134	Matthew Oak	Epworth-by-the-Sea	9'9"	104	Matthew was one of the original twelve Apostles of Jesus Christ. The name Matthew means "a gift of God." Another name for Matthew was Levi. Before he followed Jesus, he was a tax collector for the Roman Empire. Matthew was one of the witnesses of the Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus.
135	Mark Oak	Epworth-by-the-Sea	11'8"	127	Mark's full name was John Mark. He became a follower of Jesus at an early age. He traveled with the apostle Paul and Barnabus. Mark's book shows interest in spreading the gospel among the Gentiles. Peter was his mentor. The book of Mark is the shortest of the gospels.
136	Luke Oak	Epworth-by-the-Sea	11'	126	Luke wrote the books of Luke and Acts. He was a physician before following Jesus. Paul called him "the beloved physician". Paul taught him the gospel after Jesus's death. Luke's gospel reveals his concern for the poor, sick, and outcast.
137	John Oak	Epworth-by-the-Sea	13'3"	149	John was the son of Zebedee and Salome, and the brother of James. He was a fisherman in Galilee. John and James left their father in a boat to follow Jesus. John referred to himself as "the disciple whom Jesus loved." He was one of the original twelve apostles. John was banished by the Roman authorities to the island of Patmos where it is generally acknowledged that he wrote the book of Revelation.

138	Lovely Lane Chapel Oak	Epworth-by-the-Sea	12'6"	138	Lovely Lane Chapel was built by Norman W. Dodge in 1880. It was originally known as Union Church and later as St. James Episcopal. In 1911 the church was moved to this location and used as a recreational center. In 1949, the Methodists re-consecrated the chapel, naming it Lovely Lane Chapel after the site of the founding conference of American Methodism in Baltimore.

151	The Hawk Oak	Gascoigne Bluff	21'7"	242	The sloop-of-war, <i>HMS Hawk</i> , convoyed with the Symond and London Merchant from England to the coast of Georgia in 1735.
