better sight.



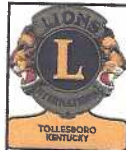

Cooper, second vice-president; Howard Frye, third vice-president; Ermen L. Boyd, secretary; Scott Corns, treasurer; Newell Rudder, Lion Tamer; William R. Grant, tail-twister, and Tommy Barbour. Chas. Bane Eugene Fox and Charles Secrest were selected as the first directors.

The tentative date for the new club's charter night was set for May 18.

Tollesboro Lions Report On Fire Dept.

Early in the winter the Tollesboro Lions Club undertook the task of raising \$1,000 to augment facilities of the Tollesboro Volunteer Fire Department and thus increase its efficiency. To date, \$810 has been collected.

Already, \$730.50 has been paid out of total collections and \$400 worth of hose is still needed by the department.

A breakdown of expenditures shows that \$625 went for a pump, \$66 for a fire truck tire and \$39.50 for truck battery and repairs.

Ray Trumbo is chief of the Tollesboro volunteer firefighters.

Mr. Nickels observed, "Henry Calvert had his convictions and neither censure nor criticism could change him when he thought he was right. He was outspoken but always very considerate of others. To him, his family came first; he wanted them to have the best of everything and by his tireless work and perseverance he provided it." Mr. Nickels said too that Mr. Calvert loved the Lions club and was one of its hardest workers.

He was elevated to governor after a period of service as district zone chairman and service to the Tollesboro club as president, tail twister and first vice-president. He is a charter member and one of the club's founders.



When W. B. "Buddy" Grant, of Tollesboro, returned home Tuesday as the new district governor of Lions International, the community of Tollesboro accorded him a fine homecoming welcome.

The motion to elect Mr. Grant as governor came from O. J. Huntsman, of Maysville, and was seconded by John Kelly Ryans, of Flemingsburg, who serves as deputy district governor.

Tollesboro is the club that has been responsible for designating safety lanes in Tollesboro, putting up street lights, setting up a Christmas program for the needy and assisting in a program to provide the community with improved gas and telephone service... He is married to the former Alice Moore and they have two teen-aged children, Willa Corinne, 14, and Sammy Kay, 13.

In becoming Lions district governor, Mr. Grant will become one of the youngest executives to have held the post.
