Principal's Message

Set SMART Goals in the New Year! By Mrs. Little

Welcome to 2018! The new year is an awesome time to teach your children about goal setting. Hundreds of studies demonstrate the effectiveness of specific goal setting in helping both children and adults to achieve their goals. Goal setting is a great family activity where you can model and support effective strategies and demonstrate to your child that productive adults are always learning and growing too! Goals can be academic, social, or extracurricular. The science of goal setting tells us that the most effective goals are:

S-pecific. For example "invite at least two new friend for a play date", is more specific than "make more friends".

M-easurable- Students should think about how they will track their results. Self- made charts can be an effective tool. Even many older kids are still motivated by sticker and star charts!

A-ttainable- Going from a D to an A in math might not be attainable, but improving the math grade by at least 10% by spending 20 minutes a week reviewing math concepts on Khan academy is!

R-ealistic- Pie in the sky goals like become an "NBA player", are great, but breaking them down into specific actions, like learning to make a free throw shot consistently, are much more realistic.

T-imely-Students need to think about what can be accomplished in the time they can track. For younger kids, a month may be a long term goal, while our 5th-6th graders can carry a goal through the year, with intermediate checks along the way.

Secrets of Goal Setting

- Write clear and measurable goals.
- Create a specific action plan for each goal.



- Read your goals daily and visualize yourself accomplishing them.
- Reflect on your progress to see if you are on target.
- Revise your action plans if needed.
- Celebrate your accomplishments.

Working together as a family to set, track, and model goals is an outstanding way to model successful strategies for learning and personal growth for your child. Even better, teaching your child to support everyone in the family as they try to reach their goal helps to foster empathy. Here is to a successful 2018 for all!

From the Health Office

The health and well-being of each child attending our school is very important to us. Please help us keep our school healthy, especially as we step into this early cold/flu season, by keeping your student home when he/she is sick. Although we emphasize good attendance for all students, we recognize children do get sick. Keeping ill children at home helps prevent the spread of disease and is essential for our students with impaired immune- systems. Please talk to your student about positive prevention techniques such as hand washing, coughing into the elbow, and refraining from sharing food and drink. If your child has a major or chronic health concern, please call the school and ask to speak with our school nurse so that we may support your child's needs at school. Doctor's notes are always welcome to document a medical absence and safe return to school.

The health and well-being of each child attending our school is very important to us. Keeping sick children at home helps prevent the spread of disease and is **essential for our students with impaired immune systems**. The following district guidelines can be helpful when determining if a child is well enough to attend school:



| Signs & Symptoms | Healthy & Ready to Attend School |
|--|--|
| Fever: 100° or higher | No fever for 24 hours and child feels well again. |
| Runny nose with thick or colored secretions | No drainage for 24 hours and child feels well again. However, if drainage persists a written medical release stating the child is not contagious is required prior to returning to school. |
| Diarrhea Vomiting | No diarrhea and/or vomiting for 24 hours. Child feels well again and is able to eat without stomach upset. |
| Persistent ear ache and/or drainage; Sore throat and/or difficulty swallowing | Seek medical advice to determine if medication is needed. Child may return after 24 hours of prescribed medication and feels well again. |
| Redness of the eyes or eyelids, watery eyes, and/or discharge | Seek medical advice. Prescribed medication has been started and eyes are not watery, red, draining, or sensitive to light. Or a written medical release stating the child is not contagious. |
| Unusual spots, rashes, or oozing areas not associated with injury | Seek medical advice to determine if spot, rash, or oozing area is a result of an infectious process. A written medical release stating the child is not contagious is required prior to returning to school. |
