According to <u>Governing Magazine</u>, "cities in California, Illinois, Louisiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Tennessee have in recent years opted to disband their police departments after losing coverage." In other scenarios, <u>insurers have forced agencies to enact major reforms to ensure coverage</u>.

Fortunately, there are ways to protect your agency, no matter the size, from the many risks of litigation. In particular, police accreditation is an important step toward liability avoidance.

The Importance of Accreditation

Police accreditation can protect smaller agencies by promoting compliance to an accrediting body's policies and procedures. Still, the majority of smaller agencies are not accredited.

The <u>Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement (CALEA)</u> states the majority of law enforcement agencies in the U.S. fall into an A- or B-sized category, meaning they have fewer than 25 sworn officers.

While these small agencies account for the majority of law enforcement departments, less than 2% have achieved accreditation status.

Are you considering pursuing police accreditation? Here are a few of the most significant ways accreditation can protect your agency.

Increase accountability

Police accreditation and liability avoidance go hand-in-hand. The accrediting body's standards provide a helpful framework for preventing unnecessary risk and ensuring compliance in your department.

The Orono, Maine Police Department, a 15-person agency, received full CALEA accreditation in March of 2017. Chief Josh Ewing says budgetary constraints had the potential to put his agency at risk prior to accreditation. Accreditation provided the accountability necessary for his department to avoid liability.

Build community trust

Chief Ewing also notes how accreditation strengthened his agency's relationship with other areas of Orono's government. "When the town council has questions about use of force, they appreciate I can provide them the data because it's a required part of accreditation," he says. "They can get immediate feedback and allay their fears."

By avoiding lawsuits associated with liability, your agency can also protect its reputation in the community. One benefit of accreditation is that it demonstrates your commitment to safety and professionalism across the board.

Save money

While police accreditation has up-front costs, consider it a long-term investment in your agency. The obvious benefit of accreditation is preventing costly lawsuits in the case of litigation. Should insurance drop your agency due to liability concerns, costs can increase astronomically. A single patrol car accident or wrongful arrest without insurance could lead to bankruptcy.

But pursuing accreditation can also cushion your insurance budget. In Chief Ewing's case, the Orono Department saved fifteen percent on liability insurance thanks to police accreditation.

Protect your agency

At the end of the day, police accreditation can keep your agency operating by keeping it insured. Without liability insurance, many small, unequipped agencies face the very real risk of closing.

In 2013, the Sorrento, LA Police Department encountered mounting liability risks. In the end, the department's insurer withdrew coverage, putting Sorrento at risk for

bankruptcy. To avoid the potential of expensive lawsuits without insurance, Sorrento made the difficult decision to abolish its agency.
