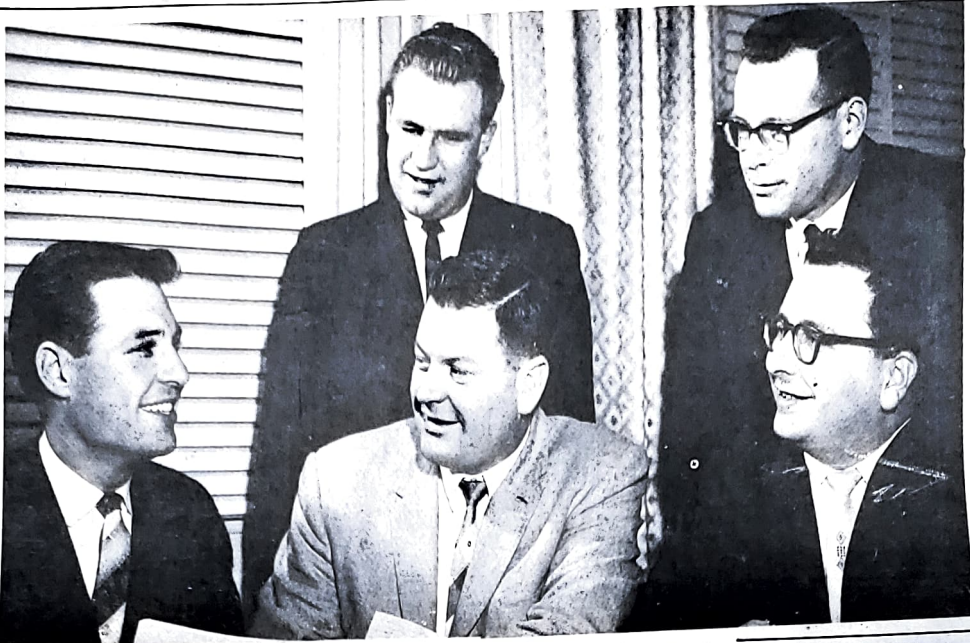
## ST. ANDREWS PLAYERS PRESENT PLAY

## BICYCLE TESTS TO TAKE PLACE SATURDAY MAY 5

The annual "Bicycle Tests" are set for Saturday, May 5th from 9:30 a.m. to 12 noon, on the parking lots of the three Dorval Swimming Pools, under the chairmanship of Mr. R. Hornswell, assisted by Mr. W. Chopp. Area chairmen are as follows: Ballantyne Park area - Mr. R. Carriere; Walters Park area - Mr. A.R. Moseley; Surrey Gardens area - Mr. G. Collard. The city will be divided in three areas, No. 1 area (Ballantyne Park) - All children living east of the golf course (including Cote de Liesse area). No. 2 area (Walters Park) all children living west of the golf course south of the railway. No. 3 area (Surrey Gardens) - all children living north of the railway west of the airport. With the help of the Home & School, P.T.A. and community Associations the test will be run on a community basis. This will permit all Dorval children to participate regardless of which school they attend. During the next week, Kane will visit the children in the Dorval schools to show a movie on safe cycling and

will give the pupils a booklet "Safety is in your hands". Children not attending school in Dorval should pick up one of these booklets from the Police station.

As there will be fewer test courses the hours will be staggered to avoid bottlenecks. Children 9 years and younger will report at 9:30 a.m.; 10 to 12 years at 10:15 a.m. and 13 to 15 years at 11:15 a.m. Please be on time, not too early or late. The finals will be held on the afternoon of May 5th at 2:30 p.m. at Ballantyne Park. Ten boys and ten girls from each area will be chosen to compete for the Raleigh bicycle and the trophy that goes with it as well as many other prizes. Raleigh Cycle Industries (Canada) Limited are again donating a boys and girls bicycle for our program. The senior and Junior Chambers of Commerce trophies will go to the school of the pupil who wins the bicycle. If the winner attends a school outside of Dorval the Library will be the home for the trophy for the year.

## REPORTS FROM OTTAWA

This week I would like to continue with a series of articles I have published recently on the various progressive municipalities that form part of the constituency of Jacques Cartier-LaSalle. I would like to give some facts and figures on the Town of Beaconsfield which, incidentally, has the highest ratio of English-speaking residents in this area, 99% being English-speaking according to information which I received recently.

Prior to 1957 the Town of Beaconsfield was serviced by wells and septic tanks. In 1957 the ratepayers voted to install water and sewer services in the Town, with the result that there has been a steady growth in the Town. For example, the population in 1956 was 5,600. In 1961 it had increased to 10,200. The bonded debt has increased from less than \$1,000,000 in 1957 to over \$5,000,000 in 1961. Even with this great increase in bonded indebtedness, the ratio of bonded debt for tax valuation has increased to 10.8%. The reason for this is that there has been a great increase in assessments to take care of the increase in bonded indebtedness. The assessment at the present time is \$45,500,000 in comparison with \$28,000,000 in 1957.

During those 5 years the Town has provided water and sewers through 37 miles of streets so that at the present time there are only 3 miles of streets not serviced. The town has also provided for 35 miles of asphalt paving.

The Town of Beaconsfield was one of the first Towns to take appropriate measures to have a Sewage Treatment Plant installed. This primary treatment of sewage is known as "the atomized suspension technique".

The year 1961 was one of the most successful years the Town has experienced. There were 238 single family pensions to the Beaconsfield Shopping Centre and the Beaurepaire Shopping Centre. There has been a marked

improvement in the quality of homes being built so that the assessment increased by \$4,500,000 over the year 1960. It is the considered opinion of the Town authorities that the growth in 1962 will even surpass the growth in 1961.

During the year 1961 the Town Council passed Borrowing By-Laws in the amount of \$1,050,000 for the installation of services in the Town. Plans have also been made for the installation of modern street lighting throughout the Town and for the installation of sidewalks on certain streets in the Town. During this extensive growth the Town has operated on a balanced budget. During the year 1961, for example, the Town showed a surplus of \$16,547.66.

The Town of Beaconsfield has very good Zoning By-Laws, along with a Development By-law. As a result of these by-laws, a major development has started east of St. Charles Road where the Town has approved a development program which comprises over 200 acres and it is expected that this will be fully developed within the next few years. Already the Town has installed services for 120 homes and the building program has started.

The Town budget for 1961 reached the total revenue of \$1,367,608. Beaconsfield is strictly a residential area with special zones set aside for commercial enterprises. The following is a break-down of the number of buildings in the Town: Single Family Dwellings - 2,546; Duplexes - 2; Apartments - 6; Business establishments - 37; Schools - 7; Churches - 5; Municipal Buildings - 5.

The total area of the Town is 2,513 acres and there still remains an undeveloped area of 1,000 acres, which means that the Town of Beaconsfield can eventually reach a population of between 25,000 or 30,000 people. OTTAWA, Friday, the 20th of April, 1962.

## LACHINE R.C. LOOKS FOR NEW HOME

The Lachine Rowing Club, oldest organization of its kind in North America, won't celebrate its 100th birthday next year unless it is able to find a new home.

The Club, founded in 1863 by a group of British engineers, has been informed that it must vacate its present quarters at 3051 St. Joseph St., Lachine, this summer.

The oarsmen have been feasting accommodation there from Lake St. Louis Anglers Inc., but space presently occupied by the club is now required by the Anglers for their own use.

The scullers are searching for suitable waterfront property on the Lakeshore on which to construct a modest boathouse. If they are unable to locate a suitable site, the club may be forced to close its doors on the threshold of its 100th anniversary.

Rowing is one of the last remaining pure amateur sports and the Lachine Rowing Club, with a membership of 35, mostly youths and young men from the Lakeshore area, is a non-profit organization with no funds apart from annual membership fees and donations from its old members.

It's not the first time the club has been in such difficult

ties. By a strange twist of circumstances, Lachine was the original tenant of the quarters now owned by the Anglers. The clubhouse, built for Lachine in 1926, was turned over to McGill University during the war years when rowing was at a low ebb.

After the war, Lachine and McGill shared the facilities until 1950 when, due to lack of interest on the part of students, McGill sold the premises to the Anglers. Lachine Rowing Club was at this time given an option to purchase the property but, like most amateur sports clubs, lacked the necessary funds.

Throughout its history, the

Lachine Rowing Club has had a fine record of success in rowing competitions in Canada and the United States.

A member of the Eastern Rowing Association, it has been a consistent competitor in this group's regattas and in the annual Henley competitions.

Disappearance of the Lachine Rowing Club from the local rowing scene after 99 years would not only be a sad thing for the sport of rowing and the many hundreds of young men who have found physical and mental inspiration in it, but would mean the end of one of the oldest sports clubs in North America, a club which has been an institution in Lachine and the city of Montreal for almost a century.

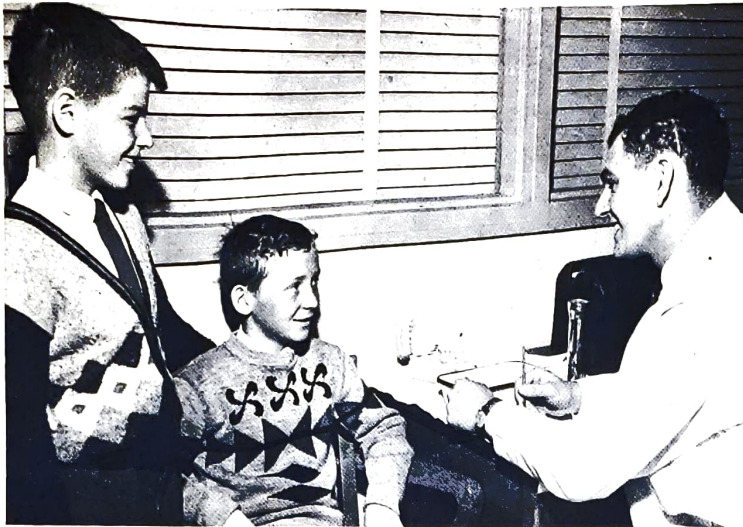

# DENTAL SURVEY IN DORVAL

Dr. C. G. Ballarge, who has recently completed a dental survey in the Catholic Schools in Dorval, said in an interview that the examination of the children's teeth and the instruction on tooth brushing given to the students makes quite an impression on them. They take the instruction very seriously and the lecture is good for about a week. But the week after that it is up to the parents to see that they keep up with the dental care outlined for them. "Children have to be told and told!"

The Unite Sanitaire Du Comte de Jacques Carrier Dental Care Programme covers the entire county and

the Dorval Schools are surveyed approximately every second year. Dr. Ballarge said that in Dorval about 85 to 90% of the children are receiving regular dental attention, a very high percentage. The number of children visiting the dentist only when they have a toothache is getting lower and lower.

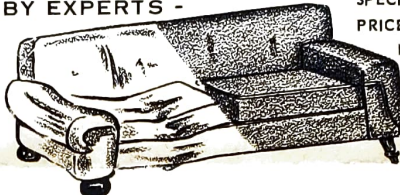
The examination of the teeth in the schools is directed towards checking the general health of the teeth, discovering special cases requiring braces, and towards checking to see if the child is receiving dental care and practising good dental hygiene.

Asked whether he found many of the children afraid of the dentist, Dr. Ballarge remarked that he rarely finds children timid about having teeth examined. Trained in post-graduate work with children, he finds them responsive to a straight forward and friendly approach.

Dorval children will also be included in a survey now underway which will compile statistics for a study on fluoridation. The reports will be used for comparison with other Canadian areas.

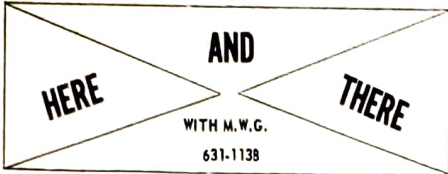
