
c# minor natural

The natural minor simply borrows the key signature of it's relative, E major.

c# minor harmonic

The 7th note is raised a half step ascending and descending the scale.




The 7th note is *b* and is raised to *b*# creating the *leading note*.

f# minor melodic

The 6th and 7th notes are raised a half step ascending the scale and lowered a half step descending the scale.



Ascending the scale the 6th note is *a* and is raised to *a*#.
