Program: Grilled Plates
by Lou Read







Grill Plates probably began with Fred Harvey who had the rail road dining service and then lunch stands in rail road stations. There began the "Blue Plate Specials" using Blue Willow divided plates imported from Japan.

Most mid-west diners, also called "grills", used divided plates as well, probably where the grill plate got its name. The first plates were generic, some by Ellie Smith. In the 1927 Fostoria began their line of Fairfax grill plates. Jeanette, Hocking, Indiana, McBeth Evans, Anchor Hocking, McKey, and Federal joined production around the mid 1930s.

Half of the grill plates produced were the same size as the dinner plates, the rest were larger than the dinner plate (10 1/2 inches.) Daisy has 21 pieces to its collection including 2 grill plates.

Adam and Madrid grill plates are square.

When Lou did a check on Ebay for Grill Plates before this presentation he saw 640 items available for purchase.

He is looking for 10 more patterns to complete his collection.

CCDGS 2019 Show Along The Aisles by Bonnie Theard

Exhibitors at the CCDGS Annual Antiques and Vintage Collectibles Mart commented on the recent name change of the event in a positive fashion.

Charlotte Cocchiara at NOLA Pearl Girls booth said, "It's been a great show. We're seeing different people we have not seen in the past." Rosemary Trietch at the Just Glass booth said, "Opening the show to an antiques and vintage collectibles mart has expanded the customer base. It makes dealers rethink what they bring."

That expansion could be seen in the types of items in each booth, many including more kitchen ware. Dealers Jim and Nancy Schurter said, "Young people are looking for something they can use, which is why they gravitate to kitchen ware. They buy almost all our Pyrex. They remember their parents or grandparents having it."

Pam Francella of Depression Classics said, "Younger people today are looking for Pyrex and Fire King items, more 'kitcheny' stuff they remember seeing at their grandmothers house." . She noted that collecting seems to "ship a generation" as she was seeing grandmothers and granddaughters coming in together. She added that they are not looking for items to display and admire but instead want useful items.

Francella continued, "We are dealing with mature collectors who have almost everything they need and are now looking for the rare pieces, if they can afford them. They are not starting new collections. Instead of buying several of an item, they are buying just one piece."

Changes in the market can be seen in other ways. Glen Robinson of White Rose Antiques mentioned, "Not many new reference books are being produced."
