Now a professor at Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs and member of the Saltzman Institute of War and Peace Studies, he continues his research on low-intensity conflict, intelligence, military innovation and nuclear forces. His research appears in *International Security, Journal of Strategic Studies, Orbis and Survival*.
