

Assuming we have the funds, in summer 2018 we will dig around the foundation of the Parish House and water proof it to eliminate the dampness and water infiltration in various locations.

It is the way that God's people have maintained the faith for 2,000 years. You will not hear the Good News of Jesus Christ in many places other than the church. We have a place for you this Sunday.

Sharing God's Bounty

The Exalted State of Servanthood

artin Luther, as professor of theology in the 1,500's wrote, "A Christian is a perfectly free lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is a perfectly dutiful servant of all, subject to all." Perhaps those two sentences appear at first to be contradictory. What Luther was trying to help us understand is that we, as Christians, are called to freedom from an obligation to serve, but that we are called to the freedom to serve joyfully.

This call to joyful servanthood is understood and often scoffed at, simply because we have confused servanthood with servitude. Servitude conveys the idea of bondage and even slavery. Servanthood, on the other hand, connotes voluntary service, joyful giving of ourselves, a willing choice to help others, and selfless commitment.

One who is involved in servitude serves unwillingly out of a sense of fear and has no hope of entering into a different state, while one involved in servanthood lives in an exalted state, a healthy and uplifting climate of helping others. Even though challenges must be overcome and problems may abound, the joy of servanthood is the overriding experience.



How do we get from a state of servitude to a state of servanthood? This transition is made when we properly understand the Word of God which clearly defines servanthood by explaining Christ's purpose in coming to Earth: "... the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Matthew 20:28). Jesus has lived the perfect life of the servant in our places, so we no longer are constrained to try to "measure up" to what God expects. The Law never saves, never enables us, only shows us our short-comings.

When we look at Christ, though, and how he lived his earthly life and what he has done for us, we are freed to respond with heartfelt, sincere, loving service to those he has placed around us. The acts of service we render are the same; the motivation and attitude are what make the difference. Through Christ, we are elevated to the exalted state of servanthood.



Time is a gift that is given to man.

To each he gives a measured amount; to each a directive to make it count.
Spend this gift wisely. Develop life's plan to the Glory of

God and the Service of Man.



In Sunday school we have lots of fun, but what we teach is serious stuff: God loves you and therefore you should love yourself. God loves others and therefore we should devote ourselves to doing the same. We sometimes forget these simple precepts—it takes worship and Christian Education to help us remember J - see you on September 10th!

Sunset, Sunrise

The sun has just gone down behind the hill, and you must hurry to get home before dark to say prayers with your family and to eat your supper. If you lived when Jesus lived, that's what you would do in the evening. In ancient times, morning and evening were important times to pray. In the morning people thanked God for keeping them safe during the night and asked God to guide them during the day. In the evening people gave thanks for the day and asked for protection during the night. When they prayed in the evening they also light-ed candles and oil lamps. There were no other lights except the stars and the moon!

Prayers offered near sunset are called Vespers, Evensong, or Evening Prayer. We light one big candle because it reminds us that Jesus is the light of the world, and he has come to save everyone. Before your evening meal, darken the room and put a big candle on the table. Then light it and read the following sentences, letting everyone take a turn being the leader. (Then light other candles near the big one and eat dinner by candlelight.)

Leader: Jesus Christ is the light of the world.

Group: The light no darkness can overcome.

Leader: Stay with us, Lord, for it is evening.

Group: And the day is almost over.

Leader: Let your light scatter the darkness.

Group: And shine on your people.

Peace It All Together

Micah 6:8 reminds us that God wants us to do justice and be fair and loving with others. Working for peace in the world—that's a tough order! Help children feel they are taking an active part in peacemaking by starting at home.

A key to a peaceful world is understanding that despite our differences, we all have much in common. Look at pictures of other cultures, such as those in a geographic magazines or the five-volume "Visiting in the Global Village" series (Augsburg Fortress Publishers, codes 15-9678, 15-9679, 15-9680, 15-9681, 15-9682). What might the people shown in those resources worry about, and what might make them happy? Share stories from other cultures. Explore the "Friends Around the World" series (Augsburg Fortress Publishers—including "Pam Mann's Friends in Africa," code 15-8118), which contain a variety of mission activities.

Write post cards with prayers thanking God for all living things; asking for God's care; and for peace and freedom everywhere. Add decorative designs with markers if you like. Send them to friends and family who live elsewhere.

Make an "Earth Flag" to display. Obtain a picture of the world and copy it onto a square of fabric. Have family members color the continents and oceans with fabric pens or markers. Cut out the picture and glue it or stitch it onto a 2' x 3' piece of felt or nylon. On felt squares, trace gingerbread boys and girls, making one figure per family member. Glue the figures in circle around the picture of the world to represent your family's efforts to join in peace-making.

The paper crane has become a symbol of peace worldwide. Obtain a book on Japanese origami to learn how to fold a paper crane. Hang several from a hanger to make a peace mobile.

Pray a prayer asking for peace. Then ask the family to think of ways they wish to work for peace in their daily lives. Invite them to pray for God's help in doing this.

Money Matters Personal Financial Stewardship

Investing Wisely

When you consider investing, you should start by asking, "Why am I investing?" If you are investing to enhance your personal kingdom rather than God's, you need to rethink your motives. Certainly, you should be investing so you can properly provide for your family and yourself. However, to amass money for your own security while neglecting the



needs of the needy and the work of spreading the Gospel would go against God's plan for your money.

As his steward, you acknowledge that it is God's money that you are entrusted to manage. Because you are a steward, you have the responsibility to honor God with all that you do with your money, which includes investing. With the awareness that it is God's money and that you will be held accountable for what you do with it, you should question even more, "How much risk is appropriate?" or "What level of risk is appropriate when investing God's money?"

Before you are able to invest any money, you must establish an emergency fund that will be accessible immediately in the event of job loss, health problems, or another emergency. This fund should be large enough to sustain you and your family for at least three to six months. After this fund is in place, you are free to invest.

Simply put, there are three categories or types of investments:

- Cash. You can choose to keep cash under your mattress (sort of like the third servant in the Parable of the Talents) or to put your money in bank savings or money market funds. This is a no risk investment option that provides only a small return.
- ✤ Fixed income investments. A fixed income investment occurs when you lend your money to a person or institution. In return for your money, you get the promise of being paid a certain interest rate and the future return of your principal. Examples of this type of investment are bank certificate of deposits (CD's), corporate bonds, municipal bonds, government bonds, etc. All of these investment vehicles pay interest, and, on specified dates, the principal is returned.
- Equities (growth). Equity refers to an ownership position. If you own stock, you own part of the company. The same pertains to real estate, collectibles, antiques, etc. As an owner, you want the value of what you own to increase. Because mutual funds offer professional management and diversification into stocks of several companies, mutual funds are a good and smart way to invest in a growth investment.

Wise investors make allocations among these three investment choices. As your investments grow, you should place some money in all three categories. The allocation mix among these three will be determined by several factors, such as your current and future needs, goals, age, and dollar amount of investments.
