


NASCAR Atlanta Motor Speedway – High 51 Low 48 Rainy and foggy

Saturday was his big day. We headed towards the track. This is the entrance to the tunnel that takes you into the infield.







It's Christmas time and Christkindlmarkets are everywhere!

When one thinks of Christmas markets, Germany always comes to mind. It's one of the countries with numerous Christmas markets known as Christkindlmarkets. However, these markets fill the squares of towns and villages throughout Europe and aren't just in Germany.

The Frankfurt Christmas Market is the largest German market held outside of Germany. The markets offer the perfect setting to get into the holiday spirit, with the sweet aroma of drinks, pastries and lots of goodies. The market stalls are full of holiday trinkets and there is even the echo of Christmas jingles in the air.



However, if you don't have the time or money to sneak off to Germany for Christmas, why not visit one much closer? We've done this a couple times and I must say, it will definitely put you in the Christmas spirit.



Every year the Christkindlmarket opens in Chicago. The city turns its Daley Plaza into an European Christmas village filled with candy cane striped wooden huts. There are about 60 vendors at the market selling hand-made holiday ornaments, nutcrackers, cuckoo-clocks, toys, jewelry, and much more. There's a sit down tent where specialty foods such as sausages, potato pancakes, schnitzel, and pretzels are offered. Imported German beer and Glühwein (hot spicy wine) in a souvenir mug is available.

"Jingle Bells" was written for Thanksgiving, not Christmas. The song was written in 1857 and published under the title "One Horse Open Sleigh". "Jingle Bells" was also the first song to be broadcast from space.

The first artificial Christmas Tree wasn't a tree at all. It was created out of goose feathers that were dyed green. The first artificial Christmas trees were developed in Germany in the 19th century. During the early 20th century they finally made their way to the US.

Santa's Red Suit - Though Santa Claus has worn blue and white and green in the past, his traditional red suit came from a 1930s ad by Coca Cola.

Rudolph almost didn't have a red nose either: At the time, a red nose was a sign of chronic alcoholism and Montgomery Ward thought he would look like a drunkard.

Lot Improvement Refresher

Lot improvements are a continual thing at RoVer's Roost. That's a good thing because it brings in new leaseholders and gives the rest of us pride in our winter home. There have been some questions on how this is handled not only from new leaseholders but also from those who have been here for some time.

Pick up the forms from the office before you start. Detailed directions are available on that form. Once completed drop that form off with one of the Lot Improvement Committee Members. A list of those members are listed on the bulletin board next to the office.

. LOT IMPROVEMENT REQUIREMENTS.

Leaseholder will complete and submit a Lot Improvement Request, and receive written approval from the Lot Improvement Committee prior to commencing improvements. See Enclosure 1.

- Leaseholder will locate and mark with string line his/her lot lines prior to submitting lot improvement request for shed construction, pouring any concrete slabs or building any fences. Leaseholder will mark the four (4) foot offset for forms
 and storage shed site. These are to be verified by the Lot Improvement Committee.
- 3. Leaseholder will get Lot Improvement Committee members who approved his/her request, if available, to verify by measurement that concrete forms, prior to pouring; or shed, prior to sheathing, meet approved setbacks and/or height requirements.
- 4. The Lot Improvement Committee must approve all pre-built storage sheds. The leaseholder will provide manufacturer's data and name with the lot improvement request.
- 5. Any other additions permanently mounted and not specifically mentioned, i.e. flag poles, windsock poles, etc., must be approved by the Lot Improvement Committee.
- 6. Leaseholder shall ensure all receipts, etc. that are placed in their file relating to any improvement shall show a legible date and amount.

We're Pet Friendly but



Just about the most frequent complaint heard at the "Roost" is about people not cleaning up after their dogs. There really is no excuse for this whether you are in the park or on the walking trails around the nearby perimeter. If your dog drops, pick it up.


