



As mentioned above, and as many of you know, Wade Prajer (PHS 2015) died by suicide on June 3, 2018. Wade was the beloved son of Renee and Steve Prajer, and brother to Macie (PHS 2011) and Jesse (PHS 2013). Wade and Jesse were teammates of our son Henry and to so many in the Pomperaug lacrosse and football communities. The "Walk for Wade" was spearheaded by two of Wade's close friends, Griffin Namin and Michael Curcio. These young men gathered a team of volunteers and created a day of remembrance for Wade which took place at Pomperaug High School on 7/8/18. Their determination to make this event happen was truly exemplary.

their loved ones and friends to honor Wade has been both heartbreaking and inspirational. This kindness and the efforts of Griffin and Michael, multiple volunteers and donors generated over \$25,000.00 for the Foundation. There is no amount of money that the Archie or Prajer families would ever trade for Alex and Wade. We can only hope that in the loss of these two young men, the AAF can lift others up and raise awareness about mental health and the prevalence of suicide among young people in our country.

In shifting gears slightly, we are excited to report that the AAF worked again with the Active Minds chapter at Brown University and sponsored the 2nd annual Speakers Bureau presentation on 11/1/18. Stacy Pershall spoke to the Brown community and she was "gifted" on the same day to The Met High School in Providence through Active Minds' "Pay It Forward" program. In her presentation, Stacy spoke about her lifelong struggles with misdiagnoses of depression, anxiety and eating disorders, relationship challenges and bullying in school. She was finally accurately diagnosed with borderline personality disorder and is now able to manage her symptoms with

the help of Dialectical Behavioral Therapy and other interventions. Stacy's combined audiences totaled approximately 125 people. We are currently working with Brown's chapter to schedule the event for next fall. We are also very excited to announce that due to Catherine Windover's (PHS '19) determination, the AAF will be sponsoring a speaker at PHS on 5/23/19 along with a newly developing chapter.

The Foundation's involvement with Brown's Global Sport Initiative kicked off with the support of a lacrosse student fellow last summer. Two 6-week summer camps were run by this fellow, Matt McShay and his female counterpart, Hafsa Moinuddin at two community centers in Providence. They worked with kids ages 6-12 who had never been introduced to lacrosse before this.

The Foundation donated 35 sticks to get the program off the ground. We are now working with the Director of the Initiative and her colleagues to further develop the AAF's role in supporting more sport availability for the inner city youth of Providence.



We are so happy to recognize Don Wilson and Bridgeport Youth Lacrosse as they celebrate their 10th anniversary. The AFF and many other BYL supporters were honored at a reception in December, hosted by Don and the BYL community. This relationship with Don and BYL was started by our friend and AAF accountant, Jay Witek (whose pro bono tax work is truly appreciated!). Jay is the past director of Pomperaug Youth Lacrosse and in 2009 he invited Don and his players to Pomperaug for a clinic and BBQ. Jay knew of the AAF and suggested that the Foundation offer transportation to enable the BYL players to come to Southbury. That fun day began what is now a 10-year relationship between BYL and the AAF that has given the Foundation so many positive projects and players to be involved with.

The best part of the evening in Bridgeport was seeing the many BYL alumni who are either now in college or working in their field, some still playing, some not, but all educated young men, living healthy and productive lives! The AAF made a \$1000.00 donation to BYL to honor this important milestone and to support the expansion of BYL into BYLSA (Bridgeport Youth Lacrosse Sports Academy) which now includes an "after-school based, year-round program that provides academic intervention, behavioral support, mentoring, leadership training and sports instruction..."(Bear Tracks, BYLSA Quarterly newsletter, Fall 2018).

Our close family friend, Patrick Kahl honored the AAF with a \$1500.00 donation which he raised by running the Milford, CT half marathon in September. Thank you Pat and congratulations to you and sister Allison for a great run!

To begin with, and as the backbone of our mission, the AAF honored two female lacrosse players and one male lacrosse player from Pomperaug High School in June. Silvana Sinopoli (attending Central Connecticut State University), Hayley Yule (Merrimack College), and Jack Rafferty (PG-year, Canterbury School) were selected by their coaches for this scholarship as they are players who embody the characteristics established in 2008 following Alex's death. These include: love of lacrosse, family and friends, athleticism, determination and perseverance.

In addition to the Pomperaug scholarships. the Alex Archie Leadership award and the #16 iersey were awarded to Aidan Henry. Congratulations to these student-athletes and best wishes to them as they move forward. We would also like to acknowledge the Pomperaug Lacrosse community and the PHS Athletic Director for the tremendous equipment donation that was given to the AAF this past spring. And to the PHS Girls' team that once again raised money for the AAF during their annual Girls' Lax Night.

The annual \$1000, donation was given to The Hill School Boys' Lacrosse team. As Alex attended The Hill as a PG lacrosse player, we entrust this donation to our friend Ned Ide and the entire coaching staff to use this money in a way that best serves the needs of the team. We were able to meet The Hill's 2017-18 "#16" last spring: Michael Nastasi and his father Mike Nastasi. They coincidentally travelled to Providence for a family graduation and stopped to meet us and make a generous equipment donation.
