PLEASE, PLEASE! If you haven't thought about the trip to Montreal, please give it some consideration. Sales are lagging for some reason. Talk it up with your friends, neighbors, and relatives. Get a small group together. I know that it is extremely hot, and we are talking December, but the cutoff date is mid-September, and that is not so far away. I have been getting a tremendous amount of interest, but not many signups. Some say that the price is too high, but if you check around, you will find that it is a bargain. Please reconsider going if you haven't already signed up.

December 1st - December 6th. (6 days, 5 nights) to Montreal, Canada, featuring Montreal Christmas Markets. City tour of Montreal, Montreal Underground, Notre Dame Basilica, and Montreal Christmas Markets. Package includes 5 nights lodging (3 in Montreal area), 5 breakfasts, 3 dinners, welcome and orientation, luggage handling, taxes and meal gratuities, motor coach transportation, and driver's and guide's gratuities.

Cost is \$950 pp double, and \$1349 pp single occupancy. Don't be left out, reserve your spot with a \$25 per person refundable deposit. Payments must be paid in full no later than September 14. Cancellation insurance is available and recommended.

Departure will be from Lake of the Woods, and Gordon Rd. Commuter Lot on Route 3 in Spotsylvania.

Valid U.S. Passport required.

A big thank you goes out to the few AARP members who did volunteer at the LOW Adaptive Water Sports Event in June after hearing our speaker, Lana Marr, tell us about the organization at our November meeting. The volunteers I talked to found the day very rewarding and plan to volunteer again.

In that regard, the family event for special needs children and their families is coming up on the 10th of August and more volunteers are needed. The event was sold out within hours of it being made public!! The water ski club is completely busy with the skiing and tubing at the clubhouse dock; AARP people can volunteer for land activities around the point and at sailboat beach. There is a fishing dock, corn hole, and other land activities that need supervision. If you can give pontoon boat rides, you would be much appreciated. Land volunteers arrange for each person to have a personal floatation device (provided) and assist with getting the group arranged and on board; you just drive the boat!! It's that easy. Some cannot ski or tube and this activity is the only way they can get out and enjoy the water.

You can go to Lake of the Woods Adaptive Water Sports website (https://www.adaptivewatersports.org) and select the volunteer box. At the end you will give your contact information and can check a box on what you'd like to do. The event is free; there is a lunch break for all--again at no cost to you. Health Report Update - Suspicious Moles – Joan Albertella

Although most moles aren't harmful, some can become cancerous.

Learn about how to recognize the signs of skin cancers including melanoma:

<u>Asymmetry</u> – Typical moles are round instead of oddly shaped. You should see an equal image on both sides.

<u>Border</u> – You should see where your mole starts and stops. You want moles to have a crisp, clean border instead of a scalloped or ill-defined border.

<u>Color</u> – A mole should be only one color and not made up of multiple colors. You also want your moles to look overall pretty similar to each other. If you have a mole that's a different color than the rest of your moles, that may indicate it needs to be evaluated.

<u>Diameter</u> – Any mole with a diameter larger than the size of a pencil eraser should be checked out.

<u>Evolution</u> – Any mole that is increasing in size or changing color or shape should be examined.
