# **Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time** Lk 12:49-53

Dear St Pius X and St Anthony Church,

Was that Jesus? What did he just say? "Do you think that I have come to establish peace on the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division." (Luke 12:51). Wait a minute, isn't this the 'Prince of Peace' talking (Isaiah 9:5)? The same one whose birth announcement by angels declared, "Glory to God on Highest, and peace on earth to people..." (Luke 2:14). The same Jesus Himself who tells us in John 14:27 "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you." So, come again?

This 'fiery' and 'divisive' talk of Jesus is best understood by considering two important points. First, think of the animating and charging fire of the Holy Spirit, and then 2) the clean break and ending that is required to mark a lasting change of course or open a new era. We all want to make a difference, don't we? What does that mean if not, I want to make a 'division' where it is clearly known what went before and what is being done now. Think of the Lord saying in Revelation 21:5 "Behold, I make all things new." For it to be new, a clearly evident break that marks a dividing line is needed. 'Starting new' means there is a distinctive 'pre-period' and a 'post period'. So Jesus is ushering in a new generation, a definite division in time, unmistakably opening a new age (read on to the final verses closing out this chapter of Luke, and you hear tell us to be attentive to signs that mark a change of time! Lk12:54-56).

And what about this fire? Keep in mind, Jesus is not talking about just any fire running 'wild and free', creating useless destruction in its path. No, this is a 'controlled burn' (Creative Destruction-before that was the name of a video game, it was a concept of the economist Joe Schumpeter). Jesus wants to set a fire line of difference that sets the boundaries for new growth and development to follow. The Holy Spirit is a 'constructive fire' that motivates new life—as when we talk about the 'fire in one's belly' that inspires one to do great things. Or what John Baptist said about Jesus, in Matthew 3:11 "the one coming after me will baptize with fire and the Holy Spirit". To get a group moving don't we say, "Let's set a fire under them"! Also, for us Christians, we must think of the image of the first disciples at Pentecost. When the Holy Spirit entered the early church (Acts Apostles chapter 2), tongues of fire appeared, that roosted above the disciples' heads, motivating them to go out and proclaim salvation in Jesus' name. In the New Testament language, this constructive fire is also called 'fervent zeal'. Romans 12:11 says, "Do not grow slack in zeal, but be fervent in spirit, and serve the Lord. Also, the disciple Apollos is described in Acts 18:25 as having 'fervent zeal'. Alicia Keyes would say, 'That disciple's on fire'. This fire of the Holy Spirit is like the motivating action of 1,000 volts of lightning that gives missionaries the attitude of 'let's get it started in here!"

I really want to emphasize the constructive nature of this fire of God's Holy Spirit, especially in these days of rage and anger we live in now. All news anymore always has a resentful and burning

madness about it, seen in such oppositional comments like 'burn it down' or 'scorched earth policy'. Unfortunately, examples of such fruitless 'torching' can be found in the Bible too. Consider the bitter and terroristic Samson in the Old Testament, who engaged in just this uselessly destructive mischief. Judges 15:4-5, tells of it that, "Samson went and caught three hundred jackals, and turning them tail to tail, he took some torches and tied one between each pair of tails. Then, he kindled the torches and set the jackals loose in the standing grain of the Philistines, thus burning both the shocks and standing grain, and all of the vineyards and olive groves." In his vengeful fit of flaming anger against the Philistine people, Samson indiscriminately used fire for widely hurtful damage. But, the fire of the Holy Spirit is so different. It is always constructive and useful, building instead of destroying. To see how the Holy Spirit's fire is productive and brings value, instead of waste to us, Jesus gives us a good guide to 'positive fire' by having us look for fruit, as in Matthew 7:16, "By their fruits you will know them." What are the fruits of the Holy Spirit? Galatians 5:22-23 says they are "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control." These positive, and controlled burns of the Holy Spirit are what the disciples on the road to Emmaus described after experiencing the living Christ, when they said, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he spoke to us...."(Luke 24:32). That holy burn positively motivated them to return to their faith group and actively take up the good work of hope, proclaiming Christ's resurrection. So what do we do in the face of fire? Look and work for life and for good. We test fire by looking at its fruit!
