<u>A GENEALOGICAL STUDY OF A</u> <u>HINDALL FAMILY LINE</u>



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NOTE: The appendixes are best viewed in a (zoomed) digital format (as are the other documents cited in this study). The hard copies attached to this document are intended to provide some samples for readers who do not use computers or hand-held digital devices.

INTRODUCTION:

Appreciation of American history along with an enjoyment of tracking down historical documents while unravelling genealogical mysteries has been my motivation for preparing this document. There is a specific time and geographic region that has caught my interest; the time period includes the latter part of the 18th century through the middle part of the 19th century. The area has historically been referred to as the "Old Northwest Territory". Maybe you remember the phrase, "Go West young man, go west", this phrase is attributed to an editorial appearing in 1865, in the New York Tribune, by Horace Greely. He was referring to the lands that lay to the west of the thirteen original states, beyond the Appalachian Mountains. The Ohio River formed the southern border and the Great Lakes marked the northern border. In earlier times the Northwest Territory was known as the frontier (the first American frontier). By 1830 the frontier had been transformed into more or less a civilized land (which also was the approximate time the Hindall family relocated away from Virginia into Ohio & Illinois). Although, by 1830 the area was not a "true" territory, as some states had already been formed, the name, "Old Northwest Territory" remained in common use until well past the mid-century.

The territory (and the states contained therein) were subject to many and varied plans (from both government and private interests) designed to entice settlement & migration into the area. Hence, there developed a sociocultural event of a national historical saga. The "treasured saga" involved an epic migration of a free people in a free land; it involved a shared national vision of possessing the freedom to own land (their own "promised land"). Land ownership proved to be the precise catalyst required to inspire people to colonize the new territory. Persons, and in many cases, entire (extended) families picked up what possessions they could, and carried it by wagon, by horseback and for some, by foot to destinations offering the potential of prosperity. Every one of them bravely traversing the countryside and the Appalachian Mountains. All, seeking the American dream of making one's own way, of working one's own land, of being beholding to no one. I'm proud to have discovered a linkage to this dynamic time within my own (genealogy) family roots.

There are two closely related topics intertwined within this document. First, I will endeavor to show you how the^{*}"First Hindall Family" participated in the dynamic process of migration into the Northwest Territory (and newly formed states). The second topic focuses on my direct ancestral line, all of whom eventually settled in Ohio.

^{*} The "First Hindall Family" is defined as the first Hindall patriarch (John) and his spouse (Mary) along with their nine surviving children.

SUMMARY:

John Hindall was a British soldier at the battle of Yorktown. He was one of the prisoners who remained in this country after cessation of the war. He married his wife, Mary, and they established their lives in Virginia. The first record I've found (so far) originates in Fauguier County, in the year 1786. John, appears on a county tithing (tax) list where he would have been approximately 19 years old. The next record reviewed appears in the county deed book, where in 1791, he leased 50 acres from John Blackwell (Esquire of Tinpot). The terms, as stated on the lease, gave use of the land for the duration of their lives of John and his wife Marry. Verbiage (by the clerk/recorder) indicates that they had lived on the plat for three years; which leads me to an assumption--that John's marriage to Marry, would have occurred during 1788 (No marriage record located yet). Together, they had nine (possibly twelve) children that survived to adulthood. After John's death (with the exception as noted) all of their children moved out of Virginia, to Illinois and Ohio. The youngest daughter, Susan married into a thriving Fauguier County family, marrying Barnett Dodd on 11 October 1831. The eldest son, John (Jr.) moved to Ohio (Logan County) and the next eldest son named William had already (by 1829) became a circuit rider (preacher) for the Illinois Methodist Episcopal Church. The youngest son, Robert, (3rdth Great Grandfather) moved first to Licking County Ohio, and later to Madison Township, Hancock County Ohio. Two daughters, Elizabeth and Nancy married McLearen brothers (Nathaniel & Lawrence) and moved to Illinois. And, alas, to my deep regret, I have been unable (so far) to locate information on three other daughters (assumed to be the older siblings) who are named Marry, Margret & Sarah.

The "First Hindall Family" will have by the year 1840, completed the divergence by committing to settling in Illinois and Ohio. It is at that point in this document you will notice that I've shifted focus from the "First Hindall Family" to my direct ancestral family line. They having first migrated to Licking County Ohio and later Hancock County Ohio. Then after an approximate twenty year stopover in Michigan, we will arrive at the last stop in this document, which is an entry for Grandfather "Gerry", in the year 1930, at the city of Findlay, located in Hancock County, Ohio.

METHODOLGY FOR SUPPORTING DOCUMENTS:

Dear reader please be advised that I have endeavored to stay true to the research methodology defined in the Genealogical Proof Standard (GPS) for researching and presenting genealogical facts. I stand ready to support the accuracy of my research. Having stated that, please be aware that my research has been limited to viewing previously published historical extracts and indexes, along with my own efforts of on-line data base look-ups. No doubt there are many records still to be found that only an on-site appointment and local records search could reveal.

THE TIME LINE OF THE RECORDS FOUND:

1786 - Tithable (Tax) List:¹ The following entries (1786 & 1791) appear in a document prepared by Mr. John P. Alcock, within his indexed listing of abstracted records, titled, <u>Fauquier Families 1759-1799</u>:

•Hendall/Hindale/Hindal, John+. 86-99B.

The "+" sign indicates that John made his mark, which likely means he was unable to read or write. The number "86" is the year of the census and the "99B" entry identifies the county district and commissioner, who in this case was "Thornton Buckner".

1791 – Per Mr. Alcock's² compilation an entry appearing in the County Deed Book. In Deed book 10, page 405, contains the following entry: D 10-405, 1791. "Lease from John Blackwell, Esq. of Tinpot for lives of him & Mary Hendall (note the spelling); they have lived on tract 3 years."

1800 - Property Tax List, Northwestern District, Fauquier, Virginia. A query on a database maintained by Rootsweb.Ancestory.com³ revealed the following entry:

"1800 Property Tax List, Northwestern District, Fauquier, Virginia. Fauquier, Virginia Commissioner of the Revenue. Fauquier County, Virginia Land Tax Books, 1800 Pickett's District

1800 Property Tax List, Northwestern District, Fauquier, Virginia

A List of the Land Tax within the district of Charles Pickett Commissioner in the County of Fauquier for the year AD 1800":

Handle	John	50 of Blackwell	10	25.0.0	\$0.40

Notice the spelling of the name, it seems the data collector and/or commissioner (Charles Pickett) spun yet another version of "Hindall". Anyway, the table informs us that 50 acres were leased from "Blackwell", the average cost per acre was \$10.00 and the valuation of the property was set at \$25.00 (It seems the valuation is half what the average rate per acre would reflect (Possibly indicating the land was somehow subpar for the times/area or maybe the person establishing the value gave 4th Great Grandfather John a break. At any rate (pun intended) his tax came to the total of \$.40 (cents).

1809 - A well-known genealogist, Joan W. Peters researched and later published an index⁴ of previously [†]uncatalogued, "loose papers" that were being stored by the Fauquier County Circuit Court. On page 172, of her publication, a name (John Hindall) appears on the eighteenth line of the scanned image listed as the "Thomas Robinson's 1809 Personal Property Tax List". However, it must be noted that Ms. Peters did not interpret the (hand written) name as Hindall; instead in the name index on page 192, the name is listed as:

HUNDELL [HUDNALL?]

A prime example of how even seasoned researchers can misread handwriting on historical documents that has been written in long hand. I will (one day) send a message to the author, Ms. Peters and suggest there be a spelling correction made for future versions of her publication (Hope I do not get a scathing retort back).

1810 - Upon review of a published transcription taken from the 1810 census,⁵ beginning with the entry titled, "Folio # 417", on the second line down, John Hindell's (note the spelling) name appears. It is interesting to note some other names located on the same page, within the same or previous folio numbers (assuming the enumerator would have listed families that are physically located in the same general area). The last names of McClarin, Martin, and Dodd seem to be well known by the Hindall's and their names will appear in other later documents related to future Hindall activities.

The numbers annotated for John, reflect six females (assumed to be children) living in the household (five in the age range of 16-26 & one in the 0-10 range), and four sons (two under 10 years of age and two between 10-15 years of age). Note: When this data is compared to later documents, i.e. a [‡]will, it appears, (Shockingly) that one daughter and one son may have died sometime after 1810 (this is my assumption and has not been verified).

Virginia Census – I would like to (hopefully with the readers pardon) break from the chronological listings temporarily to provide information about the Virginia census. ⁶First, the 1790 & 1800 census reports were lost for the state of Virginia, leaving the 1810 "census as the first census that can be used for research. Second, there is always a possiblility of human error, enumerators could and did make mistakes; also omissions occurred due to uncooperative people who did not wish to be recorded.

[†] Three preservation grants were issued in 1994, 1997, 1994, to the Fauquier County Circuit Court which provided the means for historians and genealogists to conduct research on many hundreds of documents that had been stored for many years as "loose papers" within the court archives.

[‡] John's will of 1829, named the following children--Daughters: Mary, Margaret, Sarah (birth dates unknown), Elizabeth (B: abt 1795), Nancy (B: abt 1799), Susan (B: abt 1813). Sons: John Jr. (B: abt 1796), William (B: abt 1800), Robert (B: abt 1809)

Having said that, I have been unable to locate John Hindall (utilizing all known spelling variations) within the 1820 census⁷ (listings on Ancestory.com). So was he overlooked or did he decide not to be counted? Due to the fact that John previously appeared on a [§]tax list and was listed on the 1810 census, would indicate, I believe, that he was not prone to avoidance of the "tax man" so it would seem that somehow the enumerator simply missed recording him (This may be the basis of another mystery).

1826 - I give many thanks to the Library of Virginia for a program that was implemented to digitize historical records. There is a section devoted to Chancery Court proceedings and the record of "Pollard versus Hindall" appears under index number 1828-031.⁸

The documents are difficult to read because the handwriting is hard to decipher and because of the strange, but typical (for the time) legal terminology that was used I was able to make out enough of the words to glean a "gist" of the case. So to wit: On 31 March 1826, Patrick H. Pollard, brings forth a complaint to the court against John Hindall.

John was clear-cutting wood on land that came into an ownership dispute. There is statement from Pollard (which was taken verbally and written down by the court official), and another statement from John; also, appearing are depositions from Sanford Dodd, James McLearen &, Robert Jackson (again all documents were verbal statements taken and written down by the court official). There is a copy of the 1798 lease that John Blackwell **reissued and there is a copy of the summons the sheriff served to John mandating his appearance before the Chancery Court. John would have been over 67 years old; it's not inconceivable that it would have been a hardship for him to travel to the courthouse (which would have required at least a day or more of traveling time).

The final judgment from the Chancery Court did not occur quickly; an entry on a cover sheet has a "Nov. 24, 1828", date listed, followed by the word, "Dismissed". Seemingly, the court found in favor of the defendant—John Hindall. Sadly, John died five months later.

1829 – Another respected authority in Fauquier County, VA history and a credentialed genealogist, Ms. Dee Ann Buck, in her published abstract of papers⁹ (that were found stored away in the Fauquier County Court) the following entry appears—John Hindall's last will and testament:

"Hindall, John Sr--Will--18 Apr 1829, 28 Sep 1829, daughters: Mary, Margaret, Susan Hindall, Elizabeth McLearen & Nancy McLearen, to received \$60 in cash, Daughter: Sarah to receive \$100, life stock & household items, Son: Robert B. Hindall to receive \$20 & household items., Son: John H. Hindall Jr. to receive \$60, son Wm Hindall to receive \$40, rest of the estate to be used to pay debt in control of

[§] I have to believe it likely there are other types of ⁷tax listings (1810 - 1829) yet to be found that includes information on John Hindall's household. I will keep searching for those listings.

^{**} There is an entry dated 1791 in the Fauquier County Deed book of the lease; why it was reissued in 1798 is somewhat of a mystery. An answer might be within the statement that John made for the Chancery Court case, but I cannot decipher enough of the handwriting to know for sure—very frustrating because I really would like to know. Hopefully, someone will be able to better decipher the handwriting.

daughter Sarah, any monies left over she is to be divied with her other siblings, Exrs: listed as my name not given. Witness: Benjamin Tiller, Aldridge James, & John Dodd. Book 11, page 58"

John's will provides a great deal of information about the family. First, note there is nothing mentioned about Mary, John's wife. The first and most likely thought is that Mary had already died. It will become one of my goals to find some definitive record of Mary's death and where she and John's graves might be located.

The second question; why is Sarah given the bulk of the goods and charged (essentially) with functioning as the executor of the will, something that would have been unusual for the time due to Sarah's gender—(gender discrimination was very much practiced in the day). I draw your attention to the following phrase appearing in the will, (Sarah was to divide) "divied assets among the siblings after debts to the estate are paid".

Finally, please note the two dates entered, which was a common practice of the time. The first date would be the actual day of death and the second would have been the date the clerk received the witnesses and recorded the will into the county record.

1830 - A copy of this census¹⁰ reveals several interesting facts: First, Robert Hindle (spelling) is listed as the head of household of what I strongly believe was the original "First (Hindall) Family" homestead, that is to say, his father (John Hindall's) house. Note, there are four females listed as living in the household and this would be keeping with the fact that the three (assumed) older sisters Mary, Margaret, Sarah and the youngest sibling, Susan do not at this time have any (discovered) records of marriage (at this time). Robert's two other older sisters, Elizabeth, had married Nathaniel McClarin¹¹ (note the spelling change from McLearen) in 1813, and Sister Nancy, had married Lawrence McClarin¹² in 1817. John (Jr.) appears on the same census page, but, as head of another household are listed--four white persons under 20 (assumed to be children) and one female slave under 10 years of age listed. Second eldest brother William, had (by this time) married Nancy Martin, on January 30, 1823; additionally, he is serving as a fully accepted circuit-rider (preacher) for the Methodist Episcopal Church in Illinois.

1831 - John & Mary's youngest child, daughter Susan has married Barnett A. Dodd,¹³ on 11 October 1831 (Fauquier County, VA). By all accounts and records reviewed, it appeared that Susan and husband Barnett Dodd prospered and continued to live out their lives in Fauquier County, Virginia.

1832 - There is a record of Robert purchasing 80 acres (\$100.00) of government offered public land in Illinois,¹⁴ but there is no indication that he intended to settle the land. Perhaps (my assumption) he was working a speculative deal with family members, i.e. older brother William and/or brother-in-laws, Nathaniel & Lawrence McLearen (all three of them having eventually settled in Illinois). If he did move to Illinois he did not stay long, as he settled in Ohio three years later. Whatever became of the land will require a search of county deed records (which are not currently available on-line).

1835 - Robert B. Hindall purchased 80 acres of land in Licking County, Ohio.¹⁵

The freeware application that I used to locate the platt of land that Robert purchased in Licking County was from *Earthpoint* URL: http://www.earthpoint.us/TownshipsSearchByDescription.aspx .

This application converted the Public Land Survey System (PLSS) descriptors of township (1), range (11) and section (20) meridian (U.S. Mil Survey) to a set of modern geographical coordinates. I was then able to plug in the coordinates using *Google Maps* to find an approximate location.

I also got an assist to a message I placed on the Licking County message board contained on Ancestory.com, from sbkc192113, where he stated:

".... The east half of the northwest quarter would have been about one-quarter mile from east to west, and one-half mile from north to south. I suspect that the roughly-80-acre rectangle owned by your ancestor was just to the east of what is today 12715 Fairview Road, with the northeast corner cut off by Ballou Road and the southeast corner cut off by Fairview Road."

I believe "sbkc192113" has "nailed the location" as close as can be humanly expected. You can view the location by plugging in the coordinates for the NW Corner (39.9836023, -82.31121162), into *Google Maps* (Reminder the east half of the northwest corner would be ½ mile to the east from the coordinate given).

First Family Divergence:

It is at this point, dear reader, you will see a shift in my focus from the "First Family" to those who are in my direct line of decent. By this time the First Family members have established roots in Ohio, Illinois and Virginia. Daughters Elizabeth (Hindall) McLearen and Nancy (Hindall) McLearen along with second son William Hindall have established households in Illinois; first son John moved to Logan County Ohio. Third son (3rd Great Grandfather) Robert moved into Licking County Ohio; youngest child and daughter Susan, remained in Virginia, marrying into "seemingly" a prosperous Virginia family (Dodd).

1840 - Franklin Township, Licking County, Ohio census.¹⁶

The name listed on the census is Robert Kindle [hindle] (Spelling--The enumerator and record recorder got it wrong on two counts). Robert is listed as the head of household for the Franklin Township, Licking County, Ohio Census. Robert has (by this time) married Catherine Grigsby and they have two children (Sarah 9, and George 3 years old—the very same George who will eventually become my 2nd Great Grandfather. Eldest brother John is listed on the Perry Township, Logan County (Ohio) census as the head of household; he and wife, Catherine Huffman have five children (3 daughters, 2 sons).

1850 - Franklin Township, Licking County, Ohio census.¹⁷

This was the first year when individual names of the household members were required to be entered on census forms, which really helps in research. Robert & Catherine have eight children (6 sons & 2 daughters): Sarah 19, George 13 (who in the future will be 2nd Great Grandfather), Francis 11, John 9, Richard 9 (could they be possible twins), Thomas 5, Elizabeth 3, Marsh 1. It appears that Robert's occupation is abbreviated for Farmer (but the handwriting is difficult to decipher). George, Francis & John are the only children listed as having attended school that year.

The following information certainly made me sit up and take notice^{††} Roby Ann Bishop (future wife to George) appears in a Muskingum County, Ohio 1850 Census, being listed as six years old, and living in the Samuel Fleming household.¹⁸ Samuel's wife's name is Anna (Bishop) Fleming. I'm declaring an assumption; which is that Roby Ann(a) appears to be living with either her maternal grandmother or a maternal aunt (hence Roby's middle name, Anna). During the mid to late 19th century it was traditional for the eldest daughter to be named for persons within the maternal line, i.e. grandmother, mother, aunt; as was the fashion for the period to use middle names. But, it does make one ask the question of what became of Roby Ann's parents (this will just have to be another search effort on the to-do list for later time). I have developed a real interest and perhaps even a kind of fondness for 2nd Great Grandmother Roby Ann, if such a thing is possible, as I have traveled back through time and found an element of mystery surrounding the life of Roby Ann. I suspect there is a great deal more (of a colorful life) left yet to discover.

1860 - Franklin Township, Licking County, Ohio census.¹⁹

Robert is 50 years old and his occupation is listed as a Cooper (Barrel Maker); Catherine is 44 and is listed as a House Keeper. Their real estate value is listed as \$800.00, and their personal estate is listed as \$500.00. It would appear that Robert and family were not wealthy. The following people are listed as members of the household:

George W Hindall 24, Frances M Hindall 21, Catharine Hindall 19, John Hindall 17, Hamilton Hindall 15, Elizabeth Hindall 12, Noah Hindall 10, Wm Hindall 9, Sarah Hindall 7, May Hindall 5, Harrison Hindall 2, Nancy Hindall 1/12.

The eldest daughter, Sarah who would be 29 is not listed nor is Richard who would be 19. Francis, and his wife Catherine were recently married (within the year of the census), but are still living in his father's household. Hamilton's name is Thomas Hamilton as Noah's name actually is Noah Marsh, which explains the name discrepancy from the 1850 census. George is listed as a Cooper (occupation) and is listed as being

^{††} The name on record actually states, "Anna" instead of "Roby Ann", as subsequent records will reflect.

unable to read or write. John, Elizabeth, Noah, William, Sarah, and May, all attended school that year, but Hamilton did not. Take note that daughter Nancy is only one month old.

1870 - Madison Township, Hancock County Ohio census.²⁰

There are several items that pop out for interest: First, the families (Robert & Catherine and son George and his wife Roby Ann) have moved from Licking County to Hancock County. Next, the enumerator seemed very much challenged in effectiveness of spelling names (also his penmanship needed work). The name appearing on the census is R. K. Hendel. Also, the "e" was dropped from the end of Catherine's name; Noah's and May's name were misspelled and Thomas was likely (proved in later documents) named Thornten. Who Susan might be is a new mystery. Additionally, some of the stated ages on the census of the children living in the household conflict with previous census information so perhaps the enumerator should have been called to task. The members listed on the census for the household:

R K Hendle 61, Catherin Hendle 56, Richard Hendle 24, Thornton Hendle 22, William Hendle 19, Noahn Hendle 21, Sarah Hendle 18, Mary Hendle 16, Susan Hendle 14

Missing names from the previous census are: Elizabeth 22, Harrison 12, Nancy 10. (Please, do notice that Richard has returned, which is good, because I was worried about him).

There is nothing listed for the value of the family's real estate, perhaps because there wasn't any real estate yet (maybe due to the recent move). The value for the personal estate is listed for \$800.00 (I dearly hope Robert was not revealing his true wealth as it would seem that not much progress had occurred in the last ten years). Robert's occupation is listed as being a farmer (no more Cooper work). William, Sarah, May, Susan attended school, but all are listed as being unable to read or write (I "got to" believe the enumerator was only just guessing). Robert, Richard, Noah and Thornton (assumed Thomas) are listed as being eligible to vote (sorry ladies, the Nineteenth Amendment to the US Constitution had not yet become the law of the land).

Another Hindall household appears on the census, George and Roby Ann were counted on the 1870 census as a separate household; within their household the following children are listed:

David A Hindle M 8y; William F Hindle M 6y; Martha J Hindle F 4y; Charles W Hindle M 2y

1880 - Madison Township, Hancock County Ohio Census.²¹

George is 43, Anna is 36; George still is noted as being illiterate. Son David is 18 and listed as attending school, but also listed as a laborer; daughter Martha is 14, attended school and living at home; son Charles is 11 and listed as a laborer, but he also attended school; son Robert B. is 9 and attended school.

1900 - Madison Township, Hancock County Ohio Census Roll 1284. Two entries of interest appear on this census: First on page 6B,²² Catherine (Grigsby) Hindall, wife of 3rd Great Grandfather Robert is listed as a widow. She is listed on the census form as being 84 years old; she cannot read or write. Also, she is credited with giving birth to 15 children, 11 of whom were living during the census.

Another entry (same census document) on page 7B,²³ lists George and Roby Ann as being "empty nesters".

Note—I was not able to locate a census record (using Ancestory.com) for Robert Bannister (son George & Roby Ann).

1910 - Arlington, Hancock County, Ohio census.²⁴

George is listed as 72 years old, and Anna as 65. George is listed as being able to read and write (Good for him!) while Anna is listed as not being able to read or write. Anna is listed as giving birth to six children, five of whom where living. Both of Anna's parent's place of birth are listed as "unknown" (very curious), while George's mother's place of birth is Ohio, and his father's place of birth is Virginia. George's occupation is listed as a laborer of odd jobs. George and Anna own their home, free and clear of any mortgage.

1910 - Richland Township, Montcalm County, Michigan census.²⁵

Robert Bannister and Harriet (Hattie Treece) Hindall are married and are living in Michigan; they have three children: Great Grandfather Robert's occupation is listed as being a "farmer" on the census form.

Darrel M Hindall 18, Gerald G Hindall 6, Robert B Hindall 0 [6/12]

And, at this time, within the first decade of the new 20th century, Gerald G. Hindall, (age six) who in the future will become my Grandfather is listed on the census.

1920 - Richland Township, Montcalm County, Michigan census.²⁶

Robert and Harriet (per the census) appear to live on a farm, and own a house with a mortgage; Robert's occupation is listed, but it is too difficult to decipher based on the enumerator's handwriting. It does not appear to be a farmer, but again, I cannot clearly make it out. The members (and age) living in the household are:

Robert B Hindall 49, Harriett Hindall 46, Darrel Hindall 27, Garrath (spelling--should be Gerald?) Hindall 16, Robert Hindall 10.

1920 - Madison Township, Hancock County Ohio census.²⁷

Roby Ann (Bishop) Hindall is 75 years old and is now a widow. George passed away in 1915 at the age of 78. Within this census, there is yet another "eye-opening, make you sit up in your chair" moment. I read in this census that both Roby's parents are listed as having been born in Canada and speaking French, i.e. they were French Canadian. It has been stated by some Hindall family members that Roby Ann was of French Huguenot decent which might explain the French parental listings on later census forms (Is it possible that Roby Ann was not (actually) an American citizen—i.e. possibly even in an illegal alien status—this might account for some of the mystery surrounding Roby Ann?). This certainly inspires me to dig deeper for the answers.

1930 - Arlington, Hancock, Ohio census.²⁸

Robert Bannister Hindall and wife Harriet are now living in Arlington, Ohio. Harriet's father, Jessie Treece is 95, and living with them. Robert's occupation is listed as being a carpenter, he appears to living on North Main street and owns his house which is valued at \$1,000.00; he is not listed as being a veteran. The following people are listed as members of the household:

Their rent is \$14.00 a month and they own a radio. Gerald's occupation is listed as being a Painter. Gerald's place of birth is Ohio, Marry's place of birth is Michigan. Mary's father's place of birth is Ontario Canada, and her mother was born in Michigan.

NOTE: In keeping with the convention of not including entries of persons who are currently living (as the next round of records would reflect) I have chosen to stop any further entries at the 1930 census.

CONCLUSION:

What an amazing journey I have experienced--researching my family history—and, the journey certainly is in no way completed; there are more stories to tell. I shall consider this document as an exercise in a continuous work in process.

American history, especially the period encompassing the "Old Northwest Territory" is steeped in a rich national saga; an epic chronicle of a people determined to persevere and succeed through their own endeavors. And, by doing so, stand in triumph of achieving their American dream. I feel wonderment and pride of the grandeur contained within the embodiment of the American dream.
