DORVAL TAKES GIANT STEP

Effective with the passing of Private Bill No. 130 at the Quebec Legislature last week, the City of Dorval was given authority to annex approximately 1500 acres of land in the Parish of Cote de Liesse.

The additional area takes in a large section of Montreal Airport, a long piece of land bordering the north side of Cote de Liesse Road, and a strip of property between 55th Avenue Lachine and the Royal Montreal Golf Course extending from the CPR line to Cote de Liesse Road. The balance of the Parish was divided between Saint Laurent and Lachine (see map on page 8).

Estimated assessment value of the property in the new Dorval annex at this time is approximately \$15,000,000. This does not include the Airport Terminal Building in the process of construction, or TCA's proposed new twenty-million dollar base which, according to tentative plans, will be located partly in Saint Laurent and partly in Dorval's new area.

Some of the business firms now having a Dorval address as a result of this transfer are Kingsway Transport, Smith Transport Canadian Comstock Company, Foundation Company of Canada, Construction Equipment Company, Bertrand Lumber, H.J. O'Connell Limited, Hart Motors Limited, Dorval Builders Supplies, and a branch of the Bank of Montreal.

As regards taxes, same are not collectible by Dorval until 1959. Mr. Rene LeBlanc, City Manager, advises that normal tax rates will apply and that no tax concessions are contemplated for industrial and commercial enterprises. However, he pointed out one exception in that taxes of existing residents of the annexed area will remain the same for the next 10 years, provided they have five arpents or more of land and same is not sold or sub-divided for other purposes during the aforesaid period. The minimum number of property owners needed to demand and obtain a poll on a zoning by-law remains at 10; however, the minimum number of such electors required to force a referendum on a loan by-law has been raised from 10 to 40. This latter ruling merely brings Dorval in line with the accepted standard in most other municipalities.

Authority was also given the City to pay up to a maximum of six percent on loans obtained by Dorval to defray the cost of public works etc. Previous maximum was five per cent. The increase of one percent will allow the City to remain competitive with other municipalities also wishing to obtain funds for various civic projects.

Dorval Adopts New Coat-of-Arms

It was no small sense of civic pride that Mayor John Pratt and the City Council last Monday evening unanimously endorsed acceptance of the new coat of arms designed for the City of Dorval by the Canadian College of Arms, and here-by reproduced by The Dorval Reporter for the first time for the information of all citizens.

Mayor Pratt, who made a study of heraldry in his university days, worked closely with the Canadian College of Arms in this research and pronounced himself as well-pleased with the results. He explained that the lion rampant was the crest of Pierre le Gardeur de Repentigny, first settler of the domain of "La Presentation" which was subsequently sold to Jean Baptiste Bouchart D'Orval on January 29th, 1691 (267 years ago this week) and which now bears the name of that gentleman.

The eagle with a background of diagonal stripes represents the crest of Dorval's first priest, Salignac de Fenelon.

The motto "Ego Porta Mundi" literally translated means "I am the gate of the world" and this, linked with the emblem of the eagle, ties in very neatly with the present-day airport theme in Dorval.

The City plans to obtain two copies of the coat of arms, plus an official seal, a ring, and a chain of office with said coat of arms engraved thereon. The Mayor's chair will also be appropriately carved. All ex-

penses incurred in this regard will be covered by subscriptions from city notables, professional business men, school commissioners, industrialists, civic officials, past and present, etc. Mayor Pratt has made the first donation and as soon as the total amount required is subscribed, it is planned to have an official presentation ceremony.

It was emphasized that, unlike the present City emblem, the new coat of arms is historically and traditionally linked through the art of heraldry to Dorval's history and background.



At the first meeting of the re-constituted Progressive-Conservative Association of Jacques-Cartier-LaSalle last Tuesday, Mayor John Pratt M.P., Mayor of Dorval, was nominated as the official P.C. candidate for the next federal election.

DORVAL DEPOSITS VALUATION ROLE

The new valuation role for the City of Dorval reveals a total property assessment value of \$75,837,620, which is made up of \$66,199,240, taxable and \$9,638,380, non-taxable assessments.

This is more than double the valuation role of the previous year which totalled \$28,617,200, made up of \$24,602,200, taxable and \$4,015,000, non-taxable property.

Although the budget for this year has not yet been completely finalized it is anticipated that the new tax rate will run between 80 and 85 cents per 100 dollars of val-

Two Ward System Now Official

By-law No. 424 has been passed by City Council authorizing the establishment of two wards in Dorval, replacing the present three wards. These two wards will be known as Dorval West Ward and Dorval East Ward, and the number of aldermen to be elected from each of said wards shall be three.

The boundary separating the two wards may be envisioned as an extension of the line of Goodson Road, running north from the Lakeshore through the Elm Ridge Golf Course to the northern city limits. Said line is approximately 700 feet east of and parallel to, Thorncrest Avenue.

The next civic election to be held on April 1st of this year will be based on this new ward system, which was approved by City Council to rectify the imbalance in ward representation under the old set-up. Previously, Strathmore Ward with 2177 electors was represented by two aldermen while the other two wards with 1417 electors combined were represented by four aldermen.

Dorval's new industrial park area will, of course, be part of the Dorval West Ward, while the newly-annexed area pre-

viously located in the Parish of Cote de Liesse will form part of Dorval East Ward.



Mr. Rene A. LeBlanc P. Eng., who was appointed City Manager of Dorval for a four-year term commencing January 1, 1958. Prior to this appointment Mr. LeBlanc served as City Engineer from June, 1955 to September, 1957, and as Acting City Manager from September to December 31, 1957. Whether or not a complete solution is realized, Mr. Catley's action will always serve as a good example of how one responsible citizen can, with dignity and tenacity of purpose, pierce that sometimes foreboding wall of red tape that often seems to encompass government agencies, and get results to boot!

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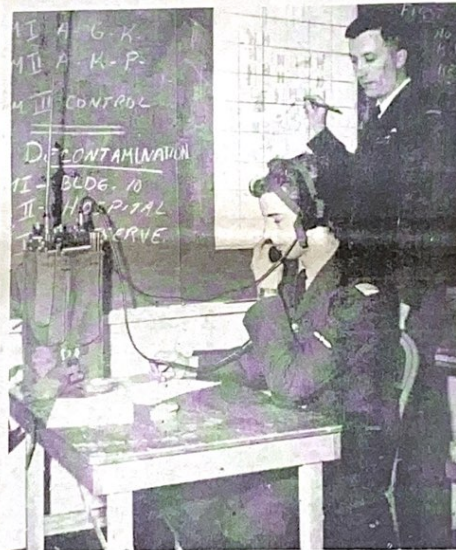
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MEN FROM MARS?

Lutherans Hold Annual Meeting

The annual congregational meeting of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Our Saviour was held at the parsonage 935-4th Ave., Lakeshore, on Monday, January 20th. Among the items of business was Pastor F. W. Zinck's report for 1957. He disclosed that throughout the past year 4,042 men, women and children had attended services and church school sessions. Pastor Zinck also stated the number of baptized members had grown to 132 as of Dec. 31, 1957, and the total amount received in offerings was slightly over \$10,000, or about three times the amount received in 1956. Civic Betterment League Hosts Panel Discussion Tonight

The Civic Betterment League of Dorval has invited representatives of opposing interests in the current Shopping Centre controversy to participate in a panel discussion at tonight's public meeting sponsored by the League. Mr. Stoenberg's Limited, will represent Dorval Gardens Shopping Centre Company, while Mr. Greenblatt will speak on behalf of Vale Enterprises Ltd., who have applied for permission to build a new shopping centre adjacent to the existing centre.

Other participants in the four-man panel will be Dr. Donald Armstrong of the Economic Research Corporation retained by the Dorval Citizens Merchants' Association and G. J. Dames of the Dorval Town Planning Committee, an advisory citizens' Committee. In announcing plans for the panel discussion, C. N. Hallford, President of the Civic Betterment League, pointed out that tonight's meeting will give residents of Dorval their first public opportunity to hear the opposing views of the established Shopping Centre interests and the prospective store operators represented by Vale Enterprises. "In view of the wide interest evidenced in the proposed extension of shopping facilities, the League feels that this public meeting will perform a real service for Dorval's citizens and taxpayers", Mr. Hallford stated. "It is important that citizens become acquainted at this time with the issues involved, in view of the definite possibility of a city-wide referendum in the near future". He continued: "This is an issue of importance to all residents, and we are looking forward to a well-attended, informative meeting". Mr. Hallford emphasized that the meeting will be held on a strictly non-partisan basis, with each panel member being given equal time to express his views on the controversial issue. Full opportunity will also be given those citizens attending to question members of the panel. Time of the meeting has been set for 8:30 p. m. at St. Stephen's School, March Ave. between Alford and Hwy.

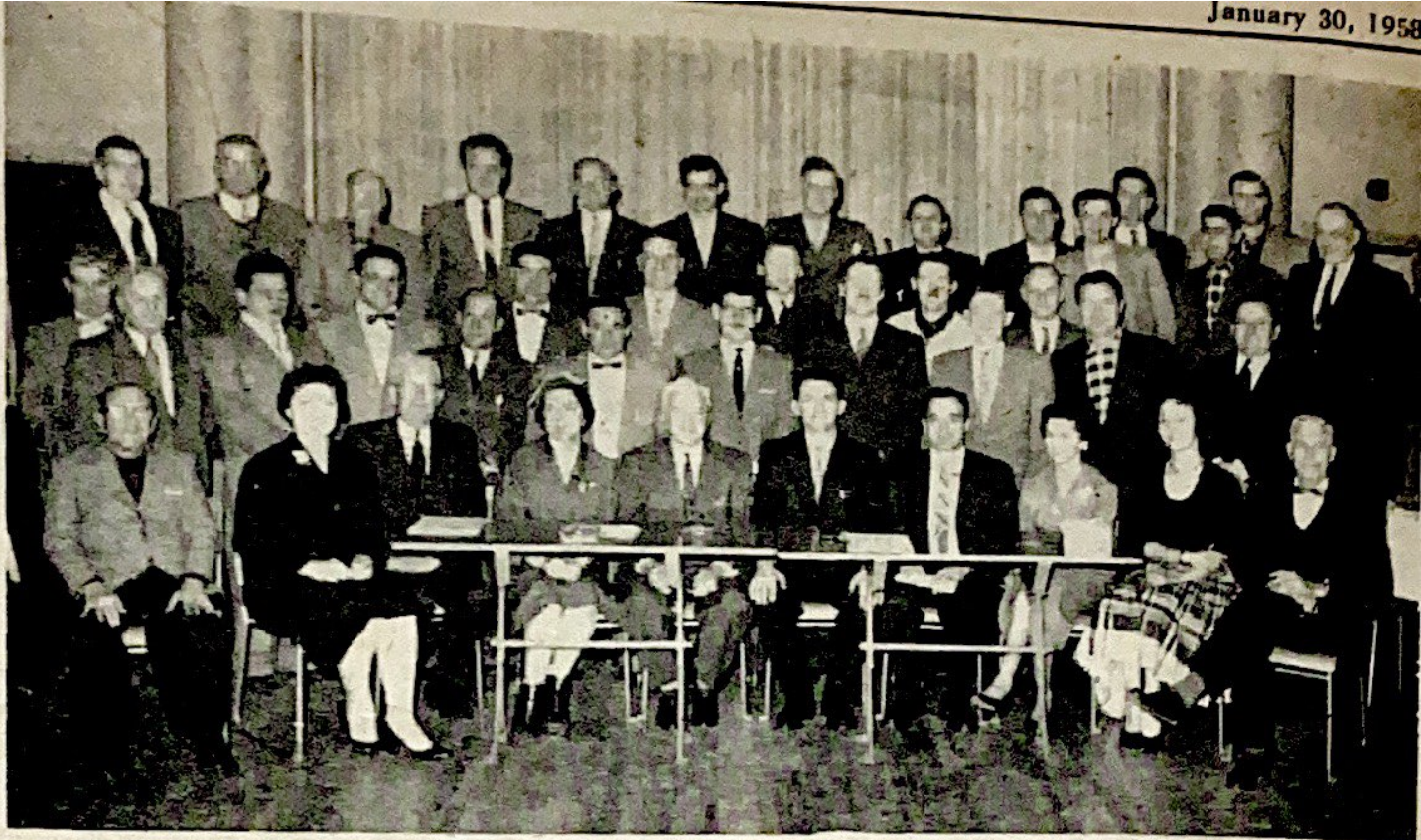

A review of Dorval's Building Report for the year 1957 reveals that 201 building permits were issued for a grand total of \$5,557,586. Of this figure \$1,214,000 was for commercial establishments, \$910,000 industrial, and \$1,775,000 for airport terminal. Housing accounted for \$795,600. Revenue realized from building permits amounted to \$8,600.50. This is sure proof of Dorval's steady growth and progress as a City on the Island of Montreal. Total value of building permits issued for the preceding year 1956 was \$4,500,630....

Toastmasters Report Growth

The appointment of Larry GODDARD as Governor of the Montreal area was announced today by Farrel J. VOCELLE, Governor of District Sixty-one, newest district in the Toastmasters International organization.

Mr. Goddard, vice-president, Engineers Toastmasters Club, and sales manager, Charles Cusson Ltd. Montreal, and a Lakeshore resident, said that Toastmasters growth has been so rapid it is now necessary to divide Area Two into two sections. Section A to include the St. Lawrence, Laurentian, C.I.L. and Engineers Toastmasters Clubs of Montreal; Section B, the Valleyfield, Lakeshore and Lake of Two Mountains Club.

Toastmasters International is a non-profit, non-commercial organization founded in 1932. It has grown until today there are over 2,500 clubs and 75,000 active members in nearly all countries of the Free World.

With the slogan, "For Better Speaking - Thinking - Listening", the appeal of Toastmasters training is that it gives members an opportunity to practice both impromptu and prepared speeches, in learning Parliamentary procedure and how to conduct meetings of all kinds. Straight-from-the-shoulder evaluation helps members rapidly improve. Each club is limited to 30 active and 10 associate members and usually meets once weekly at dinner for not more than two hours.

There are fourteen Toastmasters Clubs in District Sixty-one which includes the Province of Quebec and Eastern Ontario.

Dominion Stores Grow With Canada

The past two years has seen a phenomenal growth in the Dominion Stores organization right across Canada. In March 1955, there were 75 retail outlets throughout Quebec, the Ottawa Valley, and the Maritime Provinces, and today, through the opening of new units and the acquisition of existing stores, the Dominion has grown to 175 retail outlets in the same territory. 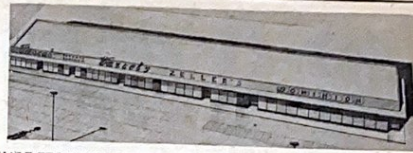
The handling of fresh produce is an exacting and dramatic business. A carload of produce is rarely in the plant lon-

Citrus fruits and vegetables of all kinds are received from as far away as Florida, California, Texas, Arizona and Mexico.

Dominion, while building many individual supermarkets, is also entering into shopping centre projects that are financed and developed by individuals or groups specializing in this field. The shopping centre is a new and proven medium of retail distribution. In many cities and large towns across Canada, especially when there has been substantial local growth in recent years these shopping centres are being built. Usually such growth has rendered downtown shopping facilities inadequate and intensified the downtown traffic and parking problems.

YALE FINALIZES PLANS

With the possibility of a referendum in the very near future to decide the fate of the new shopping centre by Yale Enterprises Ltd., plans are now being finalized by this firm in anticipation of a favourable response by the voters of Dorval. This new centre will be constructed adjacent to the Henry Morgan's Ltd. store in the existing Dorval Gardens Shopping Centre, and continue west along Metropolitan Blvd.

Studies have been made of many of the major U.S. and Canadian shopping centres by the builders in order that this new centre contain the most modern and up-to-date features. Ample parking space has been provided and the stores grouped to make shopping convenient. Construction will be similar to the Dorval Gardens centre in order that the new structure conform in appearance with the existing. Consisting of four major chain stores (Dominion Stores,

Zellers, Pascal's and Variety Store), and a bank, it is anticipated by Yale Enterprises Ltd. that the new centre will gross in excess of 5 million dollars annually. According to this firm, the new centre will attract many new families from Montreal and the Lakeshore to shop at the combined centres. Smaller merchants in the existing centre should not be affected adversely by the new stores but should see an increase in sales volume brought about through these new customers.

A decorative wall 5 feet in height will enclose the south and west side of the new centre. It is planned that this wall should enhance the view of those citizens residing adjacent to the centre and at the same time block from their view the side and rear section of the centre.

Parking will be maintained at the front of the stores to avoid all noise nuisance to home owners in this area.

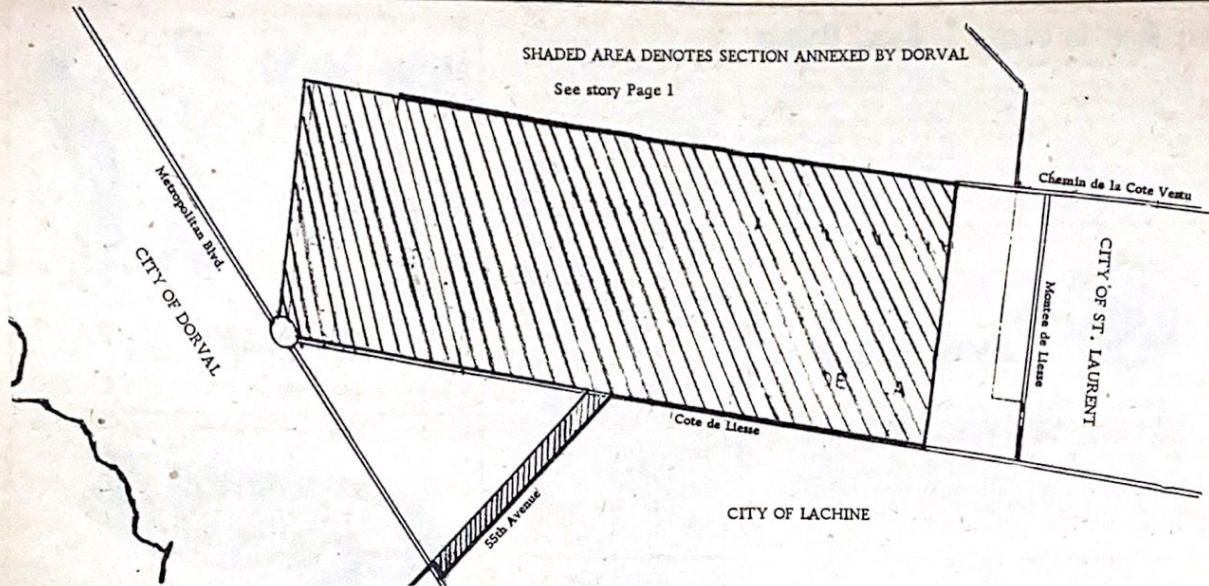

TO THE PROPERTY OWNERS OF THE CITY OF DORVAL:-

The City of Dorval wishes to make the following announcement:-

The Municipal Assessors have prepared a new valuation roll for the 1958 taxation year and this roll has been deposited in the hands of the City Clerk.

Each property owner will shortly receive a notice showing the new assessed value of his property. For example should your assessment be approximately double (say from \$5,000 in 1957 to \$10,000 in 1958) and the tax rate approximately half (from \$1.65 per \$100.00 to \$0.80 per \$100.00) the resulting tax will be approximately the same.

Before making an official declaration about the 1958 tax rate, the Council wish to analyze the changes just brought into the picture by the combined effect of the new valuation roll, the recent annexation of Cote de Liesse and the new buildings presently being erected at the Airport. We believe that these elements should benefit the citizens in the very near future.

The new valuation roll has been prepared with great care by the City Assessors. Property owners can now be sure that everyone is fairly and equitably assessed.

Every citizen should realize that the Cities and Towns Act clearly stipulate that properties must be assessed at a valuation that is as near as practicable to the real value. The courts have established that real value means market value, when there is a market for the property, and physical depreciated value when the property under consideration has no market value.

The assessors have then established the new valuation roll on that basis.

The Cities and Towns' Act also stipulates that a property owner may ask for a revision of his assessment if he has good reason to believe that his property has not been assessed equitably.

Following is article 495 of the Cities and Towns' Act in this regard, as amended for the City of Dorval.

"During such time any person who thinks himself entitled to complain of the valuation of his immovables as entered on the valuation roll, may appeal therefrom to the Board of Revision, by giving for that purpose a written notice to the clerk, stating the grounds of his complaint, and, if he complains that the valuation of his property is too high, he shall mention, in the notice, the amount of the valuation considered by him to be just.

A month's delay must elapse by law between the date of deposit of the roll and its homologation, to permit the hearing of complaints by property owners.

The City would ask every property owner before considering making an official complaint, to examine carefully his case in the light of the content of this message.

War Amps Key Tag Service

Over the next few months every automobile owner in Quebec Province will receive two miniature car license key tags bearing the same numbers as his own car.

The keytags will come from the War Amps Key Tag Service, manufactured by war amputation cases whose work not only keeps them gainfully employed but raises funds for benevolent work of the War Amputations Association of Canada. There are two branches of War Amps in Quebec, one in Montreal and the other in Quebec City.

Designed mainly so that car owners might recover lost car keys, the War Amps Key Tag Service has now been serving Canadian motorists for 11 yrs. This is the first time the service has been made available to all Quebec motorists.

In making the announcement E. Gagnon, secretary of the War Amputations of Canada, Montreal Branch, pointed out that twenty-four war veterans are steadily employed in a cheery Toronto workshop where all the employees are amputation cases and the boss Allan David Piper, wears two iron hooks in place of the hands he lost in a grenade explosion in 1942.

Last year the Key Tag Service returned one set of lost car keys to their owner every 36 minutes.

During the past five years of its operation Key Tag Service has transferred an average of \$26,431 annually to the Benevolent Fund Comm.

If you, Mr. or Mrs. Motorist, lose your car keys tomorrow, the lost keys are mailed to the War Amps office where quickly the name and address of the car owner is dis-

covered and the keys mailed to their rightful owner.

Key tags are sent out gratis. The recipient is expected to mail back 60¢ for duplicate key tags or 35¢ if only one key tag is required.

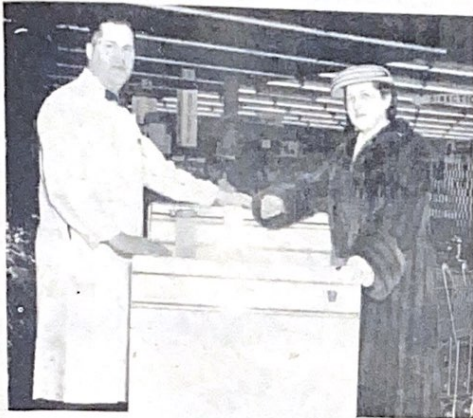

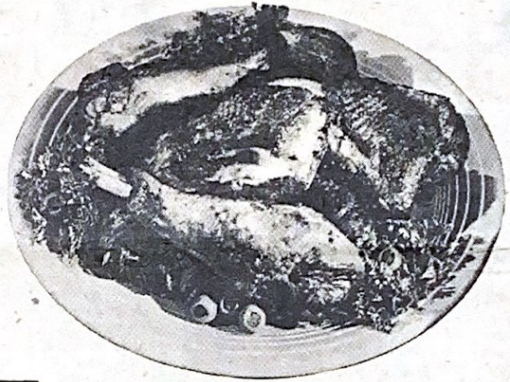

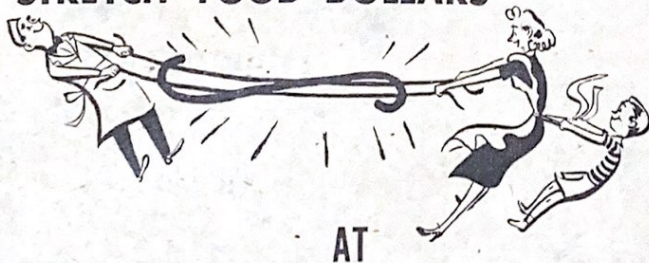
