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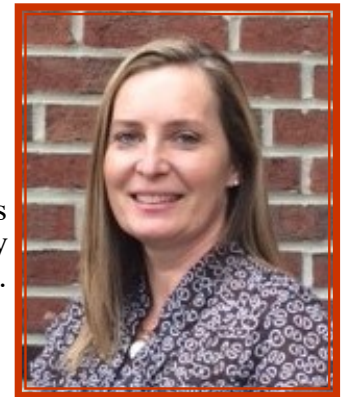

President's Message

A Personal Learning Network (PLN) is essential to maintaining the focus, motivation, and growth required of today's educators.

- Personal refers to meeting the specific needs of the teacher and allowing the teacher to make connections and build relationships that are relevant to him/her.
- Learning goes beyond content to the sharing of innovative ideas and expertise of those participating.
- Network takes the experience to a more diverse perspective spanning not only state and region, but ultimately the globe.

When developed and utilized effectively, PLNs are a way for educators to stay up-to-date on the latest teaching techniques, pedagogies, and changes in education, specifically

in areas where they need it. Effective educators participating in learning

networks are able to model for students the process of analyzing and validating information from a variety of sources and collaborative efforts.

Personal Learning Networks can come in many different forms: Professional Organization Membership; Educational Service Units; Social Media (Twitter, Facebook, Google+, Instagram, LinkedIn); School/District Peers; or Online Blogs, Articles or Publications.

So, think about your Personal Learning Network? If you need to get started, determine your preferred tools and who you want to connect with. Once these are identified, decide your preferences for how and when you want to learn. If you are involved in PLNs, take some time to reflect on the level of your participation and if it is meeting your needs. Whether face-to-face or online, as a contributor or an observer, the style is up to you and the experience is what you make it!

Will There Be Someone to Take My Place???

It is a problem and it seems to be growing. Some of the smallest school districts are having trouble filling slots when filling a Business opening. Urban school districts are seeing the same issue in many areas. The threat of not having enough candidates has led school administrators to cut programs, shrink offerings, or place teachers into classrooms outside of their endorsement training. There is a point in time where we all desire to leave the classroom for a variety of reasons including retirement, movement into administrative or collegiate level education positions, or simply those wanting an industry change. The thirty-year, career teacher also doesn't seem to be the norm as data on the millennial generation shows career movement every five-to-ten years.

During a recent panel discussion in Washington, D.C. on the Teacher Education Pipeline, Mary Jo Self, Associate Professor and Program Coordinator of Workforce and Adult Education, Career and Technical Education from the College of Education at Oklahoma State University shared that there are three new R's in education – specifically recruitment of teacher education candidates.

Recruitment – As professional educators, we need to recruit others into our own profession. I have witnessed students be most engaged around their CTSO (e.g., BPA, DECA, FBLA) advisers yet the number of CTSO students that go on to a career in Business Education is very minimal.

Retain – We need to make sure we are working with new teachers to keep them. The first three years of an educator's career are extremely formative. Classroom and professional habits are developed and either a true love for teaching is acquired or is lost forever. Too often, we silo ourselves into our classrooms when we should be sharing and collaborating with that new teacher next door. Business Education is even more challenging as most Business, Marketing, and Information Technology teachers have multiple preps in very diverse areas – often very different from the teacher next door.

Reward – Finally, we need to increase the satisfaction of teachers in their classroom. Professional associations like NBEA play an important role in rewarding their members with linkages to content information, recognition and award programs, and rewarding and relevant professional development to refocus skills. Administrators often find that it is the smallest things that will reward a teacher for their hard work and dedication. This can come through direct instructional coaching or schoolwide recognition for success in the classroom and school community.

Often, we look to others to lead a charge like this. It can be most impactful to have those of us in the trenches reach out and do their part to make sure these three R's are met so that your classroom and program has a succession plan.

Legislative Bill 465 Update

Mona Schoenrock, Project Manager, The Nebraska Microsoft IT Initiative

Senator Dan Watermier, Legislative District #1, introduced LB465 to reinstate the funds for the Nebraska Information Technology Initiative.

If LB465 is funded, the Initiative will be able to continue providing the productivity and computer science curriculum as well as the MOS certification exams to Nebraska public high schools and community college campuses.

Testimony for LB465 was heard by the Appropriations Committee on Tuesday, March 7. Testifying on behalf of the bill were Darci Karr, Hastings High School, Shawna Garland, Bruning-Davenport Unified School District, Terri Tiedeman, Southeast Community College-Lincoln Campus; Keely Reinert, York High School; two students from York High School; and one student from Hastings High School. Over 175 letters written by business teachers and students were also presented to the Appropriations Committee to support LB465.

LB465 status will be determined before the Legislature session concludes late this spring.
