ORIGINS OF THE RIVALRY

The rivalry between Centennial High School and Pueblo Central High School has a storied history dating back to the year 1892, making it a significant part of high school football culture in Pueblo. While the rivalry itself has deep roots, the matchup that is now known as the Bell Game officially began in 1950. This transformation was made possible by Lou Rhoades, a dedicated fan of Pueblo high school football, who wanted to create a

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tangible symbol of the competition.

Rhoades generously donated a bell from an old C&W Railway Engine, envisioning it as a trophy that would be awarded to the winner of this contentious rivalry. According to his vision, the team that emerged victorious would be given the honor of painting the cart that carries the "Victory Bell" in their school colors, thereby fostering a healthy competitive spirit between the two schools until their next encounter. The inaugural game saw Central

triumph with a score of 40-27, setting the stage for nearly 75 years of high-intensity matchups that continue to spark enthusiasm among students, alumni, and the local community.

A MILESTONE YEAR

This year marked a particularly significant milestone in this ongoing saga, as it was the 125th clash between the two esteemedinstitutions. On this momentous occasion, Pueblo Central showcased its athletic prowess and strategic skill on the field, delivering a dominant performance that culminated in a comprehensive victory with a score of 56-0.

This triumph not only highlighted Central's supremacy in this year's edition of the Bell Game but also extended their winning streak to six consecutive games against the Bulldogs—a feat that represents their longest stretch of victories in the rivalry over the

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
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More Than \$16.6 Million Invested by City of Pueblo Since 2021 for Housing, Homelessness and **Infrastructure Development**

PUEBLO-The City of Pueblo has committed \$16,689,681 to housing development, infrastructure investment and homeless outreach assistance since 2021. Many residents and community partners questioned where the City of Pueblo's resources were to address unhoused outreach and support during the September 3-5 clean up located between the 8th Street and 4th Street bridges along Fountain Creek.

"The reality is that time and time again the City has provided resources to the unhoused population through several different avenues

in the last few years through direct and indirect funding sources," said Mayor of Pueblo Heather Graham. "At what point do we as citi

zens start



asking for civic accountability? We can only help the individuals who want the help, and we will continue to do so."

The City of Pueblo has committed \$8,646,017 from 2022 to 2024 through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) funding. These funds include the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Grant, Housing Rehabilitation Loans and Housing Development Loan Funds (HDLF). This funding assists with the housing rehab program, the HOME development loan fund, affordable housing and other grant programs to improve housing infrastructure in Pueblo.

These HUD grants are federal grants received by the City of Pueblo, which are appropriated on an annual basis to assist with projects like home ownership, eviction diversion and addressing infrastructure needs in

low-income neighborhoods. The \$8.6 million in funding allocated in the last three years has included the \$400,000 allocation of the Pueblo Rescue Mission building for the "Porchlight" campus which allows for emergency sheltering of an additional 100 beds, comprehensive services like legal aid, mental healthcare and wrap around services to assist the unhoused

In addition to HUD grants received annually, over the last three years the City of Pueblo has allocated \$4,395,654 to non-departmental expenditures which include the nonprofits

> in the munity. Nonprofit organizations can submit a budget request to the City of Pueblo during

summer of the current fiscal year to be considered for the following year. City Council approves and adopts the City budget in November on an annual basis.

Specific housing and homeless projects have been funded by the City of Pueblo through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) since 2021 with the \$36 million received by the City by the federal government. Of the \$36 million in ARPA allocations \$8,043,664 in funding can be broken into various categories which include emergency support funding, support services, housing projects, infrastructure and development.

Emergency funding through ARPA allocations totaled \$919,845. Allocations included in the emergency funding went to Crazy Faith Street Ministry for \$112,600 in 2023 to assist during emergency declarations issued by the Mayor's Office and the Pueblo Rescue Mission had reached its 90-bed shelter and emergency overflow capacity. Colorado Legal Services received \$280,694 for eviction prevention and diversion services. Posada received emergency funds for displaced families from an emergency sewer line repair at Skyview Apartments totaling \$23,588. Additionally, Posada received \$395,000 for 4-plex accommodations related to COVID-19 to assist with proper social distancing adherence during the pandemic. Pueblo Rescue Mission received operating support for

Support services for residents and the City's unhoused population funded by ARPA dollars totaled \$2,313,819. These funding allocations help with support services for mental health, addiction treatment, overall care of individuals and paid work for the unhoused community

In the \$2,313,819 allocated, include the following ARPA agreements with Pueblo nonprofits. Catholic Charities of Southern Colorado received \$200,000 for their WORKS program for support with homeless trash clean up coordinated with the Pueblo Parks and Recreation Team up to Clean Up program. Crossroads received \$750,000 for the construction of their new facility in Pueblo West. Pueblo Rescue Mission, homeless community clean up or HOPE project for \$38,819. Pueblo Community Soup Kitchen received hunger relief assistance of \$210,000. Friendly Harbor received \$75,000 for their peer support specialist program. Pueblo Cooperative Care received \$40,000 for the Mobile Showers Program. Colorado Health Network- Access Point Pueblo received \$25,000 to assist with syringe disposal and outreach. Southern Colorado Harm Reduction Association (SCHRA)received \$10,000 to support cold weather item distribution to unhoused individuals. SCHRA also received \$975,000 for the construction and support of the Bessemer Wellness Center.

"While I was on City Council, one of our top priorities was to address the issues of the unhoused," said Mayor Graham. "We allocated a tremendous amount of emergency funds to different non-profits to help with winter support shelter options."

Pueblo City Council also approved \$600,000 in ARPA funds to United Way of Pueblo County for the LEAD center which assists Pueblo nonprofit organizations, many of whom serve the unhoused residents of the community. United Way has been a key partner with Pueblo Financial Empowerment Center (FEC) and regularly awards community grants to fellow Pueblo nonprofits who serve the unhoused or individuals experiencing housing insecurity.

Housing projects and development infrastructure investment totaled \$4.2 million from ARPA allocations. Habitat for Humanity received \$300,000 for the construction and rehab of a single-family home. NeighborWorks of Southern Colorado also received \$900,000 for water and sewer infrastructure development for the new west side

community neighborhood project, Pikes Peak Park with mixed-income community building with over 600 housing units for affordable homeownership. The City of Pueblo also committed \$3 million in funding for wastewater infrastructure to assist with the build out of the Wildhorse Extension Project, supporting future development.

The \$16.6 million invested since 2021 throughout the community serves for longterm housing development, emergency housing assistance and addresses current needs for individuals experiencing homelessness.

The City of Pueblo was established in 1842, incorporated in 1870 and is proudly called the "Home of Heroes" because of the record of four living recipients of the Congressional Medal of Honor who claim Pueblo as their hometown. The City Seal, which is under the five flags, represents the countries and territories that held dominion over the Pueblo area which include France, Mexico, Texas, Spain and of course the United States of America. Pueblo was established at the confluence of the Arkansas River and Fountain Creek and is well known for the Pueblo green chile grown in the region, the steel mill and the strong ethnic ties which create the welcoming community.

"A PEOPLE WITHOUT UNDERSTANDING"

n October 2014, the LFTJ article was titled A People Without Understanding. As I pondered what to write for this month, that article popped up. With everything that is occurring in our world today, it seemed appropriate to revisit the same subject. Truly, America has become a people without understanding. Much more so today than in 2014. 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DISTRICT 60 SEEKS TO KEEP SECRETS FROM PARENTS

The background: The Colorado Legislature passed a law (which Gov. Polis signed) last session (HB24-1039) that directs school districts to develop policies to accommodate a student's request for a non-legal name change. These requests are made most typically to reflect the student's preferred gender identity.

Essentially the law requires school districts to adopt policies that respect these requests and define non-compliance as discrimination and a civil rights violation. The issue is whether or not parents are informed of these requests and included in the conversation.

The law does not direct that parents be included, or that they be excluded. It leaves the development of a policy to implement the requirements of the law up to the individual districts.

Locally, the D70 School Board (Pueblo county) recently implemented a policy that requires a parent/guardian to cosign the student's request. This ensures that parents are aware of the child's preference and can have important conversations about this before implementation. If the parent/

guardian consents, then the school can confidently implement the policy knowing parents are fully aware of and supportive of the change. This is the correct, pro-parental involvement approach.

However, the first draft of the D60 (city schools) policy apparently does NOT require parental consent. Which means they would honor the student's request whether or not the parent/guardian agrees. It also appears there is no specific requirement that the parent be notified proactively. This approach encroaches upon the parent's rights and responsibilities. It deliberately places a wedge between the child and the parent. Recent emails and in-person testimony to Dr. Kimzey and the D60 Board have suggested that its not "safe" for the school to inform and involve parents.

REQUESTED ACTION:

Email the D60 Superintendent, Dr. Barbara Kimzey, and request the draft be revised to include parental involvement and consent in these requests. Copy the D60 Board of Education. PLEASE do this before the Board's upcoming

A suggested email from parents, etc.:

Hello! My name is and I am a (parent, guardian, grandparent) of a child currently attending a D60 school.

I recently heard that you are working on a new policy in regards to non-legal name change requests from students, in response to the requirements of HB24-1039. While the intent of this legislation is noble - to ensure that a child's request for a non-legal name change is taken seriously and acted upon, I believe it is critical that parents are informed and involved in this decision. In fact, I can't believe that the district staff would even consider a policy that would set a precedent for keeping secrets and excluding parents from being involved in these decisions. Parents/guardians are ultimately responsible for the safety and well-being of our children. HB24-1039 leaves it up to the individual school districts to set their own policies. I am asking you to establish a standard of no secrets and no wedge between a parent and

their child, by adopting a policy to implement the requirements or HB24-1039 that includes parents or guardians in these important conversations by requiring a parent/guardian signature on a Student Request Form, ensuring that parents are aware of their child's preference and of the request for the non-legal name

certain way.

The government closest to you is the one that has the most impact upon your life. If you own a home, you pay property taxes. If you buy a car, you pay for the plates and registration fees. These are the taxes that fund our county government services.

The Board of County Commissioners serves as the administrative and policy-setting authority of Pueblo County. The function of the board is to provide services outlined in the Constitution of the State of Colorado. The most important functions include approving an annual balanced budget, overseeing the provision of government services, land use management, engineering/ public works, roads and bridges, housing and human services, veterans, and social services. Pueblo has three county commissioners. This election year, we will vote for two of them and I am running for one of those seats. My objective is to serve all citizens in that role because the job of local government is to serve everyone regardless of their political belief or party.

I believe stewardship is the quality that must stand out with anyone we elect to office. Citizens shouldn't have to worry about their government; they should be confident that their interests are primary. Transparency is key to assuring citizens their government works for them. Ultimately, the job is about stewardship. If elected to serve, my focus will be clear – to do the job I have been hired to

As your Pueblo County Commissioner, I will work cooperatively with the other commissioners and other elected officials in Pueblo County. We cannot solve the greater problems we face by working in our own silos of thought. We need leadership, not political gamesmanship. As a steward of your tax dollars, my job will be to make decisions based upon what is best for our citizens. I have four priorities that will guide my decisions for funding. First will be a focus on public safety. It has been said that a safe community is like a tax credit for small business. Without a safe community, business can't grow.

We are at a crossroads. I believe we must put resources toward the functions of government that will preserve our freedom and our safety. Our law enforcement must be supported through appropriate funding. Crime, homelessness and addiction must be addressed to provide a safe community for all residents.

Second, I will focus on infrastructure needs. Roads, water, fire mitigation and other needs are displayed in unique ways throughout the county. We must adequately plan to fund those needs in the near and long term. Working with metro boards and other leadership needs to happen to ensure that all facets of these issues are considered.

Third, I'll focus on economic development. I want to work closely with our business community and educational leaders to identify opportunities to grow our workforce. We have opportunities to expand our business footprint, but we also have challenges. As elected officials, we need to find ways to make our county an attractive one for business. Dealing with our challenges is critical to addressing this priority. It will take time and honest conversations, but we need those if we are to grow.



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Is Our HealthCare System on Life Support?

A July 31, 2024 a survey published in the JAMA Network Open by a team co-led by investigators at Massachusetts General Hospital, found that of more than 400,000 U.S. adults surveyed the majority had a major change in their trust of physicians and hospitals.

To quote the report. "The proportion of adults reporting a lot of trust for physicians in hospitals decreased from 71.5% in April 2020 to 40.1% in January 2024. Features associated with lower trust as of the spring and summer of 2023 included age 25 to 64 years, female gender, lower educational level, lower income, and living in a rural setting. These associations persisted even after accounting for partisanship—that is, they weren't simply an indication of someone's political affiliation."

The report continued. "Among the leading contributors to low trust were concerns about financial motives, quality of care, influence of other entities or agendas, and perception of discrimination or bias."

A Forbes Magazine report from August 2022 went further back than COVID for the lack of trust in the medical/insurance complex. The article was titled "Twelve Years After Obamacare and We Are Worse Off Than Ever."

The report states, "While increasing affordable access to insurance coverage to pay for healthcare services was a primary focus of the legislation, especially for the approximately 30 million Americans without such coverage, it was an expensive, bureaucratic, complex, often contradictory law that increased the cost of healthcare services, changed the landscape and made some services less accessible for many. It is true that some provisions were wildly popular, like requiring commercial insurers to cover all-comers at community rates regardless of pre-existing conditions, making available a list of primary care services, and enabling children under the age of 26 to remain on parental policies. These reforms were clearly improvements on the current system, but they came with a price and didn't bend the cost curve or improve health outcomes."

Recent Gallup polls also tell the story; in

2022, only 17% of Americans said they were very satisfied with the quality of their healthcare, 29% were somewhat satisfied, and a majority (53%) were somewhat to very dissatisfied with the quality.

Further, 64% were very or somewhat dissatisfied with the availability of affordable healthcare.


The Forbes article concludes, "What we have is a deteriorating system that is failing Americans on all of its main dimensions: quality, affordability, and accessibility. No doubt, dissatisfaction ran high on these dimensions before PPACA, but even with a period of shortterm and positive approval for the handling of the pandemic, we are back where we started."





Solomon's Mines. Imagine.

Except for my bizarre stories on fairies,

> mentioned here. Since Haggard's book, four film and miniseries were produced. Obviously over time, many treasure hunters have tried in vain to locate Ophir, the recognized expanse of the mines. All anticipated wealth and recognition. Surely the mines merely waited to be opened, and explored? Scientifically eager to solve this mystery was mid-20th century archeologist Nelson Glueck. Comparison of biblical accounts related to his surveys, projected its location to be in Southern Israel. He believed the mines to be located in the Great Rift Valley, south of the Dead Sea, in the ancient land of Edom. 

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
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HELPFUL SSI CHANGES REDUC-ING CUSTOMER BURDEN

SOCIAL SECURITY ADMINISTRATION **POLICY UPDATES THAT EXPAND** access to Supplemental Security Income (SSI) in line with the law go into effect today. The agency no longer includes food in In-Kind Support and Maintenance (ISM) calculations, has expanded its rental subsidy policy exception, and has expanded the definition of a public

assistance household.

"These changes will help more people access crucial SSI benefits," said Martin O'Malley, Commissioner of Social Security. "By simplifying and expanding our policies, we are making SSI smarter, removing barriers to accessing payments, and reducing the burden on the public and agency staff."

The agency no longer includes food in ISM calculations. The new policy removes a critical barrier to SSI eligibility that an applicant or recipient might encounter if they get informal food assistance from friends, family, and community networks. The agency estimates this change could increase monthly SSI payments by about \$131 per month for over 90,000 people and allow more people to qualify for

Also, the agency is expanding a rental subsidy exception to all SSI applicants and recipients nationwide that previously applied in only seven states. This uniform nationwide policy will ensure that people paying at least a certain amount toward rent are not subject to ISM in the form of rental assistance. It is

estimated this change could increase monthly SSI payments by about \$132 per month for about 41,000 people and allow more people to qualify for SSI..

Also, the agency is expanding the definition of a public assistance household in two important ways. First, the agency will add Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits to the types of public assistance listed in the policy. Second, the agency will no longer require that all household members receive public assistance to be considered a public assistance household. The expanded definition allows more people to qualify for SSI, increases some SSI recipients' monthly payment amounts, and reduces reporting burdens for individuals living in public assistance households. These two changes could result in increased SSI payments to about 277,000 people and making more people eligible for SSI in the coming years.

SSI provides monthly payments to adults and children with a disability or blindness, and to adults aged 65 and older, who have limited income and resources. SSI benefits help pay for basic needs like rent, food, clothing, and medicine. People applying for and receiving SSI must meet eligibility requirements, including income and resource limits.

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
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
