We discussed what the campers are supposed to do when they get to Cobb Ridge campground after the expansion is finished. Jim said the standard practice is for the camper to pick a site, then go back to the host to pay. If you are going down to ride, but not camp, you will need to park at Camp Ridge camp ground or down at the pavillion in the KC campground. They are going to see how things work out, but the riding permits will still be purchased at Kay's in Chadwick.

Things are looking good with the Ozark Mountain Trail Riders. We have had several very successful events, like the float trip back in August, October's enduro, the New Year's Day clean up and trail ride and most recently the work day at Chadwick on February 1. 
The next meeting is March 19 at the Repair Shop at 2251 E. Kearney at 7:00 PM.

fast as possible. The winner is usually determined by the rider that has the fastest combined

time throught the special tests.

The last time I talked to Mel at Action Cycle, approximately 400 people have made reservations for the St. Louis supercross.



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



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# Riding the Net

You're thinking to yourself: Why do I want to read this article? I don't know a scroll bar from a food bar. Ok, I do know a food bar when I see one, in fact I take food very seriously. But, I don't have a computer and I am NOT a nerd. What can a dirt biker do on the internet?

First, there is e-mail. This is so handy if most of the dirt bikers you know require a long distance call. When you sign up for the internet, you get to make up an e-mail address for yourself. It

makes it very easy and fast to send a message to other people with e-mail, and if you want to send copies to other people, this can be done with just a few simple mouse clicks.

Then, there are web pages. Every manufacturer and almost every aftermarket company has a web page. Most of these web pages are just advertising; they give you bike specs etc. On of the aftermarket side: <a href="www.eric-gorr.com">www.eric-gorr.com</a> is one of my favorites. He has a lot of good technical

stuff. Eric Gorr used to do the "Ask Dr. Dirt" in Dirt Rider until he quit in November. It looks like he will be focusing on a new company, Max Power Cylinders Inc., a British joint venture located in Madison, Wisconsin.

Another good web site is <a href="https://www.weather.com">www.weather.com</a>. You are asking yourself, what does the weather channel have to do with dirt bkes? You can use it to get a local five day forecast for any major city. This is very handy when the race is eight hours

Then of course there is www.cyclenews.com. Thev have the virtual grandstand. They have someone at all the Supercross races to update the website as the race progresses. You get to find out the results of the race as soon as it is over. This is the first one to add to your list of favorites! I just found out it was an all Yamaha podium for the 250 class in Atlanta with McGrath, Button and Windham.

www.motocross.com is another popular site. They have a motocross/dirt bike chat room.


This is kind of interesting. You just don't know who you will find in there. Sometimes it is just a bunch of 15 year olds. And since I have not been 15 for a very long time, I find this kind of boring. Other times there will be more older riders. (They also have a vet chat room, but most of the time I find this empty. Maybe I have just been there at the wrong time.) There is a moderator, so if one of the kids gets out of hand, like sending the same message over and over, thus filling up the screen, or using bad language, they are booted.

If you do find older riders, it is fun to just start bench racing. I

have started "chatting" with someone and found they are from around here and have ridden in races that I have ridden in or have ridden at Chadwick.

One of my favorite things on the internet is called a newsgroup. The one for dirt bikes is called rec.motorcycle.dirt. It gives you access to dirt bikers all over the country. If you have a question about some obscure brand or older motorcycle, there is a good chance somebody might be able to help. When a new model is released, you will see posting asking about it, for example, you might see a message like "has anyone ridden the new

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YZ400F." Then, there will be responses and maybe more questions.

Something very similar to the newsgroup is the message board at www.motocross.com. It was through the message board that I started communicating with an enduro rider from Finland. I received this e-mail from him. I have not edited it, so you can see a few errors in his English, but he writes much better English then I write Finnish. Hi Bob, my name in Jani Hovi and I'm from Finland. You were interested about Finish enduro. Our National series start at 1.March and it has seven races and it finishes at fall. Our races are the same like the Six days enduro. Races are about 100-150 kilometers all but one race, the one race is called Päijäänteen Ympäriajo it is at 17.-19. April and it is about 1000 kilometers long. It has about 30 special stages, and the special stages lasts 10 minutes to one hour. We start the race at friday at 2.00 pm and come to break at 6.00 pm. At saturday we start at 6.00 am and finish the day at 6.00 pm. And the final

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day sunday we start also at 6.00 am and finish the race about 3.00 pm. It long and we hard race. Normaly our races lasts only one day and start about 9.00 am and finish about 4.00 pm. In normal races we have about 6 - 8

other messege later. What do you think of that? It doesn't sound like many wimps are going to ride or at least finsh the Päijäänteen Ympäriajo.

This is just the tip of the icebreg. There are many more web sites to visit and other chat rooms. I have found the internet a good way to find out what is going on in other parts of the country or find out race results as soon as they happen.
