PENTECOST SUNDAY

Gift of the Holy Spirit (Part II) (Patient Endurance) The Miracle Called of Transformation



It's sad how we see things in nature but don't quite learn from them. Jesus taught with great authority. He was original. One way this was • evident was in His use of natural and everyday

events to teach the people. He used the image of Shepherd and sheep (Mark 6:34); the wolves that come to destroy (Matthew 10:16); fish, seeds, weeds, wheat, yeast, trees (Mark 4; Matthew 13; Luke 13:6-9, Luke 21:29-30); fig tree without fruits (Mark 11:14), etc.

So, what can we learn from nature on this Pentecost Sunday? I once read an author that wrote about spring and human growth. I never really looked at spring that way. Sure, we do have our own version of spring in Nigeria. Here it is a transition from cold to warm weather - it's about the sun. Back home it is a transition from dry season to rainy season – it's about rain. The transformation that happens between these two seasons is mostly the same. One common thing is that this spring miracle happens gradually.

First, we begin to see patches of green here and then. Then some early bird flowers begin to pop up. We don't see these transformations as well as those who live in the country, who watch the fields and hillsides transform from dry barren lands to lush lands. I love to see the dead trees begin to come back to life as leaves appear gradually. The miracle goes from patches of green to full-blown bushes and fields in one to two months. This teaches and reminds us that change or transformation is a gradual process. It also teaches us that true transformation cannot be forced. There is this element of persistence and patience.

I say all these to paint a picture that might help us to reflect on that very First Pentecost event and our own Pentecost

event. Sure, after Pentecost the apostles became a changed people. It would be a naïve and costly mistake for us to presume that this change happened . overnight. It was a gradual "spring-like" process, set in motion by the action of the Holy Spirit on that fateful Pentecost Sunday. So, yes, their miraculous transformation happened gradually.



In essence, our own Pentecost event(s) will happen even slower for we seem to be much more thick-skinned than these guys and the early Christians. If we can grasp this and take it to heart, it will help us as we evangelize, as we carry on the mission of making Christ known and loved. In this task, we must begin with ourselves. The spring miracle in us will take much more than one to two months - more like decades! As the saying goes, "God has not finished with me, yet," or my neighbor for that matter! Knowing this is one thing, allowing the knowledge to permeate how we look at ourselves and others is another thing.

The Good News is that the Holy Spirit has already set in motion the spring miracle in each of us. Growth cannot be forced. It has to come from deep within each of us. The same Holy Spirit has provided the sun and the rain to make this happen.

May we utilize these graces and the opportunities and truly be transformed. Amen.





The **ROSARY ALTAR SOCIETY** will meet this Monday, June 5th at 7:30 p.m. All ladies of the Parish are welcome!



SYMBOLS OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

Water: The symbolism of water signifies the Holy Spirit's action in Baptism, since after the invocation of the Holy Spirit it becomes the efficacious sacramental sign of new birth.

Anointing: The symbolism of anointing with oil also signifies the Holy Spirit, to the point of becoming a synonym for the Holy Spirit.

Fire: While water signifies birth and the fruitfulness of life given in the Holy Spirit, fire symbolized the transforming energy of the Holy Spirit's actions.

Cloud and Light: These two images occur together in the manifestations of the Holy Spirit in both Old and New Testaments.

The Seal: is a symbol close to that of anointing. "The Father has set his seal" on Christ and also seals us in Him.

The Hand: Jesus heals the sick and blesses little children by laying hands on them. In His name the apostles will do the same.

The Finger: "It is by the finger of God that (Jesus) cast out demons".

The Dove: At the end of the flood, whose symbolism refers to Baptism, a dove released by Noah returns with a fresh olive-tree branch in its beak as a sign that the earth was again habitable.
