HAZZAN'S NOTES



Dear Friends,

I am glad to be back from my vacation and here for your needs and concerns.

This month we begin our new regimen of having two Shabbat mornings a month celebrated together in our synagogue. Based on our attendance patterns over the last few years, one of the Shabbat mornings will be a study session similar to the study sessions in the past, with either Sam Pearlman or Shmuel Gonzales leading them based on the Torah portion of the week. The other Shabbat morning will be led by me and will be either our **Kol Shalom** service or a festival or High Holyday service. Our study session this month will take place on August 12 beginning at 9:00 a.m. with breakfast and followed by the study session from 9:45 to 11:00 a.m.

This month I will lead the **Kol Shalom** service on August 19 beginning with breakfast at 9:00 a.m. and the service beginning at 9:45 a.m., which will include the Blessing of the New Month in preparation for our High Holyday season.

We know you will want to participate in these monthly exceptional Shabbat experiences that enhance our already well-attended Shabbat Evening services.

ELUL

A summer month of 29 days, Elul is the sixth month of the Hebrew calendar. It occurs in August-September of the civil Georgian calendar. It is a time of preparation and repentance for the High



Holy Days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. An acronym for the phrase "Ani L'dodi Y'dodi" — "I am my beloved's and my beloved is mine." [Song of Solomon 6:3] During Elul we search our hearts and come close to G-d to ready ourselves for the coming Day of Judgment, Rosh Hashanah, and Day of Atonement, Yom Kippur.

A number of special rituals that lead up to the High Holy Days include the blowing of the shofar every morning (except Sabbath), Rosh Hodesh Elul (the first day of the month), through the eve of Rosh Hashanah. This is to awaken us and inspire the soul-searching which is in preparation for the High Holy Days. Elul is also a time for asking for and giving forgiveness. An old custom of the month is the recitation of Psalm 27 every day from Rosh Hodesh Elul through Hashanah Rabbah on Sukkot in the month of Tishrei. This is to remind ourselves that the house of G-d, our own Beth Shalom, is open to all who believe in Him and all who wish to be among our congregation. In essence, we seek G-d's closeness and endeavor to live our lives to His will. This provides a solid area of constant comfort among life's difficulties.

Another ritual during the month of Elul is the recitation of Selichot (penitential prayers). Ashkenazi tradition is to begin the recitation of Selichot with a special service on a Saturday night between solar midnight and morning light on the first day of Selichot. In our year of 5777, the Selichot service begins on September 16, 2017. Stay tuned for our Hazzan's announcement.

It is also customary to visit the graves of one's family during the month of Elul. These visits honor the memories of those who inspired us to live

our lives as Jews more fully in the future.

One of my favorite social customs during Elul is to end my written letters wishing the recipient a good year. The usual blessing for this is, "K'tiva VaHatima Tova" — "A good writing and sealing of judgment," wishing that on Rosh Hashanah the recipient should be written in the Book of Life for a good year. According to tradition, each of us is written there for a good or poor year, based on their performance in the previous year and their sincere efforts of atonement. That fate is sealed on Yom Kippur.

May all of you be blessed, and may all of you recognize that in the month of Elul we have the ability to come face to face with ourselves, our loved ones, and our G-d. Amen!



What's the difference between knowledge and wisdom?


At a sports banquet, there are 100 famous athletes.


