Crisis Point

When televisions first came out it was said that radios would soon be obsolete. The same was said about bicycles when cars started to roll out. Today radios are built into cars and bicycle paths are built next to roads. The same has been said about libraries. It is now clear that libraries contain more than books — and a multitude of industries base their projections on libraries.

One example is the National Association of Realtors. Based upon their research, a community with a library (with or without a school) is a key indicator of the economic desirability of the area. If a community does not have a library the property values are significantly lower. A good example of this are urban communities where libraries closed: the property values lowered as much as 75% within three months, but communities retaining their library remain stable and increase in value.



Another example is the barometer used by government agencies. A library indicates a strong community with high voter input, and therefore, is more seriously considered for investment in maintenance and improvement

funds (i.e., our soon-to-be available medical center).

In communities where the library is obviously and actively involved, the community benefits in other areas as well. Businesses invest in those communities, banks are willing to invest (loans, mortgages, etc.). In other words, a library is an indicator of the strength, reliability, and viability of that community, and hence, a sign that the community is worthy of investment.



Our impact in the Rio Abajo community has been significant. In 18 years, we have worked hard to elevate our kids' potential, and have done so successfully. 1999 the graduation rate for our kids was 17%. Today our kids have a 96% graduation rate, and more than 70% of these graduates go to college. The newsletter we created is a strong platform to lobby for investment and support. which means we have a medical center being built, small businesses are coming in, and banks have reclassified our area from a "red zone" (indicating dubious investment) and we are now a "green zone" - which makes getting mortgages, business loans, etc. easier to get.

Despite hopeful plans for two major summer programs and organizing additional involvement for future projects with other organizations and agencies, this may all come to a screeching halt. Our present Goodwill Trainee, Fay Stone, will be leaving us in June.

We continue to write grant proposals and send out pleas to every agency, organization and person we can find for funding, but there is a crippling perception issue. Libraries are perceived to receive funding from taxes and bonds sufficient to pay for staff, and everything else.. Our library is unique — we survive with donations and donations, but the RAC Library is quickly coming to a serious crossroad

Rio Abajo Community Library receives about \$7,000 per year from the State and about \$1,500 a year from the County. The costs for lights, heat, phone and internet exceed that amount. This has meant that the cost of everything (i.e., paper, printer ink, pens, books, etc) have been met with donations and fund raisers (i.e., St. Paddy's Day Bingo and Hispanic Month Loteria). We don't have paid staff – we have the Director (who receives a small stipend to help cover her costs), a Goodwill Industries' minimum wage trainee, and volunteers who occasionally help with the maintenance, projects and fund raisers. Goodwill Industries has advised we will not be getting a new The work was always trainee. overwhelming with two people,

but it will be a physical impossibility with only one.

So, we now desperately need your help. Do you know where we could possibly get some funding? We would need exact names, address and phone number, not vague suggestions. Is anyone available to donate one or more days each week? This would be a strong commitment to the community because once the summer programs begin, we will be needing people to help with a large number of kids.



We will continue to work hard to meet all the needs of the community. We have our books, magazines, newspapers, computers, free internet, notary public, copy/faxing center, newsletter, research tools, classes, meeting facilities, tutoring, and snacks. All this and more will continue to be available to everyone until the community decides we are not needed.



Gas Pump Skimming

Have you ever used a credit or debit card to purchase gasoline at the pump? If so, you may want to learn how to protect yourself from having your card information stolen.



When you pay at the pump, there's a possibility for thieves to steal your credit card information using skimmers. Thieves attach skimming devices to the card

scanner, and the devices capture the account data from cards used to purchase gas without interfering with the purchase. In petroleum dispensers, the devices are often attached directly to a circuit board on the card reader on the inside of the dispenser.

The cardholder is unaware that the data has been compromised until it has been used to make unauthorized purchases.

The New Mexico Department of Agriculture (NMDA) not only supports the viability of agriculture, supports the beneficial use of natural resources, promotes food protection and global

marketing, but is also responsible for consumer protection and regulatory compliance.

The NMDA Standards and Consumer Services Division (SCS) is responsible for enforcing New Mexico's weights and

measures laws and regulations. Petroleum and fuel pumps fall into this category. The petroleum standards program is responsible for inspection and testing of all commercial petroleum measuring devices and ensuring product quality for gasoline, diesel, kerosene, brake fluid, antifreeze and lubricating oil.

"While collecting petroleum samples for testing or inspecting pumps, inspectors may come across a skimmer device," said New Mexico Secretary of Agriculture Jeff Witte. "SCS staff works closely with law enforcement regarding this issue."

As a consumer, the following steps may help protect yourself from being a victim of skimming at the fuel pump:

- Pull on the credit card reader to ensure it is permanent
- Check for audit tape to ensure no one has tampered with the dispenser
- Choose a fuel pump that's in the cashier's sight
- Go inside and pay with cash

If you discover a credit card skimmer at the pump, report it to authorities as well as to the store manager. To report identify theft, call the Federal Trade Commission at 877-438-4338 or visit www.identitytheft.gov.

New Mexico fuel retailers are asked to contact NMDA SCS staff at 575-646-1616 as soon as

possible after a skimmer is found. SCS also provides information to retailers and repair establishments regarding steps to take if a skimmer is discovered.

Rosemary for Chickens

Rosemary, an intensely fragrant herb from the Mediterranean.

looks like lavender, but is actually related to mint. It has been used since ancient times for a variety of health reasons for humans, and makes a nice seasoning.

From an aromatherapy standpoint, rosemary can be used in a chickens' nesting area to calm and soothe laying or sitting hens. Fresh or dried, sprinkling some rosemary around the coop can help relax the flock. Smelling rosemary also improves their immune systems and

immune systems and enhances respiratory health.

Rosemary is edible, so it's a good to plant around the coop or run. Its also a well-known pesticide, so it helps keep the coop and run free of flies and mosquitoes.

Containing anti-inflammatory properties, rosemary can be applied to a sore or sprained leg or foot to reduce swelling and provide pain relief to your hens. It is believes to help fight staph infections, so it's a great choice to treat bumblefoot.



Lastly, rosemary improves circulation, which is important when chickens are sitting on a clutch of eggs. During the three-week incubation period.

hens don't get up very much, so tucking fresh rosemary under her can be very beneficial. She doesn't need to eat the rosemary to glean its benefits; the contact between her bare breast and the oils in the needles will cause the oils to be absorbed into her skin.

When harvesting fresh rosemary, put some aside to hang in your

coop or scatter in the nesting area for better chicken health.

laboratory sweetener high fructose corn syrup, or HFCS.

So if you like to keep some ginger ale in your fridge for those times when your stomach goes on the fritz, ditch the big names and pick up a brand that's made using cane sugar. Or better yet, try making some of your own. You can easily do that by buying some liquid ginger extract, which is now available in many supermarkets, and adding it to some club soda along with sugar to taste or even some stevia. You can also simmer ginger root in a small amount of water and use it the same way.

However you use ginger, you'll be enjoying something that not only tastes good, but has a host of medicinal benefits as well.
