3rd Sunday Easter Luke 24:35-48



The two disciples recounted what had taken place on the way, and how Jesus was made known to them in the breaking of bread. While they were still speaking about this, he stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you." But they were startled and terrified and thought that they were seeing a ghost. Then he said to them, "Why are you troubled? And why do questions arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet, that it is I myself. Luke 24:13-35

Dear St Anthony & Pius X Church Families,

Here we are at the 3rd Sunday of Easter already! We are reading the conclusion to the story from Luke 24 about the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. They encounter the Living Christ, yet they do not realize it at first. They listen to Jesus speak and reflect upon scripture history and recent events first, and then while they stop to pray in the breaking of the bread, they realize, 'This is Christ risen!' Immediately afterward, they race back to the other disciples to tell them about it. And just as they get into telling the details of their miraculous experience, suddenly Jesus shows again! Jesus appears right there in their midst, validating their story and confirming the reality of His Resurrection to all the disciples gathered there. Some individuals had been bumping into the resurrected Jesus at different times and in different places, but in this episode, the earliest followers are all there together in one place. Luke 24:33 says the whole assembly gathered consisted of "the eleven and those with them..." Like a good team meeting, the gang is all here, and Jesus teaches them a personal bible study of prophecy fulfilled in his life and death (the two disciples got an early preview on the road in Luke 24:27). Teaching the whole group now, Jesus says in Luke 24:44-45 "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the law of Moses and in the prophets and psalms must be fulfilled.' Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures..."We aren't told how long this personal bible study lasted, but if Jesus detailed all of the passages from the Old Testament prophecies and law that referred to Him, it could have been a while. Teaching for long intervals (Preachers perk up!) was not new to Jesus (keep in mind that Jesus had taught crowds 'marathon-style' before as Luke 21:37 says Jesus taught 'all day in temple' and retired at night to Mt of Olives' or Mark 4:2 says He 'taught them at length in parables'-Jesus even refers to 12 hour workdays in John 11:9). Maybe this accounts for why so many of the first speeches of Peter, Stephen and John in the Acts of the Apostles tend to be long sermons too. They followed this model of Jesus. They tended to review Old Testament history, tracing in detail how Jesus fulfilled the pattern-prophecies of the patriarchs about the expected Messiah. Look them up, as Peter's first of many speeches is found in Acts 2:14-39, 3:13-26, or Stephen's is in Acts--7:2-53, or Philip's in Acts 8:30-35, or Paul's in Acts 13:16-41. The Book of Acts is almost filled with early church sermons. They say there are over 26 inspired speeches in Acts of Apostles, eight by Peter, nine by Paul, and a couple by James among others. Yes, that is a lot of holy preaching-but I suggest that such motivating and inspired preaching is what accounts for the divine spread and rapid growth of the Early Church from the first 12 to many thousands within ten years of Jesus' resurrection! Of course, it is the Holy Spirit that Jesus said would 'provide their words' in Luke 12:12 "the Holy Spirit will teach you what you should say...." Interestingly, though, we call the book 'Acts of the Apostles'-not 'speeches of the apostles! But again, the Word is God's!

Speaking of studying the word, someone reminded me once that at this personal bible study that Jesus conducts for His disciples, they had refreshments! They did! They had baked fish (Luke 24:41-42). This person suggested that we should always have fresh doughnuts at our studies. Yes, I like to say that we Catholics always connect food fellowship with our prayer gatherings. There is always food at church meetings, maybe not a lot but something little to share and enjoy. But, in its most sacramental form, that holy food shared turns out to be Jesus Himself, the Holy Eucharist. Luke chapter 24 is a great teaching both to find the form/pattern for our mass but also our Catholic teaching on Christ's real presence in the elements of bread and wine that become His body and blood. The Early Church referred to their sacramental meal as the 'Breaking of the Bread' (this becomes 'Mass'). This phrase 'Breaking Bread' shows up in Luke 24:30, 35, Acts 2:42, 2:46, 20:7, 27:35 and St Paul uses it in 1 Corinthians 10:16 & 11:23-24, not to mention the last supper accounts of Jesus' own words. Our Eucharistic belief and practice is all there from the beginning. I encourage to everyone an Easter season re-reading of the Last supper from the four gospels and the Breaking Bread passages from Acts and St Paul.

We should not be surprised to this connection between the Holy Eucharist and Resurrection, because early in his ministry Jesus had already taught in John 6:51 "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever." No more death! And what the world calls death, for believing Christians now it only becomes a step into Eternity for Christians-It's Easter forever! 5 <u>Another Saint in Time of Plague: Saint Boisil (aka Boswell)</u> (birth unknown – died July 7, 664)

St Boisil was born in Northumbria (today northeast England, and Scotland) at an unknown date. Unfortunately, there is little to nothing known about St Boisil's early life prior to when he applied for admission as a monk at the famous Lindisfarne Abbey. St Bede who is the greatest English church historian, was born ten years after St Boisil's death and he provides the only near-contemporary source of biographical information about Boisil. St Bede claimed that his information came firsthand from pupils and monks that were taught and supervised by St Boisil. Boisil himself had famous teachers.

While at Lindisfarne Abbey, he was an eager and dutiful novice being trained under the great St Aidan. He lived an austere life and committed wholeheartedly to the regimen of manual work and public prayer as a monk. He used every free moment from the monastery jobs and liturgy routine to study scripture and read manuscripts. Around the late 640's a delegation of monks were sent from Lindisfarne to start a new monastery at Melrose. St Boisil served faithfully at the new foundation under the abbot St Eata. His stewardship skills and respect among the brothers was recognized by Abbot Eata, and he was named Prior of the Abbey. As part of a prior's responsibilities St Boisil had many interactions with area landowners and the public for monastery business. His spiritual gifts were recognized by people outside the monastery. One of these contacts was with a young man searching for more meaning in life. His name was Cuthbert and he sought a divine purpose to commit his life to and he heard of St Boisil's wisdom. St Bede reported that Boisil was known to have 'prophetic gifts' and could give special counsel catered to each person's own aptitude. So, Cuthbert approached the Melrose Abbey to join in 651 (not the more popular and prestigious Lindisfarne). (Soon to be the Saint, Cuthbert will become the greatest student-novice of St Boisil). St Bede tells the story that when Cuthbert arrived to request admission, St Boisil happened to be working the gate as guest master, and he greeted Cuthbert with the unique and prophet acclamation, "Behold the servant of the Lord". They went into the church to pray and talk. St Boisil detected a strong potential within Cuthbert toward holiness, and he presented him to Abbot Eata.

Eata accepted St Cuthbert and assigned him to accompany St Boisil on his excursions into the area countryside to preach missions and evangelize. Cuthbert was diligent as a novice studying under St Boisil and they spent many hours studying scripture and praying over interpretations of the Bible for sermon lessons. They composed many catechetical outlines together and tested each other's spiritual ideas through conversation and prayer. However, in 659, when St Eata left Melrose to open a new monastery foundation, he took Cuthbert with him. St Boisil became abbot of Melrose Abbey. Around this time, the reputation of St Boisil as a healer began to grow. Many villagers brought their sick to have St Boisil pray over them. He would lay hands on them, but he also dispensed holy water for them to daily sprinkle upon themselves that he drew from local springs that were filled with iron salts. Many miraculous cures were attributed to St Boisil's prayers and remedies. Another spiritual gift of Boisil was his prophetic utterances. He often spoke prophecies or intuitions about the times and events. Three years before it struck the area, St Boisil foretold of a great pestilence (epidemic). He warned that many would be purified by it, but that many would lose their lives. He included himself among the many who would die of it. He mentioned to Cuthbert and Eata that they would suffer but survive the plague. Surely enough in 664, a 'yellow plague' struck the country. As St Boisil suffered and was bedridden, his student St Cuthbert came to render him spiritual care and comfort. On St Boisil's last day on earth, Cuthbert read the entire gospel of St John to him as a preparatory prayer for death. During this time, Boisil prophesied that Cuthbert was chosen by God to become a Bishop of the Church and bring about great reforms and conduct a revival of faith within the country. He later became Bishop of Diocese of Lindisfarne. Following his death, several of his monks reported that he appeared to them in visions warning of their slackening faith. It served to stir up their monastic fervor once again. Some records indicate that St Boisil wrote commentaries on scripture or retained his sermons, but none have survived time to be available in any existing manuscripts. Considering St Boisil's own healing gifts and as a helper for miraculous cures, and his own suffering through a plague, he is a wonderful example of patience and serenity in pandemic times. May he be an intercessor for healing to those stricken with COVID and strength to all medical caregivers!
