AND NOW - OUR FEATURE PRESENTATION..... PALM SUNDAY AND HOLY WEEK



In today's world of Netflix, PVRs and DVDs we are able to watch our favorite television show or movie whenever we want. Both my son and my daughter will watch the same movie several times, even though they know the outcome. As a matter of fact, they know these movies so well, I will hear them quoting the dialogue of some of the funnier scenes to each other in a conversation that only makes sense to them. I have never been able to do this. Once I have seen a movie, I don't see the point in watching it again since the ending is probably not going to change. This same line of thinking can be a challenge for us during this, the most holy week of the year. Over the next 8

days or so, we are going to hear readings we have heard before about events that took place a long time ago with endings that we are all familiar with. The challenge; how do we let God continue to surprise us each and every time we hear these stories of our salvation?

Last week, in an R.C.I.A. meeting, we were breaking open the gospel reading of the "raising of Lazarus" and it struck me that we were listening to the story with the ending in mind, as opposed to just being present to the events as they unfolded. When Jesus heard that Lazarus was ill, and that he was needed, he waited two full days before starting out on his journey. This should have made us all just a little uncomfortable, wondering why Jesus would not drop everything he was doing to attend to a sick friend whom he loved. Instead, we hardly noticed it because we knew that Lazarus was going to be just fine in the end. I think part of the reason we do this is that we don't see ourselves in these stories; they don't seem to be speaking to us or about us. So as long as we remain detached we can never fully appreciate their redeeming power. With this in mind, let's try something different this week.

On Palm Sunday, instead of just remembering the entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem, let's be one of the crowd waving palm branches and shouting "Hosanna", fully aware that this same crowd, of which I am a part, would be shouting "Crucify him" just a few short days later. It makes me wonder if I truly am 'just one of the crowd' or am I willing to stand up for Jesus no matter the cost. On Holy Thursday, can I let myself be shocked by this gesture of *washing feet* and submit to the fact that if I want to truly follow Jesus then I must be willing to serve all who God has put in my life; especially the Peter's and Judas'. On Good Friday, can I be truly shocked at the horrific events of this day, and yet moved to tears that Jesus loved me so much that he did this willingly for me? On Holy Saturday night, can I be in total awe as I enter into the story of God's incredible love for us? In how that love was manifested in creation; in His promise to Abraham; in the guiding hand provided to Moses and the Israelites; the promise to Isaiah that He would always look out for us and the invitation to those who may have drifted that they are always welcome back home? And, best of all is that He will always be our God and we will always be His people. And on Easter Sunday, can I be as wide eyed as a child as I see the fulfillment of God's love in the resurrection.

Yes, these stories might sound familiar; like maybe I have heard them before; but I haven't. The person I am now is not the same person I was the last time they were proclaimed. Events in my life, good and bad, have changed me and left me with the realization that I may not have all the answers when it comes to what God's plan is for me. So come on Holy Week, because after this great journey of Lent, I can hardly wait to see where the story goes from here.

THE EASTER TRIDUUM

The Easter Triduum is one liturgy celebrated over three days. The three days – sundown on Thursday to sundown on Sunday – together are the culmination of the Church's liturgical year. It is often called the Christian Passover. The Triduum, the <u>most sacred</u> celebration of our Church year, invites us to remember all that God has done and continues to do for us through Jesus' life, death and resurrection.

Mass of the Lord's Supper Thursday, April 13th - St. Augustine's 7:00 p.m.

During this liturgy, the beginning of the Sacred Triduum, we remember Jesus' giving of himself and his example of service. In this evening's collection, you are invited to deposit your Lenten Coin Folders. Following Communion, the Blessed Sacrament will be transferred to a chapel in the church basement which will remain open until 10:00 p.m. for private prayer. The stripping of the altar will take place following the liturgy.

Good Friday Service for Children April 14th - St. Augustine's 10:30 a.m.

During this celebration adapted especially for children, we will follow the Way of the Cross, tracing Jesus' steps along the road to Calvary. At each station we pause to reflect, and pray for Jesus' support and help in our lives.

Celebration of the Lord's Passion Friday, April 14th- 3:00 p.m

Good Friday is the only day of the year on which the celebration of mass is not permitted. Today we enter and leave the church in silence.

Easter Vigil for our Parish Unit Saturday, April 14th – St. Augustine's 8:00 p.m.

This is the highest holy day of the Christian year when the Church of God watches with lamps burning brightly, like faithful servants, waiting for the Master's return. On this night, we will light the new fire, hear the stories of God's creation and covenant, gather round the font and renew the promises of our baptism, and finally, celebrate the sign of our communion with one another in the Eucharist.

Easter Sunday, April 16th

Mass will be celebrated as usual at 9:00 a.m. at St. Lawrence O'Toole and 11:00 a.m. at St. Augustine's, as well as Our Lady of Mercy at 10:00 a.m.

NOTE: Good Friday is a universal day of fast and abstinence. On Saturday, we are invited to observe the Paschal Fast in union with our candidates. Friday and Saturday are not days of idle entertainment, shopping, party-going, etc. These are days to wait – to keep vigil – for the first feast of Easter.



HOLY THURSDAY FOOT WASHING

Once again this year, parishioners are invited not only to come and have their feet washed, but—if they wish—in turn wash the feet of another. We are in need of people to coordinate this

Did you know the Diocese of Antigonish is hosting the Atlantic Catechetical Association (ACA) conference in October, 2017?



The Atlantic Catechetical Association (ACA) benefits through its catechetical collaboration with the Atlantic Episcopal Assembly and the Office of Evangelization and Catechesis of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops. The Atlantic Episcopal Assembly is the bishops of Atlantic Canada and the Office of Evangelization and Catechesis works nationally on behalf of the Canadian bishops to support faith formation of adults, youth and children.

At the **EASTER VIGIL**, parishioners are invited to gather outside on the church steps for the blessing and lighting of the Paschal Candle, which will then be brought into the darkened church in procession. The Paschal Candle represents the light of Christ, and the lighting of candles FROM the Paschal Candle is meant to symbolically represent the sharing and spreading of that light. This is why we enter in darkness and use the Paschal Candle to begin lighting the candles of all those gathered to hear the great story of our salvation.
