Insurance Check-Up for 2013


Where did 2012 go? It seems like it was summer yesterday and Easter was last week.

"Happy New Year," or should I say "Happy (secular) New Year?" If you ever wish Fr. Glenn "Happy New Year" on January 1, he will tell you that the new year began five weeks ago on the first Sunday in Advent. Oh well.... If, like many, you are one that makes resolutions for the new year, hopefully you haven't failed yet in keeping them. Fortunately, most of the Christmas cookies are gone at home so one of my resolutions will be a little easier to keep. In addition, I hope you made some resolutions that will help your spiritual life. If you did, I have great news for you. The month of February is just full of ways to help you.





Spiritual Growth Corner by George Kalil

Lent has officially begun. I know because I had the ashes on my forehead to prove it last Wednesday. You don't usually think of getting gifts during Lent; that is for Christmas when the Baby Jesus is brand new and not making His way to Jerusalem and His death on a cross. Nevertheless, a gift is exactly what we have gotten this year. Now some of us may not look at this as a gift; after all, the Pope recently announced he was retiring from the papacy. But a gift it is, and it is given during the perfect time of the liturgical year.

Over the next 40 days, you are going to have plenty of opportunities to evangelize, which is what we are all called to do because we have been baptized. Both Pope John Paul II and Benedict XVI have talked to us extensively about this mission of ours. We will have many chances to tell people about our faith in these next 40 days. There will be plenty of misunderstanding about the process of choosing a new pope. The secular press will be talking about moving the church into the 21st century, hoping to find someone that will change the teachings on contraception, women priests, abortion, and any other teaching that they think we, as Catholics, have all wrong. They will look at this like a political election, which it isn't. They don't understand that the Holy Spirit is who picks the new pope, if the Cardinals step aside and allow Him to do it. This is where our gifts come in. It is our responsibility to speak up, in a charitable and loving way, and let them know that they are wrong, that there are truths of the Church that cannot be changed because they were taught by Jesus and then entrusted to the Catholic Church, the one He established, to be protected and passed on. To do this, we need to understand what we believe and why.

Part two of the gift: Pope Benedict XVI has proclaimed this the Year of Faith. What better way is there to strengthen our faith than to learn more about it so we can explain it to others? If you don't understand, find out. There are many opportunities: Catholic TV and radio; the Bishop's website; and the Catechism of the Catholic Church. We aren't called "Knights" because we are afraid to talk about and explain our faith to others, both Catholics and non-Catholics. We are called Knights because we are unafraid to battle the secularism that is undermining what we believe. Take heart and prepare for those evangelism opportunities. Remember that some gifts shouldn't or can't be returned. This is one of them.

In addition, remember to join us in praying our 359th consecutive Rosary at St. Vincent on Friday, March 1, 2013, at 7:30 p.m. Stations of the Cross in English begin at 6:30, a bilingual Mass at 7 p.m. and the Rosary will follow at 7:30. You are welcome to join us for any or all of these special opportunities to grow in your faith this Lent. God Bless.

Annuities: More flexible than you might think

Annuities are easily misunderstood, in part because of their name. When you "annuitize" the money you've paid into an annuity (plus the interest it has earned), you've chosen to receive monthly payments for life or for a fixed period.

However, annuitizing this money isn't your only option. You may also treat an annuity like a Certificate of Deposit (CD). That is, you use the annuity as a way to accumulate savings and earn a steady interest rate. You can make withdrawals from the annuity for any reason, although you may then owe income tax on some or the entire withdrawal amount. If you do choose to annuitize, you also have several payout options. The point is these products are flexible enough to serve a variety of needs.

Faith. Pope Benedict declared a Year of Faith starting in October 2012 and ending in November 2013. We are better than half way through it. Have you been focusing on it as he suggested? When it started, Vicki and I decided that we would pray the Apostle's Creed together everyday. Well, we started out fine, but somewhere along the way, we kind of lost it. We got too busy and didn't take the time or whatever. Isn't that how it usually goes?

I was reading a reflection the other morning titled "Living as We Believe." It was a challenge. It talked about the mission we were given by Jesus to "Proclaim the Kingdom of Heaven." It is about proclaiming that Jesus is love. It asked how we did this without appearing to be a "couple of fries short of a Happy Meal." It went on to say that we do it by "living as if we believe that loving God and neighbor is really what it is all about." That is what Jesus taught us. Do we believe it? Do we live it? Only Having "Through Work" Insurance Doesn't Work



"Then God said: 'Let us make man in our image, after our likeness." (Gen. 1:26) We have heard all of our lives that we are made in the image and likeness of God. Now you know where that comes from, but what does it mean for us? Does it mean He looks like me, or my wife, or my best friend? Is He black or white or red or yellow? Does He look like a Scandinavian with long, blonde hair or an Arab with short, dark hair (personally, I like this one better)? As an aside, if you go to St. John, IN, and visit the Shrine of the Passion of Christ (and if you haven't, you should), make sure to visit the church at the top of the hill if possible. The statues are beautiful, and Joseph, Mary, and Jesus look more Mediterranean than most you see.

We could discuss this all day, but I think we might be missing the point. It isn't what we look like on the *outside* that makes us in His image but what we look like on the *inside*. How do I love others? How do I forgive others? How do I treat others? Is it the way God does? Jesus came to Earth and took on our humanity so He could show us how to live in His image. God could have saved mankind with a single word, but He chose not to. He sent His only Son to live with us and show us how to live in His image. If you want to know how to do this, read the Bible. Read the four Gospels and the accounts of Jesus' life. See how He treated His enemies and His friends. See how He prayed and lived and then try to follow that example.

"Okay, I have done that," you say. How do I know if I am being successful? You have a simple report card. When others encounter you, do they see you or Jesus? When we become like John the Baptist and become small so Christ can become great, we have passed. When others see Jesus through us more often than they see us, we are passing the test. As Fr. Glen likes to say, "That isn't natural; it is supernatural." We can only do it with God's help. We need to pray, but I will save that for another time.

Personally, I want my pilot to be "on" during take offs and landings. You really appreciate a rested and alert pilot when you are landing at night in a thunderstorm (that and having a Rosary handy really helps). While we don't have auto-pilot in cars yet, they are testing driverless cars (welcome to the world of George Jetson!). We do have cruise control and what a blessing that is. Those 7-hour drives to Grammas with the kids were a whole lot easier when we had a car with that option. Both of these inventions are great and things that we can't imagine living without.

Neither of them is at all useful, however, when it comes to worshipping God. Most of us have been attending Sunday Mass for all of our lives and since the midsixties, worship has been in English. A lot of the prayers we say are the same each week. We may pay a bit more attention to the ones that are different. But how often are we just on auto-pilot or cruise control during Mass on Sunday? If you are like me, more times than we want to admit.

Habits are hard to break so I am going to suggest just a couple of things to work on. Start with the Creed. The next time you say the Creed, think about what you are saying. You are stating the church's and our beliefs in this one prayer. Do we really *believe* what we are saying? Do we say it with the conviction we have when we are defending our beloved football team to a non-fan or a "hater?" Tell someone from this area that you don't like Notre Dame football, and you will get an idea of what I mean. Next, think about the words of the "Our Father" when you say it. Are we actually living what we say? Are we forgiving the way we want God to forgive us? We need to truly pray these prayers and not just recite them on auto-pilot.

The most disheartening is our response to the prayers at the Consecration. Do we truly listen to what the priest is saying? Do we tune out everything else and pay attention? Do we realize what is happening on that altar every Sunday? The God of the Universe is becoming present in the form of a host to be with us, the ones that He loves. He comes to feed us with His own Body and Blood. We want to be "on" for this, not on auto-pilot. Give these things a try next week and see if it makes a difference. As Fr. Larry Richards would say, "Get it, got it, do it!"



The Pitfalls of Replacing Coverage

We all know the old adage, "The grass seems greener on the other side of the fence." When it comes to replacing your existing Knights of Columbus life insurance with coverage offered by another company, the adage holds true. Perceptions are deceiving. A move to *the other side of the fence* might seem like a good one, but it can leave you with less *green* in your wallet — in some cases, a lot less. That's why it pays to remember another old saying, "Read the fine print."

There are many reasons to keep your existing coverage in force, whether that coverage is with the Knights of Columbus or with another company. I'll focus on the potential pitfalls of replacing coverage here — pitfalls that an agent trying to convince you that the grass actually is greener might neglect to mention. First, all life insurance contracts contain a *contestability period*, which allows the insure to contest claims made for a period — typically two years — after the

contract is issued. Chances are this is no longer an issue with your current coverage.
 Second, it's unlikely that you can obtain the same amount of coverage, for the same premium, that you were able to obtain with your existing contract. The two factors that determine how much you'll need to pay for life insurance coverage are age and health. Certainly, you're older now than you were when you took out your current coverage. There's no way around that one. And you have to ask yourself, "Has my health changed during that time?" Is your blood pressure the same? Your cholesterol? Have you gained weight? All these factors can affect the amount of coverage you'll get for your premium dollar.

If someone encourages you to replace — or worse, drop — your existing coverage, please call me. I'll show you how your existing coverage is working for you and why replacement is rarely in your best interest.
