THE LARGER OR ABUNDANT LIFE

"And Jabez called on the God of Israel, saying, O that thou wouldst bless me indeed, and enlarge my coasts, and that thine hand might be with me, and that thou wouldst keep me from evil, that it may not grieve me. And God granted that which he requested."

In introducing a brief discussion along the line of thinking in terms of a more abundant national life in the days ahead or in an individual sense we feel that the above text of scripture is a wonderful example to follow and one which as a nation or community we should give a great deal of consideration.

The children of Israel found a very abundant national life upon entering and exploiting the land which flowed with milk and honey largely because they went away from these things into coveteousness and idolatry their abundant life began to shrink until today it is a vague spectre. Long after their days of great national zenith there came another great leader who said. "I am come that they might have life and that they might have it more abundantly. Jn. 10: 10. Can we continue to have, as a nation the great favor and blessings of the Almighty, such as those requested in the opening text, and those offered in the words of Jesus Himself if we continue to travel the road down which we have sped so rapidly in the past few years.

Let us face a few of the bare facts concerning these things:

In this the greatest of all nations, a second land of milk and honey, the promise of an abundant life has taken on an entirely new and different meaning; it has become the dominating social, political, and religious theme of the

hour. It is discussed from every conceivable angle, and group, political leaders government officials, social reformers etc.

Following are some of the varied present day definitions of the abundant life:

First, that it requires \$5,000.00 a year for every family and a college edu-

cation for every child.

Second, (set forth by a religious group) Unless incomes from \$3,000 to \$10,000 are made possible for every family, the economic system has failed, other definitions include, more liberal old age pensions, a maximum work week of thirty hours, compensation for unemployment, and in short, anything that tends to greater ease, and wealth wihout toil.

Whatever may be the technical points of the different programs, they have one thing in common, they all define the abundant life in terms of dollars and

cents, and the things they will buy.

Such an ideal of the abundant life is the most destructive and disasterous

policy which can be followed.

We are not taking issue with these thinkers along the above lines and perhaps in their place all have some benefits but let us remember that to seek after God first, is the all important duty of every individual and also of our nation.

Happiness never is found in what an individual has, but, in that which an individual does. It never consists in what an individual receives, but in what he gives, and certainly it is not found in a life of ease but rather in a life of activity. "A man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth." "Beware of coveteousness."

In six months it is reported that ten million people enrolled under a certain new social movement, why? Because it offered a quick and covetous route to

wealth and ease, abundant life so called.

In government issues the redistribution of wealth has become a far more important factor than the encouraging of the creation of wealth by honest toil and production. Many other efforts are being made along the same line of thought of which we cannot enter into. One has given us the modern version of the ten commandments which are in their original version and when so believed and practiced the very foundation of an abundant life. The modern version is as follows:

First, an abundant life may require some stealing if it can be done within

the legal technicalities of today and thereby become honorable.

Second, the commandment, "six days shalt thou labor and do all thy work"

is hereby modified to five days and preferably thirty hours a week.

Third, in compensation for the lessened productivity of the shorter week it is now permissable to covet thy neighbors possessions and take them by passing the necessary laws, constitutional or otherwise.

Fourth, The commandment, thou shalt have no other gods before me" is to be interpreted, in many countries, as, the state is supreme and anything the

state does is right regardless of religious doctrines to the contrary.

Fifth, the commandment, "Honouur thy father and thy mother is permissive

instead of obligatory.

Sixth-ten, The observance of these commandments is left to the discretion of the individual. And in short, flexible to the existing condition.

We have heard it said repeatedly, that the capitalistic system has broken down, it is not so much the system which has broken down as the character of

the people.

All the material advantages of our civilization tend to make our lives easier and our morals and character weaker. The life of the family is the life of the nation, and only the sternest morals and religious training and worship such as was found around the family altars of the days past can safeguard our family and nation! life.

Among the ten commandments the one specially stressed in the teachings of Jesus was thou shalt not covet. The word covet is practically gone from our vocabulary. Instead we have the phrases, redistribution of wealth, taxing the haves to pay the have nots, processing taxes, social credits, etc. Again let us say, we are not offering destructive criticism to the good points of such things but rather seeking to place the emphasis of life where it should be placed.

The above description and ideals appeal to those who are reluctant to face the stern conditions under which character and production are created.

"And one of the company said unto Him, Master speak to my brother that he may divide the inheritance with me. And He said unto him, Man, who

made me a judge or a divider over you."

"The life is more than meat and the body is more than raiment, all these things do the nations seek after, seek ye the kingdom of God and ALL THESE THINGS SHALL BE ADDED UNTO YOU." Then you will know the fullness of ABUNDANT LIFE.

God and Man

An Outlined Study of God's Plan of the Ages.

THE CREATIVE WEEK: Gen. 1:

As we again engage in a rather lengthened study of some of the very important things which the Bible reveals in regard to God's dealings with humanity we are aware of the many and vastly different schools of thoughts in these things yet we feel absolutely sure that the Bible is not a book of uninterpretable mysteries but rather an open book to all when we are willing to lay aside our former traditions and with an open heart pursue the glorious paths of Heavenly light which reveals to us the grandeurs and wisdom of a High and Holy God whose desire is to lead man into the realms of His infinte care here and at last into the realities of Eternal life.

Our first verse of the Bible deals with a period of unknown and remote antiquity hidden in the depths of the eternal ages and may well contain all the geologic ages and discoveries of science. We would not even attempt to locate "the beginning" but wish to call attention to the very visible fact that with God all things had a beginning and nothing originated by chance or by an inferior agent but was created by the wisdom and power of God.

It is also clearly indicated that the earth had at some previous time undergone some sort of a cataclysmic change as a result of divine judgment. There are also intimations which undoubtedly connect this with a previous testing and fall of angels.

Now we approach our first subject, 'GOD'S CREATIVE WEEK.' not the creation of the earth; rather, the cre-

ation of those things spoken of in verse 3-31

Let us at once clarify the matter as pertains to the length of this week and the days contained in this week. It is evident by reason alone that these days could not have been twenty-four hour days nor the week made up of seven twenty-four hour days for we find in the third day we find the trees yielding their fruit in one day therefore not 24 hours but rather that period of time God referred to as a day, then for further substantuation of this truth let us note that in the fourth day or period the sun, moon and stars were brought into existence to divide the day, (natural day) from the night and for seasons and days and years, all this in one day. Also in the sixth day we find events transpiring which could not have happened according to the course of nature which God was setting up in a twenty-four hour day but again it is that period of time which makes up one of God's days as is important to bear in mind all the way through the Bible.

Yes, I know the question which is in the mind of many readers, How long then is one of these days? From the Bible we are quick to answer one thousand years, (natural years) "But, beloved be not ignorant of this one thing, that one day is with the Lord as a thousand years as one day." II Pet. 3:8. (also see Psa. 90:4.)

We briefly outline the earlier creative events of the week thus: the revelation of a certain light, not the sun, the light called day and the darkness night, first day, the firmament, second day. The appearance of dry land, also plant life, third day. The sun, moon and stars, fourth day. The creation of animal life, fifth day. The creation of the earth animal life and last but far from least, MAN.

GOING TO CHURCH DOES NOT MAKE YOU A CHRISTIAN ANY MORE THAN GOING TO A GARAGE MAKES YOU AN AUTOMOBILE. YOU MUST BE BORN OF THE SPIRIT.

WHAT WAS THIS CREATED MAN OF THE SIXTH DAY LIKE?

This man was created in both the image and likeness of God, Gen. 1:26. We notice also that in the creation of man here there were both male and female created while in the formed man of a later chapter there was formed only one. As we pursue our study of this created man we learn also that they were blessed in the command to multiply, V. 28, and were given opportunity to eat of every herb and tree and were given dominion over all the earth, to rule, over all the creation of the earth. No other race has ever had that authority. Please remember this was a created, ruling class or race created male and female on the sixth day of the creative week.

WHAT ABOUT THE FORMED MAN OF GEN. 2:

Many people have taken the idea that the second chapter of Genesis is but a rehearsal of the events of the first chapter; this seems to me to be a very careless exposition of the Scriptures for surely God was not so careless as to mix things up in such a manner as they would be if that be the case. I say this is not a rehearsal of the first but an entirely new group of events in the working of God.

We would first call attention to the fact as spoken of in the first verses of the second chapter; "And on the seventh day, (seventh thousand year) God ended His work which He had made; and He rested on the seventh day from all His work which He had made." Thus we note there was a Sabbath instituted and a new week begins here in the records of this chapter.

In the fifth verse it is clearly stated there was not a man to till the ground, the skeptic has said "the Bible contradicts itself here," No, it certainly does not. There was not a man to till the ground since the race which was created on the sixth day were to rule over the entire earth and was not to till the ground. Let us take the truth of the Bible instead of tradition of elders.

On the eighth day God formed a man from the dust of the ground and breathed the breath of life into him and he became a living soul; we would leave this thought here, we are not told that this man became an immortal soul as is so commonly taught, he did not become an immortal soul for we are told in the Bible to seek for immortality. He then became a natural human being possessing only natural life.

It is important to note also that only one was so formed, the man, while in the created race there was created both male and female.

WHERE WAS THIS MAN PLACED AND WHAT WAS HE PRIVILECED TO EAT?

Verse eight tells us that the Lord planted a garden in Eden and there this formed man was placed to till the ground or dress the garden. He was given access to the tree of life that he might eat thereof and thus have life, had he not transgressed the commandment of God he would have continued to eat of the tree of life and thus enjoyed everlasting life.

There was one tree which he was forbidden to eat of: the tree of knowledge of good and evil, and with the penalty of death set as the punishment for eating thereof.

Now let us take notice that while this man Adam was yet alone God formed another group of animals and brought them before Adam to be named and as yet there was no companion for him. In verses 21-23 we have the record of the taking of the rib from Adam and the making of his companion which he called woman. It has been said, "she was not taken from his head so she would rule over him, neither from his feet so she should be walked

on, but from his side so she would be his equal and from his rib so she would be near to his heart," we believe this is a very fitting and beautiful picture of a woman.

SIN AND DEATH COMES TO THE HUMAN FAMILY:

The early verses of Gen. 3: record the sad event which has brought the nature and result of sin on the entire race of Adam and also the penalty of death. God had told Adam that in the day he should eat of the tree of knowledge of good and evil he should die. Here we are so often confronted with two misleading ideas, some say he was to die, spiritually, no, he was not a spiritual being and therefore this was not spiritual death which was to be the penalty. Again the infidel has said the Bible is untrue because God said he should die in the day he ate of the tree and the Adam lived 930 years. The truth of the Bible here is, Adam did die, naturally in the very day he ate of the tree, he did not live out one of God's days of 1000 years nor has there ever been any one who has because of the curse of death which came as the result of the sin and fall of the foreparents in the garden.

By way of comparison of the two races we call attention to the fact that the created race was to be blessed in multiplying while the natural or formed race was to till the ground and multiply in sorrow and pain as the result of their sin.

WHAT CAUSED THE FIRST LIFE TO BE TAKEN?

Because of the sin of Adam and Eve God took the life of animals and with their skins and thus by the shedding of their blood covered their nakedness, thus from the very beginning there has always been required the shedding of blood to cover sin.

We have been asked the question many times, "what does Gen. 3:20 mean" "And Adam called his wife's name Eve; because she was the mother of all living." This question usually arises because there are so many who do not believe in the teaching of a created and a formed race, however, when we look carefully into this verse we will find that Eve was not the mother of anyone at the time this was spoken but tells us that Eve was to become mother of the race which would survive the flood and even more important, the mother of a Savior born thru her generation as was promised in verse 15.

As we close this part of our series of lessons on this subject we wish to call attention to one more thought, as to why they were driven from the garden: In verses 22-24 we find where the Lord saw they must be kept from the tree of life because of their sin else they would eat thereof and live forever in this sinful state so they were driven from the garden and from the tree of life and the Lord placed the flaming sword there to guard or keep the way of the tree of life. Thus never again until the world has been cleansed of sin by the judgments of God will there be any who will have access to the tree of life; that being in the new earth when those who dwell in the new earth in natural human bodies will again partake of the tree of life and thus have everlasting human life.

This introductory lesson has only barely opened these lessons but we trust as we continue to study together we will receive much good and thus be able to reach many with the wonderful truths of God's plan of the ages.

The Adventures of a Christian Soldier

In my present work as editor of this Army General Hospital weekly newspaper, I have had the opportunity and privilege of interviewing many injured, wounded and sick veterans who have seen action in all the various theaters of war—France, Italy, the South Pacific, India, China, Burma. It has been a revelation to me to receive and note their various reactions after they have spent as many as three years in active combat. I have been especially interested in their relationships with the Lord. Frankly, I have been sorely disappointed.

We have been reading and hearing much these days of men in our armed forces in combat who have prayed and looked to God for help. Virtually every veteran I have talked to who has been under fire or flown on bombing missions or met the enemey face to face, has said, "Of course I prayed. Who wouldn't?" And-they all believe God heard and answered their prayers. They have been deeply impressed. However, when asked if they still prayed and had given their hearts to the Lord, not one of the many I have talked to could say that he had. Where is the slip-up? Who has failed? Why haven't definite decisions for Christ been made? Who is at fault?

One young infantryman, who was twenty-two years of age but, because of his trying experiences, looked thirty-five, told me that he had served twenty-three months in India and Burma and had seen considerable combat. He said that the only thing to which he could look forward during those months was the next time he and his buddies could get drunk. "There was nothing else to do," he said, "and we had to find some release. Getting drunk helped us to forget." What a tragedy! This young fellow admitted that he had

never touched liquor before he entered the service. Who slipped up?

Another young Air Corps sergeant. an engineer gunner in a B-25, made forty-five bombing missions over Europe before he and his crew were shot down and he lost a leg. "Sure, I prayed," he said, "every time I went up." He had been decorated with the distinguished Flying Cross, the Purple Heart and other awards. "But." he questioned. cursing "what bitterly. good will these decorations do me? How can I go out in civilian life again and make anything of myself?"

Such instances can be multiplied thousands of times. Restless, worried, bitter, injured, sick soldiers dread the future. They feel that the odds of life are against them and they don't know where to turn. They are being returned to civilian life by the thousands; what are they receiving by way of help from those now in civilian life?

On every hand these fellows feel that they are being betrayed by the flippant attitude of a world which seemingly doesn't realize that these lads have seen their buddies die and they themselves have gone through the holocaust of war, sombered, moved, changed. These returning heroes don't want glitter and excitement, but, rather, resent such an attitude. They need something steadying. They need Christ! Will they, as was the case in the last war, turn their backs upon a Church which allows the folk at home to be so shallow and thoughtless?

Increasingly, as the days go by, we will be faced with the rehabilation of these men with shattered minds, bodies and spirits. The only solution is to, in as effective a way as possible, present to them the Great Physician, the Lord Jesus Christ. This is our postwar task. Are you equipped for your part in it?

As parents, many are guilty before God and man. My pity goes out to all such, and indeed, any person needs pity as he faces these evil days without God.

There are no more tears left in my heart to shed for these men. There is only a dead ache which grows steadily more intense as the days and men pass in review. The faces of men without spiritual hope, as they tramp on and on and out to eternity, make me speechless with amazement.

Your Gethsemane and mine will be useless unless we "Seek of Him a right way for us, and for our little ones, and for all our substance." (Ezra 8:21).

My dear friends place no value on anything you have or on anything anybody else has unless it directly or indirectly contributes to the Christian training of your children and those of your neighbors.' It is too late to give this training to millions. They will have to blunder their confused way through this hellish age without God and without spiritual equipment which should have been given them around a family altar.

Regardless of what it may bring you—ridicule, social ostracism, persecution, or death, build and maintain a family altar now. You have no right to sleep or eat with children in your home untaught in the ways of Christ, until you obey the command of God to teach them His Word. "Trust in the Lord, and do good; so shalt thou dwell in the land, and verily (in truth, the margin says) thou shalt be fed."

Belgium Dec. 18, 1944

Dear Brother Durham:

I received "The Gospel Voice" today and have been reading it. Before tonight I had not realized its worth, but as I lay on my bunk and read the sermon by Bro. Gene Cornell, I was made to recall all the wonderful times I have experienced with the children of God, during the few years I have been in his service. Although I have traveled thousands of miles in the army and lived with the same men all this time, still I do not have the companionship that I would have had at the first night of meeting with the children of God.

I realize now how much I lacked of having on the whole Armor of God when I came in this army, and now it seems sometimes I have almost lost all. Still I know the hand of God is able to do all things for those who trust Him. I need more faith to trust the Lord because I know without Christ life isn't worth while. I have seen men who were good, respectable fellows before they left home step very low because they did not have the will power to resist. Only by the grace of God have I been spared.
