

POTATOES STOCKED SEASONALLY

Norland: Early (55 - 60 days) Round red. Early maturity. Plants medium size, spreading. Tubers round to oblong with smooth skin and shallow eyes. Good yielding ability. Moderate scab resistance.

Note: Red Norland and Dark Red Norland possess similar characteristics as Norland except for darker red color. Excellent early market varieties. Russett.

Superior: Early (55 - 60 days) Round white. Medium early maturity. Plants medium size, upright, but large. Spreading growth possible under optimum conditions. Tubers uniform with slightly netted skin. Excellent chipping quality and table appeal. Scab resistant, but susceptible to late blight and early blight. Greatest potential shown under irrigation.

Yukon Gold: Early - Mid (55 - 75 days) a cultivar of potato closely akin to the Yellow Finn. Unlike the Yellow Finn, Yukon Golds are larger, with golden, waxy flesh. This potato is best served boiled or baked, although sometimes preferred to the standard Russett for french fries made using the "Robuchon" method - started in cold oil. They can also be served mashed and are a chief ingredient in Yukon Gold hash.

Kennebec: Mid Season: (70 - 80 days) The Maine potato. Will never fail you. Do well in harsh conditions. Light tan skin, shallow eyes and white flesh. A consistent potato and a good keeper. Those who eat potatoes every day will not tire of Kennebec's great flavor. Some disease resistance.

Russett Burbank: Late (85 - 95 days) The Idaho potato that Idaho built its reputation on. Also known as the "Idaho Netted Gem" or simply "The Russett". It is the most widely grown potato in the U.S. Plants very large, spreading. Tubers large, long, cylindrical to flattened with heavy netted skin. Secondary growth can cause very rough tubers. Excellent cooking and processing qualities. Somewhat scab resistant.
