

A Read-to-Me Bible Story

from Matthew 8:5-10, 13; Luke 7:1-10

One day a soldier said to Jesus, "A helper at my house is in pain. He cannot move. I think he may die."

"I will go and make him well," Jesus said.

"Oh no," said the soldier. "You don't have to come home with me. If you just say it is so, I know my helper will be OK. If I can get something done just by giving an order, I'm sure you can too."

"You have great faith," said Jesus. "Go home. Your helper will be healed."


At that very moment, the soldier's sick helper got well.

"Thank You" March

Jesus healed a soldier's helper. Get together with your friends or family and do the march below. Have everyone pretend to be soldiers. One person can be the leader and speak first. Everyone else can repeat what the leader has said.

March around the room as you repeat the words. At the end, stop and stand at attention. Shout together, "Thank You, Jesus!"



How does your child respond to someone who is in

Demonstrating a positive and helpful attitude when someone needs assistance teaches a Christlike behavior. Find moments to teach by example how to love others. Extend a helping hand when needed.

Are You Sick? Children love dramatic play. Spend some time pretending with your child. Act out how to care for someone who is sick. Discuss caring ways to help someone who is not feeling well. Talk about stories in the Bible in which Jesus cared for people. Say, "We are to care for others. We are to share the love of Jesus with those around us."



Use these thoughts at mealtimes, bedtimes, or other times when you pray with your child this week.
