door slammed behind you as you walked out? Or, have you been at work and had to come home to let someone in or help your kids when they forgot their key? You can say goodbye to lost, stolen, or forgotten keys with today's broad array of elec-

You can say goodbye to lost, stolen, or forgotten keys with today's broad array of electronic door locks. Couple these with a Ring doorbell and you will know someone is at the door and can then decide to give them the code to unlock the door. Best yet, many of today's locks have multiple lock coding systems so you can give someone a temporary



code to get in that will only last for a few hours. No fear they share that with others to break into your home in the future. Best of all, the Ring doorbell lets you share information about prowlers, breakins, or suspicious people in the neighborhood.

When I appreciated most the combination of our Ring doorbell and our electronic keypad lock was when I was out of town at a conference and was alerted by my phone chiming that someone was at the door. Upon opening the Ring app on my phone, I could see and speak with a contractor who needed to get in and do some repairs at the house. Because of the electronic door locks, I could give him a temporary code to enter. If I only had the video door bell,

I could speak with him but would not be able to easily give him access. Another advantage of the doorbell is that the person talking with me over it has no way of knowing if you are speaking from inside the house or not, which might run off intended burglars.

There are so many types and styles of electronic door locks to choose from. In general, you can get one from your favorite hardware store or door lock provider. Most are under \$100 to purchase. Getting them installed is another challenge requiring either a good DIYer or a check to someone who knows how to install them properly. Some of the more expensive ones even come with internet connectivity so you can unlock the door from wherever you are. Our new garage door opener came with that feature ... but it proved more trouble than it was worth.

For our doors, we are delighted with the stand-alone lock with a numeric keypad. It runs on 4 AA batteries that do have to be changed every few years. The lock will beep at you to remind you to change them toward end of life. At least twice a day, as we leave and return home, we are reminded how much we appreciate the convenience of our keypad lock. No more fumbling for or trying to keep up with keys. It has proven to be a real pleasure.



The Dogwood - Atlanta's Heavenly Tree by Joel Gilbert

Wow, what a wet winter! Some say it only rained three times, but each time for 30 days! Meteorologists report that it was the second wettest winter on record with nearly 70 inches of rain. But, the signs are now clear that winter is past. Our chirping



birds are back, flowers are popping up everywhere, and soon we'll see the dogwood trees that seem to show up everywhere here in Atlanta.

The first time I visited Atlanta in the spring, I couldn't believe how beautiful it was. I lived in Washington, DC, and enjoyed the cherry blossoms, but they were seen only in certain places. Here, dogwood trees seem to be everywhere ... in yards, along roadways, and sprinkled across the forest floor. Some were planted, but most were not. Visible for just a few weeks when their delicate pink or white flowers bloom, it is almost as if they were scattered about by some eternal power to remind us to appreciate the renewal of spring. That is one reason why I chose to call it the heavenly tree.

Why is it called a dogwood tree? As with all of antiquity, there are many theories and legends. Most scholars suggest it was because of how the wood was used: to make 'dags' (short for dagger, meaning short stake). Woodworkers like the dense, strong wood and use it to make tool handles, wedges, engraver's blocks, and even for golf clubs.

There is also a legend about the dogwood tree and Christianity. It is said that Jesus had a special love for dogwood trees, which in his time grew tall - the size of oaks and other forest trees. So firm and strong, it was the tree used for making crosses for crucifixions. It is said, to be used for such a cruel purpose, greatly distressed the tree. So, while on the cross, Jesus said "because of your regret and pity for My suffering, never again shall the dogwood tree grow large enough to be used as a cross – henceforth it shall be slender, bent and twisted and its blossoms shall be in the form of a cross ... with two long and two short petals."

Since there is no "approved" story to explain the name, I would like to propose my own. To me, dogs are the most special animals in our lives. They seem to understand us in ways hard to explain. I have always thought their name was simply God spelled backwards ... kind of like a heavenly wink reminding us that we are not alone. So, given there is no "authorized" explanation for how the dogwood got its name, I would simply like to give thankful praise to the One who we should be thanking at this time of the year for all our lives and those we share life with.

Hence my description for the dogwood in this article: Atlanta's Heavenly Tree.

How to "Watch" Out for Crime in Smoke Rise

Our Smoke Rise area is known to be "esthetically pleasing with lots of trees, hand-some landscaping and a peaceful atmosphere... [inclusive of] many cultures, beliefs and lifestyles." The area is unquestionably inviting. Unfortunately, like many neighborhoods throughout the country, Smoke Rise is also occasionally inviting to those who are up to no good!

There are ways residents can help reduce - and prevent - crime in our community. Our county and city governments (DeKalb and Tucker) support Neighborhood Watch (NW) programs. You've likely heard about these programs before (or are already part of one). They have made an impact in many areas, including Smoke Rise.

The first Neighborhood Watch crime prevention program was launched by the National Sheriffs' Association in 1972. It still works much the same way today, sometimes with the help of technological advancements. Studies have shown NW programs are one of the most effective and least costly ways to prevent crime in a neighborhood. The programs also improve communication and interactions between police and the community.

A Neighborhood Watch program consists of volunteers - Block Captains, a Coordinator, and the community. The program basically covers an entire community; however, with larger communities, it is recommended to break it up into sections so it's not overwhelming to the NW Coordinators and Block Captains. It's a communications-based program. If you "See Something, then Say Something." (Report all suspicious activity to 911.) Donna Mann, Public Education Specialist for the Tucker Police Precinct (and our Smoke Rise contact for a Neighborhood Watch program), says the best way to start is to introduce the NW program at a community meeting. Ms. Mann often attends these kinds of meetings to provide information on NW programs, home security, and other crime awareness and prevention tips.

Some residents have shared video from home and doorbell surveillance cameras to help catch robbers (think "Ring" and other standard video alarm systems). In January 2019, Shamonta Swift, a "career criminal" was sentenced for an August 2018 burglary in our area. The resident got clear video from a surveillance camera and shared it with police.

From the DeKalb County Police Department:

"The defendant [Swift] still has two remaining cases in the DeKalb jurisdiction and pending cases in Gwinnett and Fulton Counties, but for now, and the foreseeable future, he has been taken off the streets and will remain in confinement for at least five years!"

Remember, some people, no matter what, will commit a crime. Be sure to take interest in your community, get involved, and protect your most important "investments" – your family, your friends, and your "stuff!"

Tucker Yellow Dot Program

Have you thought about what the immediate aftermath of a serious crash might be? What would happen if you passed out in your bathroom? Would you be conscious? Able to speak? Able to tell first responders what medications you're taking, any special medical considerations and who to contact?

These considerations and the importance of administering the most effective care as quickly as possible to victims led to the creation of the Yellow Dot Program. It is designed to communicate critical information to first responders when accident victims might not be able to speak for themselves.

Last May, the Tucker Civic Association's Lifelong Community Committee rolled out the Yellow Dot Program in Tucker.

The relatively simple idea has proven to be an effective way to relay information to the emergency response teams in the event of an accident on the road or in your home.

Participants in the Yellow Dot program place a yellow sticker on the bottom left corner of their vehicle's rear window or on an entrance door or window to their home. This sticker lets emergency response crews know to check the vehicle's glove compartment or the refrigerator for important medical information regarding the victim.

Tucker started its Yellow Dot Program in May, 2018. Police, Fire, and Emergency Medical Providers are trained to recognize the Yellow Dot.

Yellow Dot can be used in conjunction with other safety programs.



Mountain Mums Learn About the Concrete Jungle

Katherine Kennedy, Executive Director of the Concrete Jungle gave the Mountain Mums Garden Club one of the most interesting talks of the year entitled "The Concrete Jungle." The Mountain Mum's March luncheon meeting was held at the home of Lynn Malone in Mountain Creek. Lynn is president of the club and a Master Gardener.

Atlanta is known as a 'city in the middle of a forest' and has one of the most dense tree canopies in the U.S. with over 50% of the city covered. This fact, along with the knowledge that the South is one of the poorest areas of the country, led a small band of friends to come up with an idea that would help those who are food insecure or hungry, have better, fresher, healthier food options.

The Concrete Jungle began by locating fruit trees (apples were the first to be found)

all over the city that were neglected and unpicked. Many of these trees are on roadsides, medians and alleyways. Some are in yards and the fruit is a 'nuisance'. The group has mapped over 3,000 fruit trees and collected more than 300,000 servings of fruit to donate to food pantries and food banks. Along with their farm endeavor this equals the donation of 93,000 pounds of fresh produce. They pick, with the help of volunteers -apples, pears, serviceberries, plums - plus a whole list of other types of fruit trees all over the city.

The 501C3 organization has now expanded its efforts to develop a unique farm called Doghead Farm. In Southwest Atlanta the farm grows produce in 18 x 2 foot ditches that are filled with logs and debris to keep the water available for plants. They farm 5,000 pounds of vegetables - winter squash, turnips, eggplant, kale, carrots, tomatoes, radishes and cucumbers, and more - on one half acre.

The organization also hosts "adventure picks', where, for example, 30 volunteers picked 14-15,000 lbs. of corn. Food pantries and foodbanks, meet the trucks and pick up the produce at the site. They also have 'Fishes and Loaves' classes at Grant Park for cooking, taste testing and soup preparation, which is a way to help people become more familiar with little known fruits and veggies like paw-paw and fennel.

The Concrete Jungle partners with Georgia Tech and other organizations to develop technology wonders like 'noses' that can smell when apples are ripe and sensors the note the 'bend' of the tree branches to determine when they may be ripe. This keeps volunteers from having to check over 3,000 trees across the city to see when the fruit is pick-able.

Finally, the Concrete Jungle hosts fun events like 'Cider-fests', 'weed dating' (pick weeds, meet a potential date). You can find out more about Concrete Jungle by going to concrete-jungle.org.

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
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Amen, Let's Eat!

The Incredible Egg

difference? Let's explore:



Conventional eggs: These are your standard eggs that are branded by your supermarket. The hens that lay them are caged and usually fed grain supplemented with vitamins and minerals.

Omega-3-enriched eggs: Similar conditions to conventional eggs but the chicken feed is supplemented with an omega-3-source like flax seeds.

Organic eggs: The hens were not treated with hormones or antibiotics and receive organic feed. They have enough outside access to be considered "cage free".

Pastured cage-free eggs: Chickens roam free and eat their natural diet of plants and insects supplemented by commercial food.

Chocolate Eggs: Delicious convection that is available in any flavor filling that suits your taste. These are likely to comprise the highest consumption of eggs over the week of Easter.

The only sure way to know which of the above conditions apply to the eggs you buy is to get them directly from the farm or provider.

Basic Deviled Eggs

Everyone "swears by" their own method of boiling an egg. Cook them too long and the yolks will be a lovely shade of grey green with the consistency of a pencil eraser. Not cooking long enough will result in runny yolks. Methods for hard boiled eggs that I have checked out vary in cooking times from 8 to 12 minutes. Most recommend room temperature eggs that are dropped into enough rapidly boiling water to fully cover the eggs. Reduce to medium heat, cover the pot and allow them to boil for 8 minutes. Remove pot from heat, remove eggs and plunge them into ice water for a few minutes before peeling. The basic recipe for six "deviled" eggs is:

Cut peeled eggs lengthwise and remove yolk. To mashed yolks, add 1/3 cup mayonnaise, 1 tsp. mustard, ½ tsp. salt and pepper. Depending on the size of the eggs you might need to adjust the amount of mayonnaise for a creamy texture. Fill egg halves with a spoon or cut the corner from a plastic sandwich bag, spray the interior of the bag with cooking oil spray, fill with egg mixture and "pipe" into the shells. Ingredients to add to the egg mixture could include: Bacon, celery, sweet pickle relish, diced pimentos, goat cheese, smoked salmon or any other favorite ingredient. Decorate the top with sprigs of parsley or sprinkle on the paprika. Older eggs are easier to shell due to the membrane that surrounds the egg which becomes denser with age. Begin peeling egg from the large end where the "pocket" of air resides. Cooked boiled eggs will last up to one week in the refrigerator in the shell and a couple of days out of shell. My best advice if you are unsure of cooking time is to experiment with boiling a few eggs before you agree to provide all the deviled eggs for Easter lunch.

Cracking the Carton Code:

Notice all the numbers on the end of your egg carton. The "sell by" date is the date the store must remove them from the shelves. Eggs are consumable for at least 10 days after that date. If you are buying fresh eggs from a local farmer, be sure the dates on the cartons are correct.

Speaking of cracking, NEVER use an egg that is cracked in the carton. Once the shell is cracked bacteria can get in the shell and have a field day multiplying. Always open the carton before buying the eggs to be sure they are all intact. If you accidentally crack an egg once you bring them home, you can take it out of the shell and store in a plastic container for up to two days and then use it only for baking. Never store the broken shell with the egg.
