## LACHINE R.C. LOOKS FOR NEW HOME

The Lachine Rowing Club, oldest organization of its kind in North America, won't cele-brate its 100th birthday next year unless it is able to find a new bore new home.

The Club, founded in 1863 by a group of British engineers, has been informed that it must vacate its present quarters at 3051 St. Joseph St., Lachine, this summer.

The oarsmen have been feasing accommodation there from Lake St. Louis Anglers Inc., but space presently oc-cupied by the club is now re-quired by the Anglers for their own use own use.

The scullers are searching for suitable waterfront pro-perty on the Lakeshore on which to construct a modest boathouse. If they are unable to locate a suitable site, the club may be forced to close its doors on the threshold of its 100th anniversary. Rowing is one of the last re-maining pure amateur sports and the Lachine Rowing Club, with a membership of 35, mostly youths and young men from the Lakeshore area, is a non-profit organization with no funds apart from annual membership fees and dona-tions from its old members.
