Romanian Medical Student in Mexico

I am 22 years old, and am studying to be a Medical Surgeon at Montemorelos University. I have completed secondary school in the Adventist School of Craiova in Romania and finished the first year of medicine at the University of Medicine and – Pharmacy of Craiova.

The reasons why I came to study Montemorelos are many, but I will summarize the most important. First, I've realized that I was not following my dream of studying medicine in an Adventist school, in order to learn **and prepare to be a missionary doctor.** I want to help people in need, bring hope and relief to the suffering and



offer them the word of God. It's a nice dream, but to dream is not enough; I want to do everything I can to make it happen.

How would I describe myself? I'm a normal girl, sometimes shy, with a religious education (I was baptized at 15 years old when I was mature enough to make such an important decision). Born and raised in an Adventist family with strict rules and rigorous principles, I was taught that the most important thing in life is leaving ourselves in the hands of God, because He knows what is best for us, and only He can guide us. Everything I learned so far is in vain if I do not put it into practice, and this is why I want to help those who suffer most.

I love children; I like to play with them, teach them, tell them stories, take care of them and tell them about Jesus. I am also passionate about art: painting (I know how to paint in oil), music (I play the piano), poetry and sculpture. I am doing all I can to provide for my tuition by **working in the university's cafeteria, in the library, and canvassing,** and although it's been hard, I thank God for the way He has kept me in this school. Go! Go! Faster! Faster! We heard the noise of some children and adults running behind the center one evening as we rested after we arrived from the farm that day. We wondered why they are running past the back of our build-

ing.

Then in the morning, we heard the same voice calling us. "Muangz Feix aah, Faam Feix aah! Can we place our things here in your center, including our papers, birth certificates and pictures etc? We are afraid that my father will destroy all of these."

"Okay, no problem, just



put your things in here." we answered. We saw her worried face. She related that her drug addict father almost harmed them last night and they fled away from their house. They were the ones that had passed behind our center last night. They slept at our neighbors' house a little bit farther away. They were terrified that night when their drug addict father seemed so angry with their mother and all of them, so they planned to pack up all their important things and hide them in our center. That day, the rain started to pour down and it was a little bit harder for them to go with an infant on her back, and her mother carrying bag packs. They need to go down to the school where their children are studying and take them all to Bangkok. They move quickly as they prepare everything so that her father cannot see them fleeing from him.

We felt very sad for them and we also know how cruel her father is when he gets drunk. We can still remember the past month when her father threw a heavy battery hitting her mother's forehead. They had to rush to the hospital at midnight. Her mother's arm was sprained and her forehead wounded when she tried to protect her face from that half-kilo battery. We think: What will be her father's reaction when he finds out that we helped his child, grandchildren and wife to flee away from him? What if he will come here and do the same thing with us? Then we whispered a prayer instead of worrying about our situation.

The next morning, we heard that her father burned all their clothes except her grandmothers' and little sisters' clothes. We saw her father's angry face when he passed by the center roaming around the village and calling his children who are working in Bangkok.

Then the next day, the drug addict's step-brother's wife asked us to help them call their son. So we went to help them, but it so happened that the angry drug addict also went there to call. He was still very angry with his wife and children. Since his step-brother doesn't know how to make a call, SULAD Elma did it for him. The angry drug addict gave the number and let his step brother talk to his son and ordered his wife and children to come home as soon as possible. He will do even worse things to them if they will not come home.

What will be his reaction if he knows that we were also involved in sending his wife and family away? I asked in my mind. But anyway we helped both sides. We help the family to flee away for good and helped him to use the phone. We can still remember his wife with bags on her back and his daughter carrying an infant on her back. His wife also carried some paper money for their spirits. We asked if we could offer a prayer before they leave on their motorbike.

God is just a prayer away even in the worst times in life and we want to let them know that the God in heaven loves them and will keep them safe wherever they go. Even though they are very devoted

to their spirits, we thank God that they still allowed us to utter a prayer for them. We know already that they are very prejudiced toward Christians, but in times of trouble they still realized that they are safe near to us. They still entrusted us with their things and thanked us for the help and prayer that we offered.

We thank God that even in their time of trouble they still allow God to deliver them from harm. We are thankful to the Lord for His goodness that until this time no one harms us anywhere we go. Call upon the Lord all the time because He can deliver us anytime and anywhere.

He said we can only use our



home-church for the concert. But God is really good. The Duo sang and played cello and violin well. The home-church was filled with nonbelieving neighbors (more than 30 of them). We also fed the children and adults, those who were able to wait until the musical program was finished.
