Sports Betting In Some States Grandfathered-in

he Professional and Amateur Sports Protection Act ("PASPA") freezes sports betting into whatever form it took in 1991. It allows states to continue whatever form of sports wagering they had a quarter of a century ago. But Congress expressly barred states from legalizing any new form of sports wagering.

There is a general assumption that PASPA allows only the states of Nevada, Delaware and Oregon to have legal sports betting. Because this federal statute locks in the states, it is necessary to see what forms of gambling were permitted under state laws in 1991. Delaware and Oregon were operating state lotteries with parlay betting on sports events. Mississippi had a statute that allowed licensed operators to run sports pools.

However, the Mississippi Supreme Court ruled that the statute did not mean what it said, and that the state's casinos cannot have betting on races and sports events; although, it does appear that casinos can accepts sports bets if the sports event takes place on the casino's property. Montana not only had a state lottery with authority to take sports bets, it allowed sports cards, sports pools and other forms of parimutuel betting on sports events. New Mexico statutes permitted "Keirin," parimutuel wagering on bicycle races. North Dakota expressly allowed nonprofit organizations to run sports pools on professional sports events. Washington state expressly allowed what every other state tolerated: Anyone could conduct low-limit sports pools. Wyoming, like North Dakota, allows calcuttas, limited to amateur sports events.

Congress grandfathered-in about a dozen states with true sports betting. but it locked out the 38 or so other states, overruling voters and state legislatures, as happened recently in New Jersey.

State Raises Bingo Limits

Pennsylvania has revised its gaming laws to help nonprofit organizations that rely on Bingo to generate revenue. Pre-existing regulations, passed in 1981, hindered such groups from advertising the dollar value of cash prizes and limited promotion of Bingo on the Internet and through social media. The new Bingo law, which went into effect at the beginning of this year, also increased the maximum prizes for games from \$250 to \$500 for a single game, from \$2,000 to \$4,000 for jackpot games, and from \$4,000 to \$8,000 in the total amount awarded in a single day. Restrictions on the number of days an organization can hold Bingo were also lifted, and pre-draw Bingo—where players purchase concealed Bingo cards and numbers are randomly generated—is now allowed. Non-profits must still purchase licenses to offer Bingo.

Blind Player Demands Payment

A Connecticut man who is blind claims that a local Bingo operator in New Hampshire accepted his Braille Bingo cards but did not pay up when he won a \$20,000 jackpot. The man involved said he was visiting the area and went to play Bingo at local Bingo facility where games are run by charities, with a different organization for each of the four days the Bingo parlor is open. The charity running the games the day of the man's win was a youth hockey organization. The player says he paid the required fees to play and was given permission to use his Braille Bingo cards, and even won a small prize, which was awarded. But when he hit the \$20,000 jackpot, he says the Bingo supervisor declared him the winner at first and congratulated him in front of everyone.

Then, as some in the crowd started grumbling, he claims the supervisor started raising concerns. The youth hockey group says it is working with the state gaming commission to validate the win, at which point it will make a final determination of the player's win. At press time, no decision had yet been made.

Bingo Comes to Martha's Vineyard

The U.S. Supreme Court has chosen not review a case regarding the Wampanoag Tribe of Gay Head's (Aquinnah) plans to build a Bingo hall on Martha's Vineyard, an island off of Cape Cod in Massachusetts. The court decision left intact a federal appeals court decision, which said the 1988 Indian Gaming Regulatory Act superseded the 1987 Massachusetts Settlement Act's provisions restricting gaming. The tribe says it will build a "modest" class-two Bingo facility, with the long-term goal of creating a large casino facility on the mainland. Local representatives say they plan no further legal action to stop the gaming facility's construction.

Space Invaders!

Hi Guy,

I am a Bingo volunteer and wanted to get your opinion on an incident that took place at our charity Bingo that caused a lot of trouble and ill will.

During a recent Bingo night we had a large turnout. An unusual thing about it was that almost all the players were women. The count was like 120 women and five men.

We actually didn't notice the gender count until at the end of the first session and first intermission. A large line formed at the women's restroom and after a few minutes the men's restroom was left unoccupied. Several of the female players noticed this and made a quick dash to the men's bathroom. Eventually these quick dashes turned into a second line, even though there were only two stalls in the men's room and one of those was for disabled.

For 10 or so minutes no one had any issue with this, until one of the male patrons, an older gentleman, came over to use the men's restroom. My understanding is that when he was confronted by the line of women at the men's room door, he politely said he needed the facilities, but the women refused to give up the restroom. A second male player then walked up, demanded to be let in, and the

women again refused. The second man was much less polite than the first, and began shouting that they had no right to be using the men's room or blocking his entry. This angered some of the women, who began shouting back.

I overheard the raised voices and ran over to see what the problem was. (In all honesty, I was about due to use the facilities myself.) The male player told me the women had taken over the men's bathroom and refused to give it back. At this point, several of the women suggested (loudly) that the men should go urinate in the parking lot.

I didn't know what to do. But things were getting out of hand.

That was when our Bingo director, a woman, showed up to find out what was going on. The man repeated his story and this time the women in line stared him down but said nothing. The Bingo director then entered the men's room, escorted the handful of women out, then let the men go in and use it. She then made a quick announcement asking any other men who needed to use the restroom to please come now, so that the overflow of women customers could use it.

Two more male volunteers, one other male player, and I sheepishly slipped into the restroom. When we had finished, the director reopened the men's room to the women. After about 15 minutes, everyone had done their business and was back in their seats for the second session.

Before the session started, the Bingo director got on the loudspeaker and announced that during the second intermission, the men's room would be for men first, and afterward could be used by the women. I got stuck being bathroom doorman in case another clash erupted, which it didn't. Lucky me.


Dear Dream Guy,

Florida Man Hits A Big One

A 20-year-old Florida man is the lone winner of a \$451 million Mega Millions jackpot. Shane Missler, who bought the ticket in Port Richey, Florida, chose a one-time, lump sum payment of \$281.9 million. "I'm only 20, but I hope to use it to pursue a variety of passions, help my family and do some good for humanity," Missler says He added that he wasn't surprised that he had won and that he had a "feeling" that he might. His winning numbers were 28, 30, 39, 59 and 70, with Mega Ball number 10. Missler's win is the sixth largest jackpot ever by a single lottery ticket.

Wrong Ticket Leads to Right Decision

Oksana Zaharov of Edgewater, New Jersey, was shopping in New York City when she asked a clerk for a \$1 New York Lottery scratch-off ticket. He mistakenly handed her a \$10 Set For Life ticket, and Zaharov immediately realized the mistake. "When the clerk handed me the wrong ticket I felt bad, so I decided to just go ahead and buy it," the 46-year-old mother of two says. "I actually used the ticket as a bookmark for a couple weeks before I decided to scratch it." When she did, Zaharov discovered

she had won \$5 million—which she will receive over 20 years, plus annual net sums of more than \$172,000 after that for the rest of her life. "I never win anything," she says. "I was sure the ticket was fake. It wasn't until I brought it into the office that I knew it was for real." Zaharov plans to take her family on a vacation to the Bahamas and fund her children's college educations with her winnings.

Michigan Man Scores \$1.3 Million

Investments and retirement are on the mind of a Monroe County, Michigan, man who won \$2 million playing the Multiplier Spectacular instant game. "I scratched the ticket at home and couldn't really believe what I was seeing," says the player who chose to remain anonymous. "I called for my wife to come read the ticket and when she saw it, her eyes lit up so I knew we were winners." The 56-year-old man said he thought about how to handle the big win before cashing in his ticket, the prize for which he took as a onetime lump-sum of \$1.3 million. "It's an awesome feeling to win. You never think this is going to happen to you, and it's amazing when it does."

Super Grouper

I love your column, especially all your fish recipes. I have a request. Do you have any recipes for swordfish? My husband and I eat a lot of fish and I need some new recipes. Also, how about a recipe for grouper, too? — Mary Sue from Macon, Georgia

Dear Mary Sue,

Here's one of my favorite recipes for swordfish. Don't forget to marinate the swordfish at least one hour ahead of cooking. This swordfish recipe is from a very good restaurant. It is included in one of my many cookbooks. The fried grouper is moist and delicious. Enjoy! — **Annie**

FRESH SWORDFISH GRILLE

Juice of 3 lemons
1 ½ cups olive oil
½ cup white wine
2 cloves garlic, crushed
3 tablespoons finely chopped
parsley

½ teaspoon oregano Salt Black pepper, freshly ground 2 swordfish steaks about 14 oz. each and 1-inch thick Lemon wedges

Mix lemon juice, oil, wine, garlic, parsley, oregano, salt and pepper in a glass bowl. Marinate the swordfish in this mixture for at least one hour. Drain and reserve the marinade. Preheat the broiler. Broil the fish, turning once and basting with the marinade occasionally. When fish is brown cut into cubes. Mix in the remaining marinade. Bake in a 400-degree oven for 5 minutes. Serve with lemon wedges. Serves four.

FRIED GROUPER

4 grouper filets
1 cup flour
1 cup milk
1 cup cracker meal
Oil for deep fat frying

Cut the grouper into strips about 1 inch wide. Dip in the flour, then milk, then cracker meal. Heat the oil to 340 degrees. Fry until golden brown. Blot on paper and serve piping hot. Serves 4.

Poker Talk



Pilot Takes Flight in Poker Tournament

In October, the World Poker Tour's Bestbet Bounty Scramble main event drew 323 players to Jacksonville, Florida. The battle for the \$315,723 winner's prize came down to Paul Petraglia, a local player and airline pilot by trade, and defending tournament champion Sam Panzica.

Petraglia had never cashed in a poker tournament for more than \$20,000, while Panzica was a seasoned pro with more than \$3.7 million in live tournament earnings over his career. It was a David vs. Goliath story, and the result was similar to the biblical tale, as Petraglia managed to fell the poker giant.

In what would be the final hand of the tournament, the blinds were 75,000-150,000 with an ante of 25,000 when Petraglia raised to 350,000 holding 9s 7s and Panzica defended with Jh 3h.

The flop came down 8h 6h 5d. Panzica checked, and Petraglia bet 400,000.

Panzica, who was sitting with 2.35 million behind, had too large a stack to move all in on the flop. (A shove would have been for more than three times the pot.) As such, he had checked with the intention of check-raising with his flush draw. Petraglia's bet allowed Panzica to do that, and of course

Petraglia snap-called, having flopped the nut straight.

Panzica needed a heart to win, but he was left wanting as the 8c blanked on the turn, followed by the 2c on the river. With that, Panzica was eliminated in second place for \$210,783, while Petraglia celebrated his championship and saw his name inscribed on the WPT Champions Cup.

In hindsight, could Panzica have played his hand any differently so as not to go bust? Given that J-3 suited is a weak hand, he could have folded preflop. However, it was heads-up play, and he was in the big blind. It's important to loosen your range in the final stage of a tournament, especially when you have a good amount of chips invested in the hand. A fold wouldn't have been terrible, but most experienced tournament players would have called in that spot.

Once two hearts come down on the flop, the hand pretty much played itself. Panzica had the opportunity to move all in, but he didn't want to chase out weak hands. He'd rather feign weakness with a check and have his opponent put in a continuation bet. That way, when his opponent does have weak holdings (which is most of the time), Panzica is picking up extra chips by check-raising.

Another choice Panzica had was to just call and see if a heart appeared on the turn. However, when you're the short stack, playing a strong draw passively while out of position is not a recipe for success. You're prone to just bleed off chips when you miss and not get paid when you hit.

In this hand, Panzica did what almost any pro would do. He allowed his opponent to commit some chips before jamming to maximize both value and fold equity. Unfortunately for him, Petraglia had flopped the nuts and had an easy call. The rest was up to the poker gods.

BURNETT OUT, HARRIS IN

Nevada State Senator Becky Harris is settling down in her new job as the Chairwoman of the Nevada Gaming Control Board. She was named to the all-important board by Governor Brian Sandoval. He chose the Republican politician in replacing the former head of the group, A.G. Burnett. He left the board just before Christmas to resume his work in a Nevada law firm. Harris, who represents State Senate District 9 in Clark County, is leaving the legislature to serve on the board. She is the first female head of the board.

A BIRTHDAY FOR A CLASSIC

It is housed in one of the oldest structures in Southern Nevada. It's the Golden Gate Hotel and Casino, and it recently celebrated its 112th birthday. Founded back in 1906, when downtown Las Vegas was a cluster of buildings near the railroad station, the daily rate, at the time, was a whopping one-dollar-a-day. Even though it's a classic, there was a major modernization undertaken in 2012. A new tower was added then.

WHEN THE CHIPS ARE GONE

It's happened again in Las Vegas, the theft of playing chips. Las Vegas Police detectives were recently sent to a Strip casino to investigate the theft. Three people were said to have stolen the chips; in legal terms the theft is classified as Grand Larceny. The incident happened late in the evening at Harrah's. At the time of the initial investigation, the denominations or worth of the chip was not known.

Seven Quick

Strategy Tips

The following seven tips will improve your bottom line the next time you visit a casino.

Tip #1. You can always tell if a video poker machine is worth playing by looking at the payoff schedule on the machine. For example, for a Jacks or Better (draw poker) game, ideally the single coin payoff for the full house and flush should be 9/6 respectively (these machines return 99.54% with perfect play). Every decrease by one in either the full house or flush single coin payoff decreases the return by roughly 1.1%. So an 8/6 pay schedule would return only 97.3%. Be smart and check the pay schedules before you play.

Tip #2. Suppose you're playing a Jacks or Better video poker machine and you get this hand: 5d 7d 5c 2d 9d. How would you play it? You have two choices: keep the 4-card flush, or keep the pair of 5's. The correct play is to keep the four-card flush and draw one card. If instead your hand contained a high pair (J's – Aces) rather than a low pair, then you should keep the high pair and draw three cards. Remember this rule: Keep a high pair over four-card flush and the latter over a low pair.

Tip #3. You are playing blackjack and you have a 16 against a dealer upcard of 10. You say under your breath, "Ahh Shoot," but you've still got to make a play. But what's best, to stand or hit? It depends. If the casino offers surrender, then surrender is your best play. If surrender is not available then you are slightly better off hitting rather than standing. One exception: If your 16 is made up of 3 (or more) cards, then standing is the better play.

Tip #4. Many novice craps players like to wager on the Big 6 and 8. The rules for winning are simple. If you bet on the Big 6, you win if the 6 is rolled and lose if instead a 7 is rolled (same rules for Big 8). You can make the same bet in craps that pays more! Where? Make a Place bet on 6 or 8. A winning 6 or 8 Place bet pays 7-6, whereas a winning Big 6 or 8 bet pays only 1-1 (or even money).


Tip #5. If you are not sure of your blackjack or video poker

playing strategy, bring a strategy card with you when you play and refer to it. They are casino legal.

Tip #6. There is plenty of solid information on blackjack, craps, video poker, and other casino games on the Internet that is free to read. I recommend www.wizardofodds.com and www.888casino.com/blog. At the latter site, you'll find strategy guides on blackjack, roulette, craps, video poker, and slots that are free to read.

Tip #7. If you like to play slots, you'll get more bang for your bucks by playing traditional three- and five-line games rather than progressive games. The latter advertise huge Jackpots with very long odds of winning; moreover, the overall return on a progressive game is much lower than a non-progressive game.





Don't Eat This If You're Taking That

Dear Savvy Senior,

If the prescription label says "take with meals," does it matter what you eat? I currently take eight different medications for various health problems and would like to know if there are any foods I need to avoid. — Over Medicated

Dear Over,

It depends on the medication. Many meds should be taken with food-any food-to increase their absorption and reduce the risk of side effects. But some foods and medications can interact, reducing the medications' effectiveness or increasing the risk of harmful side effects.

To stay safe, you should always talk to your doctor or pharmacist to learn the ins and outs of your prescriptions, along with what foods and beverages to avoid while you're on it. In the meantime, here are some foods you should stay away from for some commonly prescribed drugs.

Cholesterol Medications: If you take a certain statin drug to control high cholesterol like Liptor, Zocor, Altoprev, Mevacor, or generics atorvastatin, simvastatin or lovastatin, you should avoid grapefruit and grapefruit juice. Grapefruit can raise the level of the drug in your bloodstream and increase the risk of side effects, especially leg pain.

Blood Pressure Medicine: If you take an ACE inhibitor drug like Capoten, Vasotec, Monopril, Zestril and others to lower your blood pressure, you should limit food that contains potassium like bananas, oranges. tomatoes, spinach and other leafy greens, sweet potatoes, and salt substitutes that contain potassium. ACE inhibitors raise the body's potassium levels. Eating too many potassium rich-foods while taking an ACE inhibitor can cause an irregular heartbeat and heart palpitations.

Blood Thinning

Medications: If you are taking Coumadin, Jantoven, or the generic warfarin, you should limit kale and other greens, including broccoli, cabbage, spinach, and brussels sprouts that contain vitamin K. These foods can block the effects of these blood-thinning medications putting you at risk for developing blood clots. You also need to watch out for garlic, ginger, vitamin E and fish oil supplements because they can increase these medications bloodthinning abilities putting you at risk for excessive bleeding.

Antidepressants: If you take a monoamine oxidase inhibitor (MAOI) antidepressant

like Marplan, Nardil,
Emsam, Parnate, or generic
isocarboxazid, phenelzine,
selegiline or tranylcypromine,
avoid aged cheeses, chocolate,
cured meats and alcoholic
drinks. These contain tyramine,
which can raise blood pressure.
Normally, the body controls
tyramine levels with an enzyme
called monoamine oxidase, but
the MAOI antidepressant block
that enzyme.

Thyroid Medications: If you take a medication for hypothyroidism like Synthroid, Levoxyl, Levothroid or generic levothyroxine, you should avoid eating tofu and walnuts, and drinking soymilk. All these can prevent your body from absorbing this medicine.

Anti-Anxiety Medications: If you take medication for anxiety like Xanax, Klonopin, Valium, Ativan, or generic alprazolam, clonazepam, diazepam or lorazepam, you should avoid alcohol. These medications act as sedatives, binding with the brain's natural tranquilizers to calm you down. But when you mix these drugs with alcohol, the side effects intensify, and can cause you to feel lightheaded, sleepy and forgetful.

Antibiotics: If you're taking an antibiotic like Sumycin, Dynacin, Monodox, or generic tetracycline, doxycycline or minocycline, you should avoid dairy-milk, yogurt, and cheese, and calcium supplements and fortified foods-for a couple hours before and after taking the medicine. Calcium in dairy products binds to the antibiotic and prevents your body from absorbing it, making it ineffective.
